NATION-WIDE PLAN TO IMPROVE HOUSING

(Toronto Globe)

A plan for organizing a National Housing Association of Canada had its birth yesterday at a joint meeting of the Executive of the Housing Committee of Hamilton and representatives of the Directors' Board of the Toronto Housing Company held in the Commercial Club at Hamilton where those attending were the guests of President Woods of the Hamilton Board of Trade.

For the purpose of discussing this matter a provisional committee was formed with Mr. G. Frank Beer, President of the company as convener, Mr. W. S. B. Armstrong its Secretary at the meeting and Mr. Corrigals of the Hamilton organization was appointed provisional treasurer.

Plans were formed for the holding of a housing conference in the fall, to which all the cities of the Dominion and of Newfoundland and their Labor Councils will be invited to send delegates, while many of the leading experts on housing questions in Germany, Great Britain and the United States will be asked to attend as speakers.

The work of the association as projected is to be largely of an educational character, and it is hoped that it will be found useful as an advisory body to local housing committees.

FOR HOUSING REFORM

Chairman Woods in an address expressed the hope that this organization might materially assist in the great work of housing reform in Canada and gave it as his view that facing this problem now might help to forestall much of the evil from which older countries suffer.

The immediate task of the provisional committee will be the drawing up of a program for the proposed convention, and the sending out of announcements and invitations to all the cities concerned.

THIS DATE IN HISTORY

JUNE 27

1696—William Pepperrell, who led the expedition against Louisbourg in 1745 and was the first American to be created a baronet of Gt. Britain, born in Kittery, Me. Died there July 6, 1759.

1863—Kingston, 13 miles from Harrisburg, entered by the advance of the Confederate forces under Gen. Ewell.

1876—Harriet Martineau, noted historian died. Born June 12, 1802.

1911—Joseph Caillaux became prime minister of France.

ANCIENTS TO VISIT ENGLAND

Boston, Mass., June 27—The entire membership of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts, the oldest and most famous military organization in America, will sail from Boston early in the coming week for a visit to land. During their stay on the other side the Massachusetts men will be entertained by the Honourable Artillery Company of London, which organization paid a similar visit to Boston some years ago. The Americans will be received by King George at Buckingham Palace and a banquet in their honor will be given in the famous Armory House at Finsbury, the home of the London organization. Before returning home the Boston Ancients will visit Windsor and place a tablet on the birthplace of the first commander of the company, Captain Richard -eayne.

HON. MR. COCHRANE STILL MAKING TRIPS

Montreal, June 23—Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways and Canals, is about to undertake another trip. After going to Prince Rupert, the Minister will return East, and from the Lake of the Woods will make a trip by canoe journey, some five hundred miles, to the Hudson Bay, where he will visit Churchill and Nelson, as well as Nottawa, on the James Bay, as the Minister will have to decide soon the location of a terminal port for the Railway now being built by J. D. McArthur, and which will be completed to either Churchill or Nelson, in two years. The Minister will also visit Nottawa, on the James Bay, as he has subsidized a railway from that point to the Transcontinental, and on to Montreal, 500 miles in length.

The Minister of Railways will, on arrival at the Bay meet the steamer which sails from Montreal the fifth of August, returning to this port during the early days of September. On the second of July Mr. Hazen and some twenty-five men from the same department will leave here for the Bay, and by the time their chief arrives, these engineers will have already secured data of great value, which will enable them and the Department to decide the proper solution of this much debatable question, viz., the proper terminus of the Hudson Bay Railway.

No sorrow will he know.

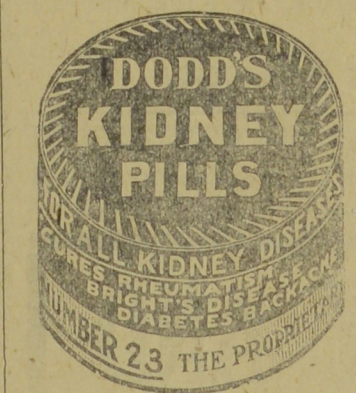
For three long suffering years
