MR. FLEMMING AND THE LIBERAL SUPPORT

Over in Northumberland County, where there has been a shadow, or more, of political unrest, Mr. Fleming spoke the other night and one of the things he said made a noise a good deal like a joke. But it is said that his face was perfectly straight when he stated that he would accept the support of Liberals and Conservatives alike, asking no questions as to their affiliations with federal politics.

Close to four years ago Mr. Fleming was saying the same thing—an isolated instance of his consistency—and, what was more he got elected that way. Then he straightway smote those who lifted him up. If the man were really sincere, or if he really thinks he can rally his former following, he might restore a few office-holders that were dismissed in his constituency. Or, if that be impracticable, he might appoint a Liberal here and there to some little job; or at least, give Liberals a chance to compete for public works by tender.

It's a long way 'round to Newcastle and it is quite likely the premier will have little to say to Carleton county people about his willingness to "accept the support of Liberals." No doubt at all about his willingness to accept all he will get. And Carleton county Liberals are not looking to him to give. It doesn't require a long distance memory to recall what work the provincial secretary was chiefly engaged in during August and September last.

TO PROBE CANADIAN FREIGHT RATES

Ottawa, Feb. 13—Preliminary to a sweeping investigation which it is proposed to make into the freight rates charged by the railroads in the Western Provinces, the Board of Railway Commissioners met today to map out a line of procedure. The inquiry is expected to be the most important of its kind ever undertaken in Canada and the importance of the results on the commercial and industrial interests of the West can scarcely be overestimated. The railway commissioners were prompted to begin the investigation by the receipt of numerous complaints alleging discrimination against Alberta and Saskatchewan in favor of Manitoba and also making general charges of excessive rates throughout the West.

SOUTHERN MERCHANTS' CONVENTION

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 13—Joined in a movement which has for its object the strengthening of the commercial independence of the South, nearly one thousand representative Southern merchants assembled in this city today to confer regarding the betterment of existing trade conditions and to discuss various problems of interest and importance. The Atlanta Merchants and Manufacturers' association took the initiative in bringing the merchants together and will act as host to the visitors during their five days' stay in the city.

The relation of Southern agricultural interests to the development of commerce and manufacturing is the general subject selected for discussion. The reduction of the cotton acreage will be exhaustively considered, also the encouragement of diversified farming and the furtherance of the stock breeding industry. In addition, the merchants will discuss advertising methods, semi-annual clearance sales and numerous other matters relating to their daily business.

The initial session of the convention was held this morning in the assembly room of the Piedmont Hotel and was devoted to the work of organization. This afternoon the visiting merchants inspected a number of large manufacturing and mercantile establishments of Atlanta. The business sessions will be resumed tomorrow morning and will continue until Friday. A notable feature of the gathering will be a dinner Thursday evening at which Prof. J. Laurence Laughlin, of the University of Chicago will speak on the subject, "How Currency Reform will Benefit the Merchants of the South."
