SIGN-PAINTING

OBJECTED TO BY
PROPERTY-OWNER

Mrs. W. H. Carten withdraws Permission to Paint Sign on Her Building--Police ordered Painters Off

LEGAL ADVICE TO BE
OBTAINED IN MATTER

An interesting point concerning a property-owner's right arose today in connection with the painting of a sign on the side of the building at the corner of Queen and Carleton Streets, occupied by Mr. A. J. Ryan as the Central Pharmacy and owned by Mrs. W. H. Carten of this city. At an early hour this morning two painters from St. John appeared and rigging a staging from the roof of the building proceeded to paint upon the side facing Carleton Street, a large sign advertising the well known drink Coca-Cola. The painters made rapid progress with their work and toward noon had the sign more than half painted. At that time Mrs. Carten's son approached the Chief of Police and informed him that his mother had not given permission for the sign to be painted upon the building and that he wished the painting to stop. Acting on these instructions the chief ordered the painters to stop work which they did.

Mr. A. J. Ryan, who occupies the building stated to the Mail today that he knew nothing concerning the rights of the Coca-Cola Company to paint a sign upon the building. About a year ago he had been approached by a representative of the company and had been asked for permission to paint the sign. The representative had been referred to Mrs. Carten and later said that she had given the necessary permission. Some time afterward Mrs. Carten had informed him she had changed her mind and wished to know to whom she would write concerning the matter. Mr. Ryan was unable to say. The next move was the appearance of the sign-painters this morning. They say that beyond being ordered to come here from St. John and to the work they know nothing of the matter.

It is understood that Mrs. Carten will obtain legal advice in the matter.

FREDERICTON'S GREATEST
CELEBRATION NEXT WEEK

Large Attendance of Former Fredericton expected During Old Home Week--Details Being Completed

With Old Home Week but one week distant the details of the big demonstration are being rapidly completed and indications are that the celebration will be the greatest in the history of Fredericton.

From early Monday morning August 5th until late on Saturday evening August 10th, there will be an elaborate celebration, rivaling any of the demonstrations that have ever taken place in Eastern Canadian centres.

Special rates will apply on all railways and steamboat lines and there will be a large number of former residents in attendance from Maine and other parts of the United States.

OPPOSITION EX-

PECTED RE HOSE
STATION SITE

Rumored that legal Action May Be Taken to Prevent Closing of Alleyway Next Station.--Of Value to City.

ALDERMANIC OPINION
ON MATTER DIVIDED

Opposition Expected..... It is understood that the project to use the present site of the Central Fire Station together with the alleyway on its eastern side as a site for the proposed new fire-station will meet with opposition within and without the City Council, and the matter is expected to occupy a prominent place in the deliberations of the committee and council next week.

OPEN FOR MANY YEARS

The alleyway in question has been open for many years and forms the only means of access from the rear to property on Queen Street which is built on city land. This right-of-way has existed for about fifty years it is said and the lessees of the land and of the buildings erected thereon it is said will take legal action to preserve what they claim are their rights in the matter. The buildings occupied by A. Murray & Co., W. E. Farrell and J. J. Weddall & Son are all served by the right of way claimed. It is urged further that the value of the leases of the property in question which is owned by the city would be seriously affected should the alleyway be closed.

Some of the aldermen are known not to favor a three-door station and that feature of the project will receive attention at the next committee meeting.

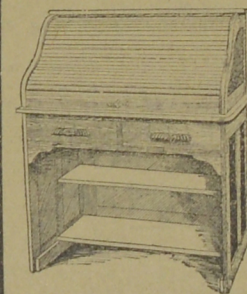

FEDERAL SHEEP COM-

MISSIONER PAID
VISIT TO CITY

Came From St. John Saturday, Spent Sunday Here, Left for Woodstock this Morning--Will Spend Week in N. B.

PROMINENT BRITISH
JOURNALIST WITH PARTY

The Federal Sheep Commission, composed of Mr. C. M. McRae of Ottawa, Mr. Robert McEwen of London, Ont., Lt. Col. H. Montgomery-Campbell of Apohaqui, arrived here Saturday night from St. John spending the day inspecting the country en route. The commissioners registered at the Barker House spending Sunday in the city. This morning they left for Woodstock for the purpose of looking over that part of York County lying between Fredericton and that town.

Until Tuesday of next week the commissioners will spend the time inspecting the northern part of the province and obtaining information concerning its adaptability for sheep-raising. Tuesday will be spent in Carleton County, Wednesday in Victoria and Madawaska Counties, Thursday in Campbellton and Dalhousie, Friday at Bathurst, Saturday in Chatham and vicinity and Sunday and Monday in Kent County.

It is recognized fact that the province of New Brunswick is well adapted to sheep-raising and the commission no doubt will be in a position to make recommendations which will aid materially in the building up of the industry. The commissioners obtained a large amount of information while in Fredericton.

PROMINENT BRITISH JOURNALIST

Accompanying the members of the Sheep Commission to this city was Mr. Rudolph B. Birnham of London England, a prominent British Journalist who is in Canada in connection with immigration matters. Mr. Birnham has covered a considerable position of the Maritime Provinces and is very favorably impressed with what he has seen. He leaves this evening for Montreal. While here he had a conference with Mr. A. B. Wilmot Dominion Immigration officer.
