**SEIZURE OF LIQUOR
AT WOODSTOCK**

Woodstock, N. B., Dec. 18--A large quantity of liquor, consisting of barrels and cases, was seized at the C. P. R. station yesterday by Scott Act officers.

Some time ago the railway issued a notice that they would not carry as freight liquor into Carleton county. As a rule the shipments were made to other points and brought here by teams in the night, so as to avoid a search warrant seizure.

A short time ago a St. John dealer was fined in the police court here for shipping liquor into the county. He did not pay and a large quantity of the liquor was taken and is now advertised for sale at auction the St. John party has secured a provincial constable. It is said stay of proceedings.

ried Mr. Friel said that they were not by Mr. Trites.

It was decided to ask Mr. Trites to come from Sackville and on the declaration being shown to him he said that he did not believe the signatures to the jurats were his. That he had no record of being in Dorchester that day and had not known of any proceedings against Mr. Friel until recently. Specimens of Mr. Trites' signature were filed with the commissioner.

TOOK NO HAND IN POLITICS

Mr. Friel went on the stand and gave a full general and detailed denial to the charges. He said that he had been appointed to the office in 1904 on the death of Mr. Knapp. That at the time of his appointment he stated clearly to the powers appointing him that he would in the future be out of local politics if he got the position, and that he had lived up to it.

He had resigned as secretary of the Westmorland Liberal Association and had taken no part in meeting work or provincial politics. He had taken no part in the local election of 1908 which was the first election after his appointment, except as representative of the purity league, and that as such he stopped a young man from voting another man's name. There was no other case at the polls, which were very orderly and the incident referred to was managed so quietly that hardly any one noticed it. He had not stood at the polls or canvassed or worked.

He flatly contradicted John Landry as to what took place between them and said Landry was too excited at the time to know.

There was practically no cross-examination and the commissioner asked no questions. This closed the defence.

Mr. Chapman asked to take back a statement he said he had made last evening about one of the LeBlanc affidavits. The commissioner said no such statement had been made and cut off further discussion.

Mr. Friel in closing charged that the LeBlanc solemn declaration, the Walter Crossman declaration and that of John S. Dickie were forgeries.

The commissioner in ending the proceedings, said that his report would be prepared with despatch.

WILL SOON BE DECIDED

London, Dec. 19--The Ottoman government has authorized its delegates at the peace conference to propose at the next session that Adrianople and all the other besieged Turkish towns shall be revictualled and if the proposal is not accepted by the delegates of the Balkan allies, negotiations are to be broken off, according to a news agency despatch received here today from Constantinople.

London, Dec. 19--The Belgrade correspondent of The Daily Mail sends the following:

"I learn that the Austro-Serbian dispute has been solved. Serbia will recognize an autonomous Albania, receiving the use of a commercial portion of the Albanian coast, connected with Serbia by a neutral railway."

"The Serbian minister of railways is leaving Belgrade for London for the purpose of giving technical advice to the Serbian peace delegates."

Athens, Greece, Dec. 19--A violent cannonade occurred yesterday between the Greeks attacking and the Turks defending Bizani Fort. A Greek aviator flew over Bizani and Janina. Turkish fire slightly damaged his planes and he replied by dropping bombs. He eventually landed safely.
