## LARGER MARKETS WANTED

We hear a lot about immigration these days and Boards of Trade and other public bodies seem to be imbued with the idea that if we are successful in inducing a goodly number of people from the old country to locate in New Brunswick prosperity will be assured. We are told that our vacant farms should be filled up, and in order to do this it is only necessary to make our attractions known to the people on the other side of the water. The idea has certainly much to commend it, but why should all our energies be devoted to securing immigrants? Why not make an effort to find out why there are so many vacant farms in New Brunswick and apply a remedy? The class of people whom we most desire from the old country, those who are not objects of charity, are not likely to buy a pig in a bag. If it is represented to them that we have vacant farms, curiosity might prompt them to ask why the farms are vacant. If our own people, cannot make a success of farming under the conditions which prevail here, how is the average man from across the water going to make a fortune out of it? The whole trouble seems to be due to the fact that we have a restricted market for farm produce. This is the reason why we have vacant farms and no amount of immigration talk can alter the situation. The golden opportunity to secure a larger market was presented to us in September last when the people were asked to ratify a trade agreement with the great American republic. The Tory flag-flappers, whose sole object was to get next the public trough, succeeded by the employment of the most disgraceful methods in fooling a majority of the people into voting against a policy which would have brought more real prosperity to New Brunswick than all the immigrants we can get in the next one hundred years. Now we find the very men who told the farmers that reciprocity would destroy their home market and therefore should be rejected, going about advocating an immigration policy which if successful will be the means of giving the farmers of New Brunswick increased competition in a market already restricted. The more farmers we have the more urgent will be the demand for larger markets and the day will surely come when our Tory friends who are now so anxious to have immigrants take up our vacant farms, will be hoisted by their own petard. Immigrants have been pouring into the west by thousands during recent years; the output of grain has greatly increased and the result has been a loud outcry for improved transportation facilities and larger markets. The same thing will happen in New Brunswick if we are successful in securing any great number of settlers. Already we have made arrangements to improve transportation facilities, and if we prosper as we deserve to prosper in the future we must have larger markets. Hay and potatoes are commodities grown on every New Brunswick farm. They cannot be sold in the old country and therefore one must depend on the upper provinces and New England States for a market. There is little profit for the farmer in a long haul and unquestionably it would be manifestly to the advantage of the New Brunswick farmer if he were given access to the near markets of the New England States and let the farmers of Michigan dispose of their surplus products in the to them near markets of Ontario.

Let people of both political parties unite in carrying out a vigorous immigration policy and let them unite in a demand for free access to the great markets of the New England States. If we get the immigrants we will need the larger market and we will need it badly. If we all stand up loyally for the interests of New Brunswick, in future we must work for the removal of tariff barriers that now keep us from trading in our natural market.

## NINETEEN PEOPLE CONDEMNED TO DEATH

Salonika, Jan. 22—Court martial, which is sitting with closed doors at Istib, about ninety miles north of here, has condemned to death eight Bulgarians, two Jews, three gypsies and six Turks in connection with the bomb outrage which was perpetrated early in December, in the Village Mosque, causing the death of twelve persons. For an entire week after the crime the place was in a state of anarchy, the Turks avenging the outrage on the Bulgarians, of whom they killed and wounded a large number.

## SOME FRACTIONAL DECLINES IN STOCK MARKET TODAY

New York, N. Y., Jan. 22—At the opening the market was active with some irregularity but a firm tone. A continuance of profit taking noted on Saturday was in evidence but sales were absorbed without difficulty. On reports that Interboro Company had decided to accept city's terms and that definite announcement to that effect would be made in the near future the Interboro Metropolitan stocks, were strong and active. In United States and Union Pacific there were fractional declines in initial transactions, but Reading started unchanged and gained  $\frac{1}{2}$  on the next few sales. The Street was helped by belief that Anthracite Companies would consent to an increase of wages of miners and that this would furnish a basis of settlement of existing labor difficulties. There was an opening gain of  $\frac{1}{2}$  in Denver Pfd and Great Northern and Northern Pacific started at fractional advances from which bulls argued that reports current of a change of conditions of Western Pacific were well founded.

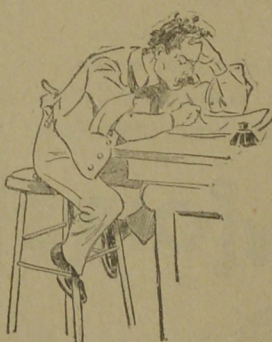
