DUKE OF CONNAUGHT VISITS RAILWAY TOWN

Moncton, N. B., July 28—Moncton was in gala and holiday attire Saturday afternoon in honor of the Duke of Connaught, governor-general of Canada. The memorable occasion was marked by a large turnout of citizens to extend a welcome to the royal visitors. Flags and bunting were displayed, especially on Main street and streets along which the governor and party were driven. A special train bearing the governor and party arrived from Point du Chene sharp on scheduled time, 3.30 o'clock, and a royal salute was fired by the 19th Field Battery, under command of Major S. A. Anderson. The royal party consisting of the Duke of Connaught, Princess Patricia, Miss Adams, lady in waiting; Col. Lowther, military secretary; Hon. Lieut. A. Ramsay, aide-de-camp, and Capt. T. Rivers Bulkeley, equerry and controller, were accompanied from Point du Chene by R. S. Barker, private secretary to Lieut-Governor Wood; D. Pottinger, F. P. Brady, of the L.C.R. board of management. They were met at the depot by Lieut-Governor Wood, Mayor F. C. Robinson, and a military escort under command of Capt. W. A. McKee saluted.

The royal visitors were then escorted to barouches and driven to Bend View Square. The order of the procession was as follows: Chief Rideout, mounted; first barouche containing Sheriff Willett, F. P. Brady, D. Pottinger; second barouche, Mayor Robinson, Aids. Price, Nickerson, Humphrey; third barouche, Aids. Forbes, Goss, Fryers, Tucker; fourth barouche, Lieut-Gov. Wood, R. S. Barker, Major F. B. Black, aide de camp to the lieutenant-governor; mounted bodyguard under command of Capt. W. A. McKee; fifth barouche, Miss Adams, lady in waiting; Col. Lowther, Capt. T. Rivers Bulkeley; sixth barouche, Governor-General, Princess Patricia, Hon. Lt. A. Ramsay, aide de camp.

Thousands waited the arrival of the visitors at Bend View Square, where the National Anthem greeted His Royal Highness as he alighted from barouche.

The Duke, with Lieut-Governor Wood and Princess Patricia, escorted by Mayor Robinson, led the way to the band stand, where Mayor Robinson extended a welcome to the royal visitors and read the civic address, to which the Duke replied briefly. Mayor Robinson then presented the following, who were in the stand:

NEWS FORECAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., July 27—President Taft will be officially notified of his nomination at the White House on Thursday. According to present plans, Mr. Taft will receive the notification committee on the rear portico of the executive mansion, which overlooks the ellipse. He will speak from the portico, with the committeemen grouped about him on the lawn. The President will probably leave for his summer home at Beverly immediately after the notification meeting.

State conventions of the Progressive party during the week will include the following: Montana, at Helena; New Mexico, at Albuquerque; Louisiana, at New Orleans; Arkansas, at Little Rock; Illinois, at Chicago; Tennessee, at Nashville; Colorado, at Denver; Indiana, at Indianapolis; Virginia, at Roanoke; Minnesota, at St. Paul; Missouri, at Kansas City; Connecticut, at New Haven.

Governor Woodrow Wilson, the presidential nominee of the Democratic party, expects to continue at his summer home, at Sea Girt during the week, receiving visits from the party leaders, and putting the finishing touches to his notification address.

Republicans and Democrats of Nebraska, in accordance with the primary law, will hold their state conventions Tuesday, the former meeting at Lincoln and the latter at Grand Island. As the nominations were made in the primaries the work of the convention will be confined principally to the adoption of the party platforms. The rivalry of the two factions in the Republican party is expected to cause a lively convention.

Five aspirants are contesting for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in Tennessee, which will be settled in a state primary Thursday. Former Governor Benton Millin is among those who aspire to head the state ticket.

Democrats of Kentucky, will select their candidates for representatives in Congress in the state-wide primary to be held Saturday.

A state "assembly" of the Republicans of Colorado will be held in Denver Wednesday to nominate presidential electors and select the names to be placed on the primary ballot. The state assemblies are a new feature in Colorado politics. In some ways they correspond to the old state conventions, but they are designed to eliminate the bitter contests that frequently marked the conventions. The assemblies take only one ballot on candidates for each office to be filled and anyone receiving ten per cent. of the total vote in the assembly is entitled to have his or her name on the primary ballot.

A notable conference for the discussion of modern journalism, its ideals, trend and its existing condition, is to assemble at the University of Wisconsin Monday. The conference has scheduled prominent speakers, among them being Melville E. Stone, William J. Bryan, William Allen White, Norman Hargood, Chas. H. Grasty of Baltimore, and Fremont Older of San Francisco.

A WASHINGTON GHOST LADY'S THRILLING STORY

London, July 26—From his diary, under date of October, 1890, Sir Henry Lucy quotes in The Cornhill Magazine a remarkable ghost story which was told to him by a "lady bearing a name highly honored in the United States. The incident happened some years previously. The lady was in Washington at a time when Congress was sitting and all the hotels were full. On applying for a room at the hotel where she was accustomed to patronize with her husband she was told that the house was full. After some hesitation the clerk, observing her distress, undertook that a room should be got ready for her. It was a small, plainly furnished room on the sixth floor. She went to bed early and slept soundly until she was awakened by the sensation of a hand touching her face and a voice which cried with a piteous accent: "Oh, mother, mother." She was profoundly startled but arguing with herself that it was only a dream, went to sleep again. Again she was awakened by a hand that nervously stroked her face and the blood-curdling cry: "Oh, mother, mother." She got up and lit a candle. A chambermaid came with a startled look. The visitor related her experience.

"Yes, ma'am," said the chambermaid. "I told them they ought not to have put you in the room. He was only carried out an hour before you came."

"Who was carried out?" asked the lady.

"Why, the young man who was lying here for a fortnight in delirium tremens, and died a couple of days ago. He was always stretching out his hands, feeling for something and crying, 'Oh, mother, mother.'"
