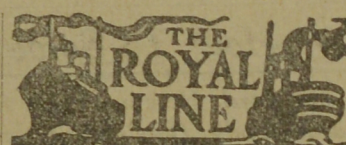

CANADIENS TO BE FINED—EXCEEDED SALARY LIMIT

Kennedy Admits Spending \$3,000 above Authorized Limit of \$5,000
—Other Clubs Made Complaint

(Montreal Star)
Great indignation is being expressed amongst the supporters of the Canadian Athletic Club, since the management has been quietly informed that a move is on foot to have a meeting called of the National Hockey Association of Canada, to have them heavily fined for exceeding the salary limit.

The limit is Five Thousand Dollars and it is charged that the Club has gone far beyond that.

KENNEDY'S STATEMENT

Mr. George Kennedy, managing director of the Club, was interviewed about the matter today, and said:

"Yes, I understand that it is the intention of certain clubs to ask President Quinn to fine us. I do not say that this is the result of jealousy because we are making such a fine showing, but I will leave the public, and particularly the special supporters of our team, to judge for themselves."

"Is it true that you have exceeded the salary limit?" he was asked.

OFFENSE ACKNOWLEDGED

At first he did not seem very anxious to reply, but finally he said:

"Well, I suppose so," and then he added defiantly, "and if some of the other clubs paid better salaries, and had paid better salaries from the first, the public would have seen better contests from the first of the season."

"What are you going to do about it?" he was asked.

The new directorate consists of President William A. Wilman, Reading, chairman; W. T. McCullough, Pittsburg, and Hugh MacKinnon, Washington.
