MANY WEALTHY MEN WERE ON THE TITANIC

New York, April 16—News of the probable terrible loss of life in the sinking of the Titanic was limited in its circulation in the early evening, but by 9 o'clock it had brought a great crowd of persons to the White Star Line offices near the foot of Broadway. Women were in tears and men were frantic after their plea for assuring news was met with the frank admission that very little was known of the fate of passengers who were not in the first or second cabin.

All of the White Star Line officials and subordinates available were on duty at the offices and planned to make a night of it under siege by reporters, relatives of passengers and others.

By midnight Bowling Green in front of the White Star line offices was covered with automobiles of prominent residents of the city, who had driven down town for first hand information. Wealth and society rubbed elbows with poverty and the crowd that besieged the steamship line officials, and both classes were in deep grief.

There were many instances of fashionably gowned women going into hysterics when the hopeful report of the afternoon were blasted with the news that only 675 passengers had probably been saved.

Vincent Astor, only son of Colonel John Jacob Astor, accompanied by A. J. Biddle of Philadelphia, and Col. Astor's secretary, were among the crowd at the offices, and left with tears in their eyes after a fifteen minute conference with Vice-President Franklin. Relatives of Isidor Straus and a number of other prominent passengers had similar conferences with Vice-President Franklin and came away with the same dejection.

Police reserves had to be called to several sections of the city to govern the crowds which congregated around newspaper bulletin boards for news of the Titanic. The disaster stunned the gay Broadway district, as perhaps no disaster ever had so completely before, for many of those who poured out of the theatres had friends on the steamer. The newspaper district was crowded till after midnight.

Untold wealth was represented among the passengers on the Titanic there being on board at least six men each of whose fortunes might be reckoned in tens of millions of dollars. A rough estimate of the total wealth represented in the first class passenger list would reach over half a billion dollars.

The wealthiest of the list is Col. John Jacob Astor, head of the fam-

ous house whose name he bears and who is reputed to be worth \$150,000,000. He is connected with most of the large corporations of the country and for years has had direct control of the vast estate left by his father the late William Astor. Mr. Astor was returning on the Titanic from a tour of Egypt with his bride who was Miss Madeline Force, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Force. They were married in Providence on September 9. Mr. and Mrs. Astor occupied a bridal suite on the doomed liner.

Two years ago Colonel Astor and his son Vincent figured in a sea scare when their yacht the Noma, having both on board could not be located after a storm in the Caribbean Sea. While Government and other vessels were searching for the yacht she steamed safely into Jacksonville.

Benjamin Guggenheim, probably next in financial importance is the fifth of the seven sons of Meyer Guggenheim, who founded the American Smelting & Refining Company, the great mining corporation, and is a director of many corporations, including the International Steam Pump Company of which he is also president. His fortune is estimated at \$95,000,000. His wife whose name does not appear on the passenger list is the daughter of James Seligman, the New York banker.

George D. Widener is the son of P. A. B. Widener, the Philadelphia "traction" king whose fortune is estimated at \$50,000,000.

Isador Straus, one of New York's most prominent dry goods merchants and notable for his philanthropies, a fortune estimated to be worth

\$50,000,000. He is a director in various banks, trust companies and charitable institutions and with his brother Nathan Straus is the owner of three of New York's largest department stores.

J. Bruce Ismay, president and one of the founders of the International Mercantile Marine Company who has always made it a custom to be a passenger on the maiden trip of every ship built by the company is said to be worth \$40,000,000. It was Mr. Ismay who with J. P. Morgan consolidated American and British steamship lines under the International Mercantile Marine's control.

Colonel Washington Roebling, builder of the Brooklyn Bridge, president and director of John A. Roeblings Sons Company is credited with a fortune of \$25,000,000.

Among others of reputed wealth who were on board are J. P. Thayer vice-president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, the Countess of Rothes, the daughter of an English plusa manufacturer, who expected to visit New York.

T. W. Cavendish of England with his American wife, who is the daughter of Henry Siegel, the New York merchant, were first passengers as also were Washington Dodge and his wife and son. Mr. Dodge hails from San Francisco, where he once held the office of assessor and took an active part in the purification of the politics of that city.

MANY CANADIANS

Christopher Head is a London barrister and son of the senior member of the firm of Lloyds underwriters. Mrs. Edward S. Roberts is from St. Louis, as also are Miss E. W. Allen and Theophile Papin, jr. Mr. Papin is noted as an art connoisseur.

Among prominent Canadian passengers, were H. Markland Molson, a capitalist; Mr. and Mrs. Thornton Davidson, Mrs. James Baxter, Q. Baxter, H. J. Allison and Mrs. Allison of Montreal, Major Arthur Peuchen of the Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto; Mrs. Mark Fortune and Mrs. Graham of Winnipeg.

Mr. Davidson is a member of the Montreal Stock Exchange and a son of Justice Davidson. His wife is a daughter of President Hays of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, who with Mrs. Hays and Miss Hays also were passengers.

Mr. Paul Chevre the well-known French sculptor who made the Champlain monument was in the first cabin on his way to Canada, to complete the Mercier memorial. Mr. Allison is a well known Montreal financier.

BUILDER OF TITANIC NATIVE OF QUEBEC

Sympathy for Lord Pirrie, head of the firm which built the Titanic, will be felt in a special manner throughout the province of Quebec for it was at Lachine that Lord Pirrie was born sixty-five years ago. At the age of fifteen he entered the great shipbuilding firm of Harland and Wolff, of Belfast, as an engineering draughtsman and twelve years later became a partner in the firm. Since then he has always been its driving force and many of the devices used in modern shipbuilding are his invention.

He has come into great prominence lately through his advocacy of Home Rule for Ireland. Although he was known to a few as a Liberal in Mr. Gladstone's day he took no active part in politics until a few years ago. He was repeatedly offered a baronetcy by both political parties but always refused any honor less than the peerage, and this finally came his way. The Unionist of Ireland do not brook that the head of Ulster's greatest industry should be a Home Ruler and they have pursued Lord Pirrie with extraordinary bitterness. When he was created a Knight of St. Patrick his investiture was carried out by the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland as the other knights refused to be present, with the exception of one or two who were Liberals.


