PARIS IN FETE FOR WILHELMINA

Paris, May 31—Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands, accompanied by the Prince Consort, will arrive in Paris tomorrow for a three days' official visit. Elaborate preparations have been completed for the reception and entertainment of the royal visitors. The coming of the Dutch Queen has aroused extraordinary interest among the Parisians, which is scarcely to be wondered at in view of the fact that Wilhelmina will be the first queen in her own right to be received in Paris since Queen Victoria's last official visit here nearly half a century ago.

The city is already donning gala attire in anticipation of the Queen's arrival. The Place de l'Opera and the boulevards have been lined by huge columns bearing the arms of the Netherlands and of the City of Paris. In devising the scheme of decoration the municipal authorities concluded that, while mere flags and bunting might be good enough for a king, a more delicate tribute should be paid to a queen. Consequently it was decided that the street decorations should consist as much as possible of flowers, as being more suit-

BANKING REVELATIONS
AND MERGER PROTESTS

(Montreal Star)

In view of the latest revelation in connection with the Farmers Bank scandal it is interesting to note that the fiercest protestations about the Royal-Traders Bank merger came from the Toronto World which figured in the evidence of W. R. Travers the ex-manager yesterday.

Travers stated that he had advanced sums of money to The World from time to time, the total of the loans amounting to about \$16,000. This debt was outstanding at the time the bank failed. He had made 'the advances only after much urging to help the world out of grave financial difficulties, and partly out of friendship for W. H. Greenwood, their managing editor. Mr. Greenwood had helped to secure the first provincial deposit of \$10,000 for the bank, while Dr. Nesbitt had arranged the second deposit of \$25,000. None of the World's loan had been repaid before the bank's failure.

In the course of its crusade against the Royal-Traders in particular, and bank mergers and general, the World said many unkind and cutting things about the banks.

able to a woman sovereign. Especially in the Avenue du Bois de Boulogne and the Champs Elysee, through which the royal visitors are to be escorted on their arrival in the city, the street decorations are strikingly beautiful, with red, white and blue flowers symbolizing the colors of the Netherlands.

The royal couple will be quartered in the D'Orsay Palace. The entertainment program includes a gala performance at the opera, visits to St. Cyr and Versailles, a state banquet and a floral festival in the Bois de Boulogne. The young Queen has especially insisted on a military review and battle manoeuvres, and these will take place at Satory camp, near Versailles, where a sort of coming tour has been specially built, whence Her Majesty will be able to follow all the operations.

PREMIER BORDEN AND
THE SPOILS SYSTEM

(FROM VICTORIA TIMES)

The publication in the Times today of particulars of the operation of the spoils system as its work is exemplified by the Borden Government incidentally reflects very seriously on the sincerity of Hon. R. L. Borden in his pre-election pronouncements. For years Mr. Borden plaintively protested that the civil service departments should be extricated from the confusion of political influence, yet there has been no previous case which equals the disgraceful depth to which a party machine descends in providing places for its party heeler. The dismissal of a postmaster who has been five years under the sod is evidence of recklessness with which dismissals are made. Instead of investigation—as Mr. Borden professed should be done in every case—the incident shows that it is not evidence of offensive partisanship but heads of the axemen are after.

The lamentable thing about this particular revelation is the fact that the Conservative organs throughout Canada treat the matter more as a good joke than as having any bearing on the morals of the Government. Since Mr. Borden and his party have attained to power no country in the Empire has had more evidence of shallowness, insincerity and other discrediting characteristics in a political party than has been the case in Canada. It needs not that one should be a partisan to confess this as the same thing is felt and admitted by the large body of 'honorable' men who voted for Mr. Borden's party in the hope that some of the high pretensions to political morality would be exemplified if he were given the reins of power. These are quite as much disappointed as any member of the Liberal party who places good government before his party as an ideal.

POPE PIUS 77 YEARS OLD

Rome, June 1—The Pope will be seventy-seven years old tomorrow. He was born at Riese on June 2, 1835. In accordance with his wish the celebration of the day will be private. The greater part of the day he expects to spend in company with his sisters and a few specially invited of the faithful. In anticipation of the anniversary many addresses and telegrams of congratulations have been received at the Vatican from all parts of the world.

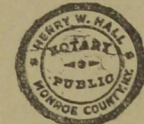
