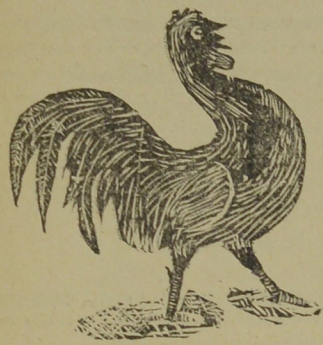

**RENFREW PAPER SCORES
MINISTER OF CUSTOMS**

Ottawa, Jan. 28.—The government seems to be determined to continue its policy of trying to keep Hon. G. P. Graham out of parliament this session, regardless of all principles of fair play and political decency. The last excuse offered for the non-issuing of the writ for South Renfrew, now delayed for nearly two months, is that it is desirable to have the by-election on the new lists, and, according to law, a period of sixty days must be allowed for revision. The technicality is, of course, a subterfuge, as there is no valid excuse for not holding the election on the lists used last September. The exploitation of machine politics in South Renfrew is in charge of Hon. J. D. Reid, who is supported by Hon. Frank Cochrane in the effort to keep Mr. Graham out of parliament at all costs. Their tactics are, however, of somewhat too gross a kind to be long successful.

LIBERALS MAY TAKE ACTION

Failing the issuing of the writ with out further delay, the Liberals in parliament promise to make things so uncomfortable for the government and especially, for the two ministers concerned, that they will soon be ready to capitulate. The blessing of a speedy prorogation, which the government now earnestly desires, will not be likely to materialize unless it shows a better disposition to play fair.

CONSERVATIVE'S JOURNAL'S VIEW

Meanwhile the real situation in South Renfrew is shown by the last issue of The Renfrew Journal, the Conservative paper in the ridiag. The Journal does not mince its language in its condemnation of the course of action of the men who are behind Dr. Maloney, the Conservative candidate, in defiance of the new famous agreement. It is especially caustic at the expense of Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Customs, saying in the report of the Minister's first speech at the Conservative convention on Friday week:—

"Dr. Reid closed his remarks with some cheap slaptrap about there being no family quarrel in the Conservative ranks in South Renfrew, and suggested that if the party followed his advice the quarrel would be in the Liberal ranks!"

A LOW APPEAL

Again, in regard to Dr. Reid's second speech, The Journal says under the heading "A Low Appeal from a Cabinet Minister:" "Dr. Reid then turned his attention to the good roads movement advocated by the Conservative Government at Ottawa, and the bald way that he handled this topic disgusted all decent men who look for something higher than this kind of talk from a Cabinet Minister. The burden of this part of Dr. Reid's speech was to the effect that South Renfrew should vote for Dr. Maloney and the Borden government would then spend money in this district for good roads, it was not as openly as that, and was throughout the sort of low, mercenary appeal that Conservatives fought against as disgraceful in the case of men like Pugsley. The latter, however, usually had the grace to respect his audience enough to put a little polish on the wholesale bribe."

DECENT PEOPLE KEEP THEIR WORD

And again: "The decent people of South Renfrew will decide to stand behind the men of their own riding rather than follow the dictation of three or four men from North Renfrew, with a twelve-year-old grudge to satisfy, and a meddling minister from Ottawa, whose standard of political ethics hardly reaches to that generally held by decent people in South Renfrew."

UP TO THE PREMIER

Editorially, The Renfrew Journal is most outspoken. After asserting that the honorable Conservatives will stand in honor by the agreement and again reviewing the situation arising out of the agreement and the breach thereof, The Journal says: "Because of these things—things that belittle and disgrace a great party—and because of the low plane of appeal adopted in Renfrew by the visiting Cabinet Minister, and because the people of South Renfrew are quite capable of attending to their own affairs. The Renfrew Journal would like to see Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden, not only as Premier of Canada, but also as leader of the honored Conservative party, show in no uncertain way that he and his Cabinet will not connect themselves in this affair, that savors of breach of honor and the flouting of political decency."

OPPOSED TO MACHINE POLITICS

The Journal says that as it in the past fought consistently in the Conservative interests against machine politics under Liberal manipulation, so it will now strenuously oppose the machine politics of Hon. Dr. Reid. "There is," it says, "an element that desires an election, not because of this candidate or that, but because of the money that inevitably seems to come their way during an election contest in South Renfrew. If this element believed that North Renfrew would send no funds for a fight, and that the Government at Ottawa would give no support of a financial kind, the cry for an election in these quarters would soon lessen to less than a whisper. Dr. Maloney would have been able to see; perhaps with more clearness of vision, if men from Ottawa and outsiders had not held out the hope of that embracing word, 'support' to incite and cheer the hungry element of the constituency."

GARBLED REPORTS

Finally, The Journal charges that the reports of the Conservative convention proceedings in Renfrew were deliberately garbled by the Conservative press. It says: "Every Conservative daily newspaper in Ontario seems to have received a garbled and misleading report of what occurred here on Friday, and the similarity of these reports suggests their origin. Conservative newspapers refused accurate and unbiased reports from regular or special correspondents, so it may be expected that the influence was strong. On the other hand, at least two Liberal daily papers published practically accurate reports, so that the influence of misstatement was not of the press itself, but of outside origin."

HON. MR. PEARSON DEAD

Mr. Pearson was born in this province fifty-six years ago. He was one of the greatest industrial promoters of Canada. In 1893, in conjunction with H. M. Whitney, of Boston, and other American capitalists, he organized the Dominion Coal Company, followed six years later by the Dominion Iron & Steel Company.

He promoted the Halifax Electric Tramway Company, and assisted in the organization of almost a score of traction and power companies in West Indies, Mexico and South America.

Until a year ago he was a member of the Nova Scotia government, but was defeated in the last provincial general election.

Mr. Pearson at one time owned a controlling interest in The St. John Sun.
