## NOTED CLERGYMEN TO VISIT FREDERICTON

The Rev. Dr. Pollock, honorary  
principal of the Presbyterian College,  
Halifax, one of the most distinguish-  
ed theologians of this generation,  
will arrive in the city this evening,  
and will be the guest of Dr. and Mrs.  
Smith at the Manse. A son of the  
Manse in old Scotland, he remembers  
the booming of the guns that an-  
nounced the accession of William  
the Fourth to the throne. He was edu-  
cated at Glasgow University and  
holds the degree of Doctor of Divi-  
nity from Glasgow and Queens Uni-  
versity, Kingston, and the degree of  
Doctor of Laws from Dalhousie Uni-  
versity. Over sixty years ago he was  
ordained to the ministry at New  
Glasgow, Nova Scotia and his record  
of service has been conspicuous for  
its enthusiasm, breadth of vision and  
educational ability. In 1875 he was  
appointed to the Chair of Church  
History, Homiletics and Pastoral  
Theology in the Presbyterian College  
and upon the death of Dr. MacKnight  
was elected to the principalship. Since  
retiring from this position he  
continued to teach in the college. He  
was elected moderator of the General  
Assembly and in his studies in Prac-  
tical Theology has given one of the  
most valuable works yet produced.  
About a month ago the church cele-  
brated his diamond jubilee when gifts  
amounting to \$7,000 were presented  
to the college to commemorate his  
distinguished services.

Possessed of the keenest intellect  
and an inexhaustible fund of humor  
he is eagerly sought for at public  
functions. He comes to the city to  
address the men's banquet in St.  
Paul's church tomorrow night and  
will remain to give a popular lecture  
on Burns on Thursday night. He has  
not visited the city since the prin-  
cipal of Dr. Brooke.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 12—Stocks

cline appeared to be availing of the

The question of mediation has  
made another step forward in the  
announcement from Paris tonight  
that the Austrian government has  
agreed to join with the other powers  
in transmitting Turkey's request for  
mediation to the allies, inquiring on  
what terms the allies are disposed  
to accept mediation.

## POWERS ALIVE TO DANGER.

The revelation of the danger to  
European peace lying in the antagon-  
istic interests of Austria and Serbia  
appears to have quickened the sense  
of the powers, and probably of the  
Balkan States also to the imperative  
need of working in amicable co-opera-  
tion to secure a settlement of the  
Balkan problems acceptable to all  
the parties concerned.  
Another factor making for the  
speedy cessation of the war is the  
approach of severe winter conditions,  
which would give to the campaign an  
exceedingly arduous character.

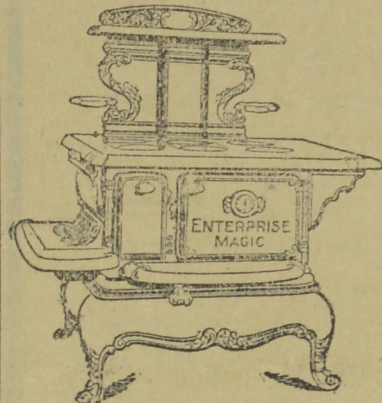
