## HEALED BY ZAM-BUK

### BAPTIST COLLEGE FOR ST. PETERSBURG

New York, Feb. 12.—The Rev. Dr. Robert MacArthur, president of the Baptist World Alliance, who has just returned from St. Petersburg, announced in the pulpit of the Calvary Baptist Church, of which he was formerly pastor, that he had obtained permission of the Russian Emperor to build the proposed Baptist College in St. Petersburg. Dr. MacArthur who attended the dedication of the New Baptist Church in that city, said however, that four conditions had been imposed, before the permission was finally obtained, namely, that the college must be built under the protectorate of registered church should not be controlled by either an American or British board of trustees, no politics should be taught, and no course included in the curriculum, and that the site for the building should not at present cost more than \$2,500.

### DRIVER AND FIREMAN BLOWN FROM CAB

### THE GOVERNMENT AND THE FARMER

(Toronto Star)


In the debates on the lumber duties a great deal was said about the interpretation of the law, and the exact meaning of the words relating to describing the different kinds of lumber dutiable and free. The contention of the Opposition is that the collection of the twenty-five per cent duty on lumber dressed on one side is illegal. But whatever the interpretation may be, the law is not unchangeable. The Government with the consent of Parliament can change the duties whenever it pleases. It ought at once to make it certain that the settler can have such lumber as it needs for his house, his stable and his barn without paying duty. He had this liberty until the new Customs ruling. It ought to be restored and the House of Commons can restore it.

Whatever may be said for or against our protective system, it is clear that little or none of its benefits go to the Western farmer. He does not want protection for his wheat and oats. He produces an immense surplus of these for which he needs market. The market to the South has been closed by the rejection of the Reciprocity agreement. The channels of communication east and west are choked.

The Western farmer pays duty on agricultural implements, clothing, hardware, fruit and many foods, which are not produced in this country. There is neither justice nor common sense in taxing him on the lumber with which he builds his house. It is not even good protectionist doctrine. Protectionists have been advising us to "conserve our resources" and not allow the Yankees to use the products of our forests. Here is a chance to use the products of the American forests and conserve our own.

There is not much force in the argument that the West ought to be preserved as a market for the east, in return for the money spent by the East on Western railways. But in any case the argument does not apply here. The lumber combine which wants to monopolize the prairies is a Western Combine having its home in British Columbia. There is therefore, no question between East and West. The question is between a combine which is exploiting the resources of British Columbia and the farmers, who are developing the resources of Saskatchewan. There ought not to be a moment's hesitation about protecting the farmer from the combine.

#### INTERNATIONAL CUE TOURNAMENT

New York, Feb. 12.—To the remarkable long list of successful billiard tournaments pulled off in the metropolis this winter another is to be added this week. This is the international 18.2 ballline championship tournament, opening tonight at the Liederkranz Club. Among the most notable participants in the tournament will be Charles F. Conklin of Chicago, the present holder of the international title, and Edouard Rondil of Paris, who won the French amateur billiard championship of 1910.

#### FOR SOUTH FLORIDA GOLF TITLE

Palm Beach, Fla., Feb. 12.—Play in the annual golf tournament for the South Florida championship began on the Palm Beach Links today with a qualifying round of 18 holes. The tournament will continue until the end of the week and judging from the high-class list of contestants the competitions will be among the keenest ever seen in the South.

Lee Shubert has made arrangements for the American rights to "The Miracle" which is now being given at the Olympia Theatre in London. He is also negotiating for "Turandot" a Chinese spectacular play now running at the Deutsche Theatre in Berlin.

### NEW KIND OF RAILWAY FOR QUEENS COUNTY

(St. John Telegraph.)

Are the Conservatives going to introduce a new type of railway—the moveable? Is the Valley road to run down both sides of the St. John River? Is it to cross at the Mistake, but also to entwine itself around Welsford, thus killing two political birds with one stone? There are fresh reasons why the case will bear watching.

Messrs. H. W. Woods and A. R. Slipp, the representatives of Queens County in the local legislature, have been intimating to the people of Welsford that there is an alternative route for the Valley railroad by which it would come to their doors. Just how the Valley railroad can cross at the Mistake, and also serve the people of Welsford is a matter which Messrs. Woods and Slipp will have leisure to explain later.

It will be remembered that during the federal elections Colonel McLean, hearing that Mr. Woods was making alluring statements to the people of Queens County, and was mapping out a serpentine and all-embracing route for the railway, found it necessary to distribute copies of a letter from Mr. Flemming in which it was said that the road would cross the river at the Mistake. So far as is known there has been no modification of this decision, and Messrs. Woods and Slipp are found in the position of attempting to keep the people of Welsford in a state of hope or uncertainty until after the next local election.

It may be considered good politics by some of Mr. Flemming's supporters to attempt to persuade every farmer in Queens County that the railway is going to pass before his door, but when it comes to putting down the rails deception will no longer be possible. The people of Welsford will require something more tangible than campaign promises from Messrs. Woods and Slipp this time.

The meeting was devoted to the transaction of routine business and the discussion of several matters of interest and importance to the trade.
