MINERS WANT INCREASE OF WAGES

Indianapolis, Jan. 24—Ten cents a ton increase in wages for bituminous coal miners was the general basis of demand upon which the scale committee of the convention of the United Mine Workers of America worked today, in preparing its report. It was expected the report would be submitted to the convention late today, preliminary to being offered at the miner's conference with the owners in this city tomorrow.

No recommendation is to be made to the convention as to whether a national strike will be called, in the event that the operators refuse to accede to the miners' demands, before April first, it was understood.

SEEK TO RESTORE COAL PACT

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 25—Whether there will be a general suspension of coal mining on April 1, when the present wage agreements expire, depends upon the success of the joint conference of operators and miners which went into session behind closed doors at the Hotel Claypool this afternoon. The miners are represented in the conference by the special committee appointed by the United Mine Workers. Nearly all of the mine owners of Indiana, Illinois and Ohio are represented, together with some of the western Pennsylvania and West Virginia fields.

The demands to be presented by the miners concerning wages and working conditions for the future were agreed upon by the convention of the miners' organization which has been in session here the past two weeks. Some of the demands are regarded as of a radical character by the mine owners and there is a little possibility of an agreement being reached unless the demands are substantially modified. Some of the prominent Pennsylvania and Ohio operators have declined to join in the conference, and this makes it impossible that the joint conference may adjourn without doing anything and that negotiations may then be carried on for a later meeting of operators and miners for that purpose. There is the firm belief on the part of many persons well acquainted with the situation that the operators who are now holding aloof finally will be brought into the joint conference, and that if a wage scale is negotiated it will cover the five States of Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

TO DISCUSS CHILD LABOR

Louisville, Ky., Jan. 25—Delegates from nearly thirty States, among them many men and women who have made the amelioration of the condition of the working classes their life work, gathering in Louisville today for the opening of the eighth annual conference of the National Child Labor Committee. The conference will be in session several days. Miss Jane Addams of Chicago Mrs. Florence Kelley of the National Consumers' League, Dr. Felix Adler of New York, President Alderman of the University of Virginia, P. F. Claxton, United States commissioner of education, and a number of other civic workers of national prominence are included among the scheduled speakers. The main subjects to be considered by the conference are: The relation of rural schools to child labor reform, child labor and compulsory education, increasing the efficiency of the elementary school, industrial education and vocational guidance, Federal aid to education and unreasonable industrial burdens on women and children and the effect on education.

The manoeuvre of the Unionists in threatening to blockade Ulster Hall where the Home Rule demonstration is to take place has incensed the Liberals and Nationalists and trouble looms up distinctly.

Brigadier General A. E. W. Gleichen the commanding officer of the district is returning from Switzerland, where he has been on vacation.

The merchants of the city are arranging to barricade and board up Ulster Hall.

Winnipeg, Jan. 23—The Orangemen their properties in the vicinity of Manitoba have a fund of \$5, 15 to fight Home Rule.

This has been subscribed as a result of action by the grand lodges Brandon last March. It is to be used for speakers and halls in England to oppose Home Rule.

THE ST. JOHN VALLEY BOOSTED IN ENGLAND

That the St. John Valley, in common with the rest of the province, is receiving a fair meed of attention from the British press, and that the writers have been pleased with what they have looked on in this part of the world, is again evidenced by The Aberdeen Press, one of the leading newspapers in North Britain. The Press publishes the following well written and informative article on the St. John River, in a recent issue, a copy of which has just come to hand:

"The River St. John does not rank amongst the large rivers of Canada. In the matter of size, it does not enter into comparison with the St. Lawrence, the Mackenzie or the Fraser. But none the less, it is a big river, the largest, in fact, on the Atlantic seaboard of North America, if the St. Lawrence be excepted. It is navigable for 150 miles from the mouth, and on its banks are situated the two chief cities of the Province of New Brunswick, namely, the capital, Fredericton, and the chief port, St. John. It has, moreover, all the dignity of a large continental river, and the charming scenery which lines its course makes its valley singularly attractive.

The traveller who approaches from the sea the City of St. John, where the river flows into the Bay of Fundy, is apt to get an erroneous impression of the province, of which that city is the principal seaport. He sees a busy town spreading up steep slopes; it has factory chimneys and bustling wharves, all indicative of industrial activity. Lumber lies piled about in immense quantities, evidence, if such were required, of the premier position which New Brunswick occupies as a lumbering province. The rocky heights, however, behind and around St. John make it look like a rock-bound city, and make the traveller fancy that the hinterland of such a town must necessarily be a wild and inhospitable sort of country. Nothing, however, could be further from the case. The scenery about the mouth of the St. John River may be what is styled 'romantic' in character, but further up it is the exact opposite, consisting of broad meadows and orchard lands.

