Racing on the last day was just as spirited as it had been on the others and about 4000 persons enjoyed it. The favorite in the first race, Annie Kohl, was distanced right off the reel and the choice in the next, Our Colonel, won a heat and then fell off to nothing. The free for all trot went to the one that had been picked, Billy Burk, because the others did not amount to much. Babe, the good thing from the Bush League, won the fourth race after a gruelling struggle with Molly Darling.

There is some suspicion as to the form reversal on the part of Our Colonel, but nothing more than that, the best horses winning in the other races.

ZARRINE WON.

In making Annie Kohl favorite in the 2:18 trot, the wise ones overlooked Zarrine, which won a week ago and looked like a trotter. Before they had reached the bend, Annie Kohl broke, Alta Coast being in the lead with Mae Cassidy and Queen Lake close up. They dashed into a gale of wind on the back stretch which slowed them considerably. Macey had been taking advantage of the wind-shield and at the three-quarters he began to move up with Zarrine, catching Mae Cassidy in the stretch and beating her as he pleased.

Annie Kohl had had an accident with her harness which caused her to hit the sulky so that she would not trot, being distanced.

Celestine and Queen Lake made the early pace in the next heat until Queen Lake jumped at the half. Zarrine then moved up to second and led in the stretch, Macey giving her a mild drive to stand off John W. Davis.

Zarrine led all the way in the third heat, Victor Star finishing a good second, very little use having been made of him in the other heats.

TALENT BUMPED.

In the second race Our Colonel, which won on Monday, was about two to one over the field and in the first heat led all the way, finishing very easy with Rivard second. Next time, Our Colonel broke on the first turn and again at the half, Clara Paul being in front from the quarter to the finish. The third and fourth heats were about the same, Our Colonel breaking in each of them and Pennock's mare, Calara Paul making the pace and winning in slow time for the class.

FREE-FOR-ALL.

Billy Burk did not have much opposition in the speculation before the free-for-all trot, and he had the race all to himself. Gold Dollar looked to be the one to make him step along, but that horse broke soon after the word, running nearly all the mile and not even finishing. Billy Burk stepped into the lead and nothing was near enough to him to cause McDonald any alarm. He came the last half in 1:01½ and the last quarter in 30½ seconds, with Don Labor nearest to him.

Grace went after Billy Burk in the second heat, but she is not up to much as yet. She was a couple of lengths back until the stretch was reached and then Don Labor beat her for the place in a nose finish.

Billy Burk, like Zarrine, is by Silent Brook and this is thought to constitute a new record, two of them winning in one afternoon in the Grand Circuit.

2:09 PACE.

The 2:09 pace was the hardest fought race of the afternoon and one in which the bettors were busy as they started with Babe at \$100, Forest Prince \$80, Molly Darling \$50 and the field \$55. Babe is a recruit from the half-mile tracks, where he won many good races last year.

SLUG ONE

Walter J was first to show in front, but gave way to George Penn on the second turn, Babe being lapped on that horse. The stretch drive was a good one on Jamison's part as he brought Babe up just in time to win a neck, while Valentine did not look to be working very hard
