







## TO FRAME CODE OF INTERNATIONAL LAW

Rio de Janeiro, June 26—The con-  
 ference of the international com-  
 mission of jurists, for which the  
 preliminary arrangements were made  
 at the Pan-American Conference of  
 last year, assembled in this city  
 today with delegates in attend-  
 ance from virtually all of the  
 American republics. The United  
 States has sent as its representa-  
 tive Frederick Van Dyne, assist-  
 ant solicitor of the Department of  
 State, and John Bassett Moore,  
 professor of international law the  
 diplomacy at Columbia University.  
 The conference is expected to  
 initiate the first formal code of  
 international law, to which all the  
 American states will subscribe,  
 and which eventually may become  
 the basis for the administration of  
 the great international tribunal for  
 which peace advocates have been  
 striving.



## STATUE OF FRANCIS BACON UNVEILED

London, June 27—A statue of  
 Francis Bacon, the eminent Eliza-  
 bethan scholar whom critics have de-  
 scribed as one of the greatest mas-  
 ters of prose in the English language  
 and the possessor of one of the great-  
 est intellects the world has ever pro-  
 duced, was unveiled today in South  
 Square, Gray's Inn, with which in-  
 stitution the career of the famous  
 scholar and lawyer is intimately con-  
 nected. The Rt. Hon. Arthur J. Bal-  
 four unveiled the memorial and de-  
 livered the oration in the presence of  
 a large throng that included many  
 persons of distinction.

TRAVERS TO RETAIN

 cording the desired permission.

## LOWER PRINCE WILLIAM.

June 20—This community lost one  
 of its best known and most univer-  
 sally esteemed residents a short time  
 ago in the person of Mr. Jared W.  
 Smith. He had not enjoyed good  
 health for some time but news of  
 his death came as a surprise and  
 caused widespread regret. He was  
 seventy-five years of age and is sur-  
 vived by a sorrowing widow and a  
 family of three daughters and four  
 sons. The children are Mrs. Robert  
 Graham, Mrs. William; Mrs. Amos  
 Jordan, Mrs. Arthur Jordan, Queens-  
 bury; Albert at home, and Har-  
 ford, D. A. and Asa in the United  
 States.

The deceased was a native of Wack-  
 ham, Queens County, but had resid-  
 ed here for fifty-five years. He was  
 the proprietor of the Prince William  
 House, the leading hostelry in this  
 section of the county, and was well  
 and favorably known to the traveling  
 public. A man of unblemished char-  
 acter, high integrity and sterling  
 honesty, he enjoyed the esteem of all  
 classes in the community. For many  
 years he was an active member of  
 the Baptist church and held the  
 office of deacon at the time of his  
 death.

## MICHIGAN U CELEBRATES

Ann Arbor, Mich., June 26—  
 With scores of distinguished educa-  
 tors and other guests in attend-  
 ance, the University of Michigan  
 today celebrated its diamond jubilee,  
 the exercises being commemorative  
 of the founding of the work  
 it has accomplished during the  
 seventy-five years of its existence.  
 The anniversary exercises were held  
 in a mammoth tent on the cam-  
 pus. The address of the day was  
 delivered by Lawrence Maxwell of  
 Cincinnati.

## ANOTHER MARRIAGE CASE

Montreal, Q., June 26—The court  
 of review judgment in the mar-  
 riage annulment case of Tremblay  
 and Despatis, in which the hus-  
 band seeks civil ratification of an  
 ecclesiastical decree declaring the  
 marriage null and void on the  
 ground of relationship, will not be  
 known this term. The parties  
 alleged to be fourth cousins, which  
 is an impediment from the point  
 of view of the Roman Catholic  
 Church, and the canonical  
 authorities of the diocese of  
 St. St. Hyacinthe, on the ap-  
 plication of the husband of  
 issued a decree annulling  
 the union. This was sub-  
 sequently upheld by Mr. Justice  
 Bruneau of the Superior Court of  
 the district of Sorel but the wife  
 took the matter to the Court of  
 Review before which it was argued  
 at length this week.
