MISS GRIGSBY'S ART OBJECTS TO BE SOLD

New York, Jan. 20.—The treasures of art which fill the Park avenue mansion presented by the late Charles T. Yerkes to his ward, Miss Emilie B. Grigsby, whose interesting social endeavors in the newspaper, art to be sold at public auction next week. The sale which will be commenced Monday under the auspices of the Anderson company, will probably exceed \$1,000,000 in receipts, and beyond question will be one of the most important dispersals of artistic property ever conducted in the United States.

Art dealers have called Miss Grigsby discrimination. With a fortune at her command the young woman, whose career dimmed the most lured imaginations of the fictionists, exercised her taste and judgement in filling the big graystone house at Park avenue and Seventh-seventh street with priceless draperies, furniture, paintings, sculptures, tapestries and rare books. Critics have pronounced the modest appearing house, in its interior, to be one of the most splendid in America.

There are a great many handsome things in the house, some beautiful old oaks, including rugs and tapestries, everything is expensive, and the general effect shows a florid taste which has been catered to with a lavish hand. The wall and ceiling decorations of the drawing room, which feature in beautiful delicate tones, are by Albert Hertel, exquisite scenes from the Nibelungen Lied, and on the other are on canvas they will be sold with the other furnishings of the room. These are gorgeous in wonderful modern carving, a magnificent sofa, covered with gold leaf, and whose very beautiful and elaborate workmanship would frighten any but a very rash visitor from sitting upon it. There is a grand piano with more carvings on musical and conventional designs, also covered with gold leaf.

Another interesting feature of the drawing room is an ivory chair, the entire framework covered with applied ivory carvings. In the same room are to be seen Miss Grigsby's interesting collection of jade and several cabinets filled with rare objects of art. In one cabinet is a collection of watches and in another a collection of historical furs.

The library occupies a large portion of the second floor of the mansion. The furniture is of heavy carved wood. The big andirons in the fireplace in this room were on the property of Francis Coppee, and a big hanging lamp was the property of a Roman Cardinal. There are several moans among the old silver pieces and in a case is a beautiful triptych of Limoges enamel, scenes in the life of Queen Anne, and another in ivory carvings shows scenes from the Passion. The library consists of 11,000 rare editions, first editions, and "special process." One rare and fine copy of Shakespeare cost Miss Grigsby \$12,000.

The collection of miniatures, watches and jewels is said to be one of the finest in America. Then there is a collection of embroidery, including a choice piece done on a small hide or leather coat, about the size of a man's waistcoat. This is supposed to have been brought from Spain by Cortez and by him presented to the little son of Montezuma, who wore it as an armor.

In the art gallery there are two fine examples of Rubens and many

other paintings of merit. In one of the sleeping is a bed of exquisite carving which, with the furniture, came from one of the palaces of the old Doges of Venice. On the wall hangs an autograph portrait of Pope Leo XIII., attached to which is the papal plenary indulgence granted to Miss Grigsby and her heirs to the thirteenth generation. Beneath this is a golden locket containing a lock of Pope Leo's hair.

The sale of the objects alone will occupy an entire week. When this is concluded the sale of the books will be begun. Everything will go under the hammer of the auctioneer, excepting a life-size portrait of Miss Grigsby by herself and the presentation portrait of Pope Leo. When all has been disposed of, Miss Grigsby will quit America—forever, as she says. Regarding her plans for the future she is extremely recent. All that is known that will make her home abroad, probably in London, where where she possesses a dwelling in the fashionable West End fitted in keeping with the New York home she is about to abandon.

INTERESTING DECISION

RE LEGAL PROCEDURE

Before Justice Barry in Chambers on Saturday, an interesting question of practice, under the Judicature Act arising in the case of Gunns Limited vs. J. Frank Duguay and others was argued and judgment delivered by His Honor.

The action is one brought by the Plaintiff and assignee of a Bail Bond against the defendants as principal securities, for the amount of the debt. An application was made by defendants to set aside the writ and service on the ground, amongst others that the writ was not endorsed for debt and costs etc., as required by order 3 Rule 7 of the Rules of the Court.

The Judge after hearing counsel held that this was necessary and ordered the writ and service to be set aside, with costs.

The Counsel engaged in the case were Mr. R. B. Hanson and Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C.

SHOT NIECE, THEN SUICIDED

Tacoma, Jan. 22.—T.B. Nef, a young rancher, accidentally shot and killed his 12-year-old niece, Annabel Bond, while hunting rabbits near here today. Overcome by remorse, he wrote a note to his sister, explaining the tragedy and committed suicide by swallowing strychnine.
