FRED MITCHELL FORMERLY OF ST. JOHN LEADS BUFFALO

Field-leader of Bison-herd during Season 1912-- Dangerous Player and First-class Back-stop-- Formerly Pitcher in St. John--Has done well in American, National and Eastern Leagues

Buffalo, April 25--Big Fred Mitchell, ex-Hustler maskman, and one of the cleverest backstops that ever donned mask and protector in the International League, has been appointed to act as field leader of the herd during the campaign of 1912. His experience, covering a period of eleven years as pitcher and catcher in major and minor league circles indicates that the big chief has made another strategic move, in naming a player who has had an opportunity of studying the weakness and strength of all defense and offense from the two most important positions on a baseball club.

Mitchell is not a dashing, spectacular artist, but a steady, consistent player, who is working just as hard in the race of defeat as when victory is assured. His unerring good judgment at all stages of the conflict, plodding good humor despite "bone-head" plays and willingness to bear the brunt of attack gives him a solidity as a player that cannot fail to inspire confidence in both youngster and oldtimer.

DANGEROUS MAN

He is always a dangerous man with the willow, possesses a fair amount of speed, and has a faculty of getting on the bases as often as any man on the team, and always knows just what to do when he gets there.

Despite his eleven years of experience Mitchell is but thirty-one years of age, having made his debut as a professional player as a hurler for the Boston Red Sox in 1901 after a remarkable season with the St. John, N. B. club, the preceding season. He remained with the Red Sox until June of the following year when Connie Mack's attention was drawn to the young heaver, and he was sold into Athletic bondage. As a member of the Mack hurling corps Mitchell assisted largely in winning the American League pennant for his club.

BIG LEAGUE BALL

The following year the great baseball war sprang into the limelight and light and Mitchell was offered more alluring terms by Chief Zimmer, then manager of the Phillies. He accepted and remained with the Quakers during 1903-4. In 1905 he was sold to the Brooklyn National League club and the next year was sent to the Brooklyn "farm" at Toronto. For four years 1906-07-08-09, Mitchell outlasted with the Kelley hipodromes and during the season of 1909 evolved from a finger to a backstop despite the entreaties of Kelley, who wanted him to remain on the mound. He was obdurate, however, and became such a clever maskman that he was purchased by the New York Yanks during the big chief's regime in 1910. In 1911 John Gangel, of the Hustlers, separated the Rochester club from \$2,500 and Mitchell became a member of the championship organization. Comment on his work as a Hustler would be superfluous, as he was recognized throughout the circuit as one of the chief assets of the Hustler crew. But for his handling of "Slats" McConnell, the premier moundman of the Barrow wheel last year, the league might have returned a different winner.

Be that as it may Mitchell probably would still have been with Rochester, but for the return of Walter Blair whom Gangel regards as a phenom and the resultant inability of the Rochester management to carry two high-priced catchers.

Mitchell has an ideal physique for a catcher, standing 5 feet 9 1/2 inches in height and weighing 188 pounds. He is compactly built, has a whip of steel, a good battling eye, a goodly store of wisdom and will prove a valuable lieutenant to the big chief.
