## MOUNT TEMPLE'S CAPTAIN TESTIFYING BEFORE COMMITTEE

(Continued from page one.)

by the company's officials and lawyers. The Lapland is expected today. The company also has ordered that no passengers be booked for the Lapland from Plymouth to Cherbourg unless they are able to prove they have a friend aboard. Further all newspaper men are ordered excluded from the Lapland and the tender bringing the Titanic survivors ashore. Washington, April 26—Ablaze with light from her saloons and cabins, the Titanic dashed at full speed to her destruction, according to Ernest Gill, a donkey engine man on the steamship Californian, who testified today before the senate committee investigating the disaster. He said that Captain Stanley Lord, of the Californian, refused later to go to the aid of the Titanic, the rockets from which could be plainly seen. Gill submitted an affidavit to the committee, and when sworn to and put on the stand, stuck to his charges against the captain of the Californian.

Captain Lord entered a sweeping denial of Gill's accusations and read from the Californian's log to support his contention.

Cyril Evans, the Californian's wireless operator told of hearing much talk among the crew who were critical of the captain's course. Gill, he said, told him he expected to get \$500 for his story when the ship reached Boston.

Evans told of having warned the Titanic, only a brief time before the great vessel crashed into the berg, that the sea was crowded with ice. The Titanic's operators, he said, at the time were working with the wireless station at Cape Race, and they told him to "shut up" and "keep out." Within a half hour the pride of the sea was crumpled and sinking. It developed today that one reform that is certain to spring from the present investigation will be enforced in the wireless rooms of ships entering or leaving American ports. This concerns lack of authority over the operators, pay, hours and freedom from responsibility, as brought out by the testimony to date.

### THE SENATE ENQUIRY.

Washington, April 27—The committee decided early in the day to subpoena for next week F. M. Sammis, chief engineer of the Marconi Company, and Business Agent Bottomley of that company, Operator Bride of the Titanic, who is in a hospital in New York, and J. A. Hossy, a wireless operator at Taunton, Mass.

Samuel Goldenberg and several others from New York, representing the committee of Titanic survivors, arrived in Washington today. Chairman Smith said they came to testify as to the whereabouts of Captain Smith of the Titanic, and J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the International Mercantile Marine on Sunday evening before the accident. Second Officer Lightoller of the Titanic, was recalled. Senator Smith questioned him as to his knowledge of the crew of the ship. Mr. Lightoller said he knew them all.

"Do you know Louis Klein?" "No sir, there was a Klein, a second class barber on board I know him personally."

"No sir."

"Did he survive?" Louis Klein gave out a statement in Cleveland Ohio making sensational charges. He was brought here to testify and promptly disappeared. Lightoller said he saw Klein in Senator Smith's office, and he was not the Barber. The officer was then excused.

### CAPT. MOORE'S EVIDENCE

Capt. Jas. H. Moore, captain of the steamship Mount Temple which was supposed to have been almost within hailing distance of the Titanic on the day when that ship went down next took the stand. He said he had been at sea for 32 years, 27 years in the North Atlantic Ocean.

"Are you familiar with ice and icebergs?" asked Senator Smith.

"Yes, sir, very familiar," said the Captain.

"An iceberg may be composed of anything." "It is ice broken off from the land in Arctic regions and may be composed of land, rocks and most anything that it would pick up on its course."

"Senator sought this information because of some levity caused by a question he asked several days ago as to what an iceberg is composed of and the witnesses answered 'Ice'."

"Have you seen icebergs by day and by night?" asked Senator Smith.

"Yes sir."

"How do they look on a starlight night?"

"White, sir, in fact, they are luminous."

The night of the Titanic disaster was clear and the sky was studded with stars.

"Where was your ship on Sunday night, April 14?"

"We were in latitude 41.25, longitude 51.14, at 12.30 a.m., ship's time."

"I wish you would tell the committee in your own words just what happened on that Sunday and Monday morning," said the senator.

"At 12.30 April 15," said Captain Moore, "I was awakened by the steward with a message from the Marconi operator on my ship, which said that the Titanic was sending out a C.Q.D. message. Here is the message, 'Titanic sending C.Q.D.: requires assistance; position 41.44 north, 50.24 west. Come at once; iceberg.' This was a message the operator picked up."

"What reply did you send?"

"None whatever, sir. We did not want to stop those distress messages going out and the operator said the Titanic could not hear him. I blew the whistle at once and ordered the course toward the Titanic's position. We steamed up and sailed east by compass. We turned right toward the Titanic, north 65 east true. Then I went to the chief engineer and told him about the Titanic and to push up the fires, wake up all extra firemen and get them busy. I said, 'If necessary give the firemen a tote of rum.'"

"A what?"

"A tote of rum, sir," replied Captain Moore, "to wake them up and spur them to action."

"At the time you received that message from the Titanic how far distant did you figure the vessel was from you?"

"About 49 miles."

The senator asked what speed the Mount Temple made toward the Titanic. Captain Moore said a trifle more than 11 knots.

"About 3 a.m. we ran into our first ice," continued the witness, "and we immediately doubled the lookout."

"At 3.25, ship's time, we had to stop. At that time we figured we were about 14 miles distant from where the Titanic signalled."

Another delay was occasioned to the Mount Temple by a small schooner, the green light of which halted the ship. For a moment the captain got range of the White mast head lights and then they disappeared.

"Was the schooner between you and the Titanic?" asked the senator.

"Yes, sir."

"How much nearer the Titanic was that schooner than you were?"

"Oh, the schooner could not have been more than a mile and a half from me. I heard the fog-horn of the schooner and then put the Mount Temple engines full speed astern to avoid her."

### LATE ANDREW LOTTIMER

The funeral of the late Andrew Lottimer took place this afternoon and was largely attended. Service was conducted at the residence of Mr. James Doyle, King Street, at 3.30 by Rev. Neil McLaughlin and Rev. J. J. Colter. The pall-bearers were members of the official quarterly board of the Methodist Church of which the deceased was also a member. They were C.H. Thomas, J.J. Weddall, W. J. Osborne, C. A. Sampson, J. M. Lemont and Nathan Squires.
