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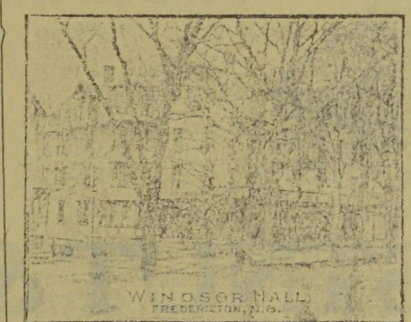

Most of us need a spell of loafing
 now and then, but few of us know
 how to loaf, writes Hildebrand Haw-
 thorne, in the Kansas City Star. In-
 deed, I don't think it would be at
 all a bad idea to hold classes in
 loafing all over this hustling coun-
 try of ours. It comes so hard to
 anyone who isn't born a loafer—and
 the born loafer doesn't count. He
 exaggerates what should be a recrea-
