### BOMBARDIER WELLS A REAL BRITISH INSTITUTION

Is Hero to English People and Differs  
from Mitchell in Point of Popu-  
larity Abroad

Bombardier Wells, who boxes Albert Falzer in Madison Square Garden next Friday night is the first heavyweight champion of England to visit this country since the famous Charley Mitchell was stopped in three rounds by James J. Corbett at Jacksonville, in 1894. Mitchell was more of a fat man than a well trained heavyweight on the occasion and wasn't able to put up much resistance. Mitchell had a way about him that seemed to rule American sporting men for he became extremely unpopular on this side of the Atlantic.

But Wells is Mitchell's opposite in many ways. In the first place he is a real heavyweight in point of size and avoirdupois. He stands 6 feet 4 inches tall and tips the beam at 195 pounds in fighting trim. He is light haired, blue eyed and good looking possessing unusual intelligence for a fighter and a pleasant disposition. Wells, in the language of the short haired fraternity, "is too nice to be in the ring." There is nothing of the brute or the tough mug in his makeup. He dresses with excellent taste, talks well and lives cleanly, but his one thought is boxing for big money.

Wells is a boxer of considerable skill, we are told by the English boxing critics, but he is not a slugger. He has shown much shifty footwork up at Rye and a rapid fire attack with both hands. But whether he can stand grueling punishment or not remains to be seen.

Falzer intends to find out readily just how much Wells can stand while under a heavy fire. With perhaps twenty pounds the better of the weights and a wonderful physique Falzer will carry the fight to the British titleholder from the jump. The American is a fierce rusher a terrific hitter and cares nothing for a rival's blow.

Wells' only chance to win is on points, because nobody believes he can punch hard enough to keep Falzer off. Ring followers who have watched both men at their training quarters seem to believe that Falzer's aggressiveness and remarkable strength will win the battle and for that reason he is a strong favorite. The manager of the bout believes that the gate receipts will reach the \$40,000 mark and that a record breaking crowd will be on hand.

Some of the critics predicted the first of the season that the Cincinnati Reds would curl up and wither about July 4, and Hank O'Day will have to keep his hired men on their toes or the critics will win.

## BILLY QUEAL WINS THE FIVE MILE RACE BY HUNDRED YARDS

Sensational Sprint in Final Lap Gives  
Crack American Athlete the Race  
--Longboat Participates

Coming within seven seconds of Alf Shrubbs' grand mark of 24.32 for five miles, Billy Queal, the professional galloped of Alexandra Bay, N.Y., captured the feature event at the Island Saturday night, when he defeated Tom Longboat and Ted Woods in a terrific contest before fully twelve thousand spectators. It was the largest crowd that has ever witnessed a professional distance running race in Toronto, and Queal's victory came as a decided surprise over such sterling runners as Longboat and Woods. The Yankee crack, however, deserved his win, he setting the race for three-quarters of the way and running a grand race throughout. His sprint in the final hundred was a wonderful effort, enabling him to beat Wood by a yard to the tape. Longboat, though he performed in excellent style, did not seem to possess the speed of the other pair, failing to hold the final spurt and finishing a hundred yards back of the winner.

### LONGBOAT HADN'T THE SPEED.

While the failure of Alf Shrubbs to start cut the field down to three runners, the excitement was not diminished in the least. The terrific pace cut out by Wood from the start kept the crowd on edge, and as mile after mile was reeled off at a record breaking speed, the crowd enthused over the contest and the yells for the runners to break the old record increased as Wood and Queal went out in a grand effort in the final lap. Longboat faltered 300 yards from home and finished with difficulty. Queal was fresh as a daisy, as was Wood. The Indian labored from the third mile, and it was the opinion of many that the distance was too short for him.

### PRELIMINARIES WERE GOOD.

Considerable excitement was caused when the ten mile relay race was put on, the Hawk Brothers team winning from Meadows and O'Brien, with Roe and Sellen finishing third. It was a warm contest, the Indian team showing the way, or the better part of the route. Cully won the base running contest from a large field, his time being 14 2-5 for the four laps around the infield. Paddy was second. Owing to the fact that Charlie Querrie injured his knee in the match Saturday afternoon, his race with Tom Longboat was called off.

