ADVOCATES COURTS FOR JUVENILES AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS

Commissioner Rees of Salvation Army Gives Mayor Thomas Some Interesting Information on the Subject

LARGELY ATTENDED MEETINGS ON SUNDAY

Commissioner Rees of the Salvation Army in Canada, addressed two largely attended meetings in the City Opera House yesterday, in addition to taking part in a service at the Army barracks in the morning. The afternoon service was for the public, the Commissioner giving a most interesting account of the beginning of the Salvation Army's work and the difficulties which were encountered by the organization in its early days. Last night the meeting at the Opera House was of the nature of a regular Salvation Army service, with Commissioner Rees the principal speaker.

ACTIVE TODAY.

This morning the Commissioner accompanied by Captain Howland of the local corps, visited His Worship Mayor Thomas at his office in the City Hall and this afternoon at 2:30 conferred with the council of the Board of Trade concerning immigration matters, the conference taking place at the City Hall. It is expected that the efforts of the Salvation Army's Immigration Department in the future will be directed more than in the past toward inducing immigrants to come to this province.

JUVENILE OFFENDERS.

Commissioner Rees was able to give Mayor Thomas some interesting information concerning juvenile courts and their workings and the closely allied institutions, industrial schools. Increase in juvenile crime in Fredericton within the past year has called attention in a most emphatic manner to the necessity of both juvenile courts and industrial schools. Commissioner Rees mentioned the fact that in many Canadian cities officers of the Salvation Army had been given powers of constables as far as juvenile offenders were concerned and that the system had worked much better than when the police had handled such work. He was strongly in favor of industrial schools, stating that they were able to reach a class of children who were untouched by the ordinary public schools.

SUNDAY'S MEETINGS.

Hon. H. F. McLeod presided at the meeting yesterday afternoon at the Opera House and introduced the speaker of the afternoon, commenting particularly upon the value of the Salvation Army as an immigration organization. At the close of the Commissioner's very interesting address a vote of thanks was proposed by Judge Wilson. The Commissioner proved himself an interesting and forceful speaker. During the course of his remarks at the evening service he mentioned that he had visited Fredericton twenty-one years ago. Commissioner Rees will leave this evening for Montreal.

CATHEDRAL CONGREGATION DISAPPROVES

Intention of Bishop Richardson to Change Place of Residence to St. John Discussed at Meeting Last Night

DEVELOPEMENTS ARE EXPECTED TONIGHT

It is understood however, that disapproval of the intention of His Lordship was very plainly expressed by several of those present.

CUT OF BANK LOGS EXPECTED TO BE UP TO AVERAGE

Large Amount now Contracted for and Prices are Fairly Good—Good Demand for Lath—Some Small Mills now Sawing

PROSPECT GOOD FOR IMPROVEMENT IN MARKET

The cut of bank-logs along the St. John River this winter is expected to be up to the average in size but the general cut will be less than usual on account of unfavorable market conditions. The latter however are showing signs of improvement and millmen are taking a more optimistic view of matters. So far the lumbering season has been favorable to the operators as wages for men and teams have been lower than for several years past.

BANK LOGS

The cut of bank-logs it is estimated, will amount to 8,000,000 to 10,000,000 feet, about the average amount. Part of this cut already has been contracted for. The price offering for bank-logs is for spruce, \$13.00 for deal logs and \$9.00 and \$10.00 for battens according to length.

DEMAND FOR LATH

A steady demand for lath is reported the American market the American market being firm. The ruling price is \$2.50 per thousand. A few small mills in the province are sawing lath. On the United States side of the St. John River some mills are sawing shingles for their own market. A steady demand is reported. The majority of the mills of the province are down, however.

PULP WOOD HIGHER

Peeled spruce for pulp-wood is selling at \$5.00 per cord 50 cents more than was offering last season. The United States takes the greater part of this raw product. A large trade of this being done on the Upper St. John American mills buying it.

Scottish steel makers have lodged an application with the board of conciliation and arbitration for a reduction of workers' wages by 2 1/2 per cent. Meetings of the employees are to be held to consider the situation.
