CLASSICAL MASTER
OF HIGH SCHOOL**

Was Appointed by Trustees Yesterday to Succeed Mr. C. M. Lawson Resigned—Miss Taylor Succeeds Miss McAdam

**OTHER BUSINESS TRANSACTED
AT MONTHLY MEETING**

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held yesterday when several matters of importance engaged the attention of the members. Dr. Atherton, chairman, presided and among the others presented Mrs. Clark, Mrs. Lynch, Mr. Sterling, Mr. Weddall, Mr. Sharkey, Mr. Spurden, Dr. VanWart, and Secretary Sampson.

The formal resignation of Mr. Lawson, classical master in the High School was received and after consideration it was accepted. It is understood that several schools were open to Mr. Lawson with larger salary. Applications for position on the School staff were not numerous, and after a discussion of the situation the Board selected as classical master Mr. John E. Page, who for several years has been principal of the Model School, a position well filled by him, is a successful graduate in arts of the U. N. B. and all along has been delving in classical lore.

Miss Gwendoline McAdam, after a successful year teaching grades VII and VIII in York Street School has tendered her resignation and will shortly leave for Alberta to assume charge of an important school in a town sixty miles north of Calgary. Several applications for this position were read and the Trustees finally filled the vacancy by the appointment of Miss Annie L. Taylor, who the past term has been in charge of 2nd department York Street School, during leave of absence of Miss Everett. For several years previously Miss Taylor was one of the successful teachers in Charlotte St. School, and she has now accepted the appointment to York St. School.

The Secretary at a previous meeting was instructed to ask all the teachers to report for the information of the Board, the time allotted to physical drill in their respective schools. This officer was only able to submit a reply from fifty per cent. of the teachers, much to the surprise of the Trustees. A full report is immediately required. The departments teaching this drill usually give from five to ten minutes a day to this important work. Where it is carefully imparted a most marked improvement in the 'make-up' of the pupils is noticed.

At the last meeting Mr. Sterling and Mr. Weddall were appointed to represent the Board on the managing committee of Old Home Week. Mr. Sterling reported that Prof. Harrison was arranging for the music at the celebration and Mr. Sampson will work with the committee in the effort to make the children's parade the best ever. While many of the children will probably be absent from home and not as easily reached as when schools are in session, the Secretary expects a big gathering, and in the ranks will be representatives from Gibson, Marysville, St. Mary's and other outside centres.

After arranging committees to plan for repairs at the several schools, and the passing of a number of accounts, the meeting adjourned.