The estuary of the River St. John forms the busy harbor of the city of the same name. It is one of the two winter ports of Canada used by the trans-Atlantic liners when the St. Lawrence navigation is closed; and being the terminus on this side of the Canadian Pacific Railway it is a direct connection with Montreal and the west. Here there are large immigration sheds, and all facilities for dealing with ocean traffic on a big scale. So rapidly has the traffic of the port increased that preparations are now being made for the opening up of an entirely new harbor on the northward side of the town.

The point where the St. John River may be said to flow into the estuary or harbor is a striking one; at that point it passes between lofty cliffs, and this imposing gorge, which is spanned by two steel bridges, is one of the features of St. John City. At this place may be seen the unique 'reversing falls,' where the water rushes upstream or downstream according as the tide is flowing or ebbing, while within a stone's throw of the falls is to be seen one of the largest pulp mills in Canada, a contrast between the picturesque and the industrial, which is typical of New Brunswick.

In this part of the valley is situated the charming City of Fredericton, the capital of the province. Fronting the river, which is here spanned by a long bridge, it is one of the most attractive of the cities of Eastern Canada. The Maritime Provinces have several such cities, which present something of the old-time colonial characters; and here and there Fredericton suggests former days.

The historically-minded of the town talk to the visitor of times when the citizens of Fredericton went about their business in stove-pipe hats and knee breeches, and tell him of a certain Rev. Jepposaphat Mountain (a sonorous name!) who was once a power in the place. Nowadays the city has fine streets of villa residences, together with the provincial parliament house and other public buildings.

Many visitors come here from other parts of the Dominion and from the eastern states, for New Brunswick is a great sporting domain. The healthiness of its climate is thus described in a spirited pamphlet dealing with the city: 'the death rate of Fredericton is so low as to be within the reach of all. It arises almost entirely from one or two causes—extreme old age or physical malady of some kind. In the case of government officials neither of these has any effect. The only thing that can happen to them is superannuation.'

The bustling, business spirit of modern Canada runs through New Brunswick as it does through Nova Scotia; and everywhere there is evidenced the commendable desire that the great attractions for the settler and the holiday-maker of this, one of the long-settled parts of the Dominion, shall not be allowed to be overlooked.

From St. John it is possible, as said, to sail upstream for 150 miles, that is to say, as far as the Town of Woodstock. A good steamboat service is maintained on the river during the summer, that on the lower 84 miles between Fredericton and St. John being a daily one, and the sail up the river in fine summer weather is without doubt one of the most enjoyable things of the kind which the American continent has to offer.

New Brunswickers are justly proud of the scenic attractions of their great river, beside which those of the Hudson River, so favored by New Yorkers, must take a decidedly second place. Going upstream, the steamer when it leaves the rocky environs of the City of St. John, passes into wide and winding expanses of water, bordered by steep pine-clad hills. These sheets of open water into which the river expands in various directions, are so wide as to give it a lake like appearance. For the first ten miles or so the river thus looks like one of the long Scotch lochs, such as Loch Awe, or like one of the English lakes, like Windermere. Thereafter the scenery of the river changes entirely, and for fifty miles or more it spreads out at its ease between stretches of fertile agricultural land.

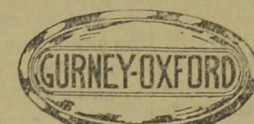
The district through which it passes between Fredericton and Gagetown is one of the most fertile parts of the province, and excellent land is to be seen on both sides. A great future awaits this district as a fruit-growing centre; and admirable orchards are to be seen at such places as Burton, which await but one thing, the labor of the diligent fruit-grower, to make them yield as copiously as any in Eastern Canada. Considering the climate and the qualities of the soil, land may be bought here, and indeed, throughout the whole St. John Valley, on very reasonable terms.

Above Fredericton the character of the St. John River changes somewhat. Wooded hills rise on each side, with fields running up the slopes, and a great similarity then presents itself between this stretch of the stream, and such Scotch rivers as the Dee and the Spey; indeed, a Scotchman might find a Fochabers or Craigellachie there without straining his imagination in the least.

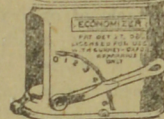

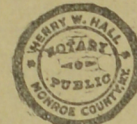