### TEN MILE RELAY.

It has been decided to put on a ten mile relay race at the island the night of July 1st. Tom Longboat has gone to Nova Scotia, but Billy Queal and Ted Woods will select partners from the fast men who ran in Saturday night's Canadian relay race, and will run against the Indian team which won. Other teams will be formed and put in. The preliminary card follows:

Half mile ladies' walk.  
One mile walk, open.  
One mile relay for relay teams from the Senior City Baseball Leagues, a mile handicap run.  
Entries will be received by Harry Rosenthal, 11 Richmond street west, up to Tuesday night. Substantial cash prizes will be put up.

### FRANK PATCH WINS RACE

A Halifax despatch has the following:

The brown stallion Frank Patch won the match race for \$1,000 a side today defeating the bay horse Gallagher in three straight heats. The winning horse is the property of James Adams, of Halifax and Gallagher is owned by L. R. Acker also of Halifax.

Last year of these horses defeated the other at St. John and Moncton, and the match race today was to finally decide the question of superiority.

In the first heat Gallagher showed good form for three eighths of a mile, after that he seemed to slow up, and in the succeeding heats he showed no speed. Frank Patch went the first half of the first heat in 1.07, the mile in 2.18, his best time.

Gallagher, a Canadian bred horse, has campaigned in the United States England, the European continent. He has a record of 2.04, but today he showed with his thirteen years of age that he had not the vigorous condition which was purchased by the owner in the United States three years ago. The time in the other heats was 2.21 and 2.22.

In the first heat Patch beat Gallagher by sixty yards.

### EXPECTS JOHNSON TO WEIGH 212 LBS. BY JULY 4th

Tom Flanagan in a special to the Montreal Daily Star says:

I feel confident that I have seen enough of Champion Jack Johnson in action to issue the statement that he is still as good as ever. Johnson is not underrating Jim Flynn whom he meets in Las Vegas, July fourth. The Champion will never be caught napping by any foe. He is too clever and too crafty to ever step into a ring without preparing faithfully and when the time comes that he must surrender the championship it will only be because he is in the clutches of father time too old to fight a good battle. Johnson's weight is stationary at 217 pounds. Where originally I counted upon putting him into the ring July fourth weighing 215 pounds, I now anticipate having him at the 212 notch, that is about ten pounds more than he weighed when he faced Jeffries in Reno. Johnson has simply put on some extra beef in the last two years, it is not because he is "fatter" than he was in Reno, it is simply because the extra weight has come with him again in the two years. Johnson's present form suits me and I am confident he will be in the best condition possible for the fight.

### FOR CENTRAL A.A.U. TITLE

Chicago, June 27--The annual track and field championships of the Central Association, A.A.U., will be held Saturday on Northwestern field at Evanston. Many star athletes representing universities, colleges, high schools and athletic clubs in the middle West are expected to compete.

There will be thirteen events on the day's programme, which will be run off in the following order: 120-yard hurdle, trial heats; 100-yard dash, trial heats; one-mile run, 440-yard run, 100-yard dash, final; 120-yard hurdles, final; 220-yard dash, trials; 220-yard low hurdles, trials; 380-yard run, 220-yard dash, final; two-mile run, 220-yard low hurdles, final and one mile open relay race. The field events will be put on simultaneously with the track contests, the running high-jump, pole vault, shot put and running broad jump being the order of competition.

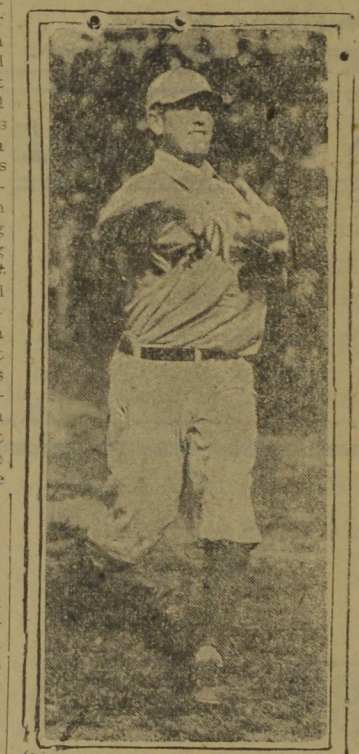

The Chases have been married about three years, and have had two children, one of whom died suddenly. Mr. and Mrs. Chase met while he was playing an exhibition game in New Jersey. Since the marriage, Mrs. Chase has never missed a game on the home grounds. She and the baby were always to be found in a box near the first base line. It is said that she will deny all of her husband's charges, attributing the trouble to jealousy by him.
