## STARTLING DISCLOSURES ARE EXPECTED

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. Messrs. Fisher, Graham, Murphy and King, will leave the capital tomorrow afternoon for Cornwall, where the opening meeting of Sir Wilfrid's tour of the older part of the province will be held tomorrow night. Hon. Sydney Fisher has joined the other ex-ministers for the week's series of meetings, and will speak especially on matters of interest to the agriculturists of Canada. Hon. George Graham will have more to say in regard to the really startling disclosures as to the present government's manipulation of the National Transcontinental Railway and the grade increases and deviations from original plans east of Cochrane now under way. Apparently the government, to serve temporary political ends and private railway interests, is deliberately departing from the real interests of the country and is nullifying the original plans to make the National Transcontinental an unrivalled through route for export grain and other commodities between the west and the seaboard.

It is worthy of note that no official denials as yet have been made by the government to the charges already made by Hon. Messrs. Graham and Murphy. When parliament meets a thorough investigation of these charges will be insisted upon by the opposition and some sensational developments may be expected.

The trade of Canada for the first third of the present fiscal year shows an increase of nearly \$80,000,000 or a little over 30 per cent. as compared with the corresponding four months of last year.

The total trade for the first four months of the present fiscal year was \$328,635,844, as compared with \$249,031,736 last year. Imports this year totalled \$210,766,457, an increase of \$47,907,509. Exports totalled \$117,870,387, an increase of \$31,697,599.

## ONE GLASS OF BEER IN A LIFETIME

(London Mail)  
Dr. Edgar Jones, who was believed to be the oldest doctor and the oldest magistrate in England, died Monday aged 102, at his residence in Great Burstead Essex. He has been a justice of the peace for sixty years and a member of the Royal College of Surgeons for seventy-eight years.

Until recently Dr. Jones enjoyed good health. His eyesight and hearing were remarkably good for his years. And his appetite too, was good. But of late his memory failed him and he seldom talked of the past. Occasionally when he was tired, he would look at the old-world house where he had lived for over sixty years and say with a sigh, "I want to go home."

In his youth he was sturdy sportsman and he was always fond of an outdoor life. At one time he hunted and played cricket a good deal. When over sixty he climbed Snowdon in an hour and twenty minutes descending and took some friends for a row on the lake. When over eighty he played tennis. Even after his ninetieth birthday he took his seat on the bench at intervals. And when he was a hundred he was still a good figure of a man, with broad shoulders, some what bent, and arms that showed still signs of their former power; and his cheeks still bore a healthy flush.

## SUGAR INSTEAD OF SALT

Always a non-smoker and an abstainer from alcoholic drinks, his advice to those who wished to live long was to follow his example in these two things. Also, he used to say, they should be cheerful and take exercise—his own favourite exercise was walking, and last summer he walked every day in his garden. Only once was known to drink a glass of beer, and that was in Vienna in 1863.

He lived simply. A year or two ago his daily meals read like those of a fifth form schoolboy. For breakfast he had tea, bread and butter, an boiled ham, and porridge with milk and cream; for mid-day dinner meat, vegetables, and milk or plum pudding; and for tea, bread and butter toast, with often a boiled egg. More recently he gave up taking salt and, instead, took sugar with everything—in his soup, with his eggs, and with his meat. He also took much cream—even with fish and chicken.

Other members of his family attained a ripe old age. His father died at the age of 94; his eldest brother and sister lived to be over 90; and another brother nearly 100.
