

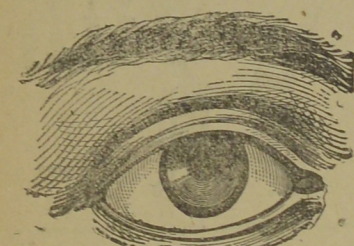

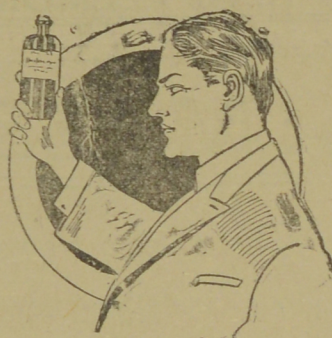

New York, March 7—Matty Baldwin of Boston appointed Johnny Marto of Manhattan the receiver of 200 hard hooks, uppercuts, swings and straight-arm punches in a 10-round bout of the National Sporting Club tonight. Marto accepted everything that came his way without flinching and also without thanks.

It was not hard to decide the bout. The only question was, did Marto gain any honors during the milling. After consulting the records he was allowed to split the honors with Baldwin in the fourth and gain all of the honors in the fifth. Baldwin, in a selfish spirit, took the remainder of the rounds.

Marto was seemingly asleep during the early sessions. He stood as if petrified in the ring and Baldwin fairly plastered him with punches to the face and body. Johnny took a brace in the middle sessions, but in an ill-judged moment one of his friends, who carried a bugle, began to play "Taps" for Baldwin's benefit. This tune, instead of placing a damper on Baldwin's spirits, seemed to act as a tonic, and he tore into Marto until he had Johnny reeling about the ring.

In the last round he all but put Marto to sleep with punches to face any body.

**BAY WOOD GOT SEVERE DRUBBING FROM "K.O." BROWN**

Fall River Man though Badly Beaten Stayed Full Route of Twelve Round Bout

Fall River March 7—Knockout Brown of New York made his first entry into a New England ring tonight before the members of the Colonial A.C. He was pitted against Bay Wood of this city a local lightweight who has been rapidly coming to the front. Wood stayed the limit of 12 rounds and took one of the worst drubbings that any lightweight ever took in the history of the sport in this city.

For nine out of the 12 three-minute sessions Brown drove Wood all over the ring and stowed away enough lefts and rights to put a dent in a boiler, but they never made the impression that Brown desired. Steve Mahoney of Boston was the referee.

The ability of Wood to take terrific punishment and then come back so strong that he would jab K.O. with a left to the face was wonderful. Just as an illustration of the swings that Brown landed, the padding in his glove in the fourth was scattered all over the ring. He virtually burst his glove with the hammer-like blows that he landed on the local lad's body.

In the second round Wood came across with a swinging left jab that caught Brown under the left eye and K.O. will carry something away with him as a reminder of his visit. Morgan never worked harder than over that left eye in the minutes rest that was allowed. In the next round Brown tore after the Fall River lad like a wild bull in a china shop and landed lefts and rights with such rapidity that Wood was feazed.

From the fourth to the ninth round Brown had all the best of it. Wood was a punching bag, little less, but he was in no danger of being put away. In the ninth round Wood made 2000 spectators fairly howl at the way that he ripped rights and lefts to Brown's body and jaw in the fighting. He drew the blood from Brown's nose in this round and Brown had to work hard to cover up.

In the last three rounds Wood gave a fine exhibition of covering. Brown tried with all his might to put Wood away and rained dozens of blows on Wood's head and body but Wood was on his feet at the finish.

The fight was one of the best ever seen here and Wood made a great showing against the near-champion, Brown having to work every minute to get the best of it. On points Brown won by a mile.

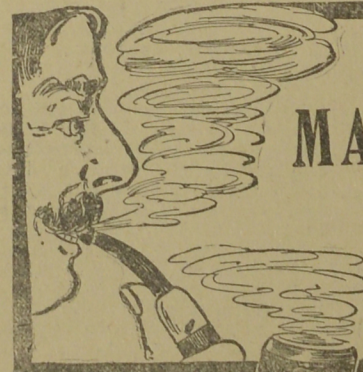
