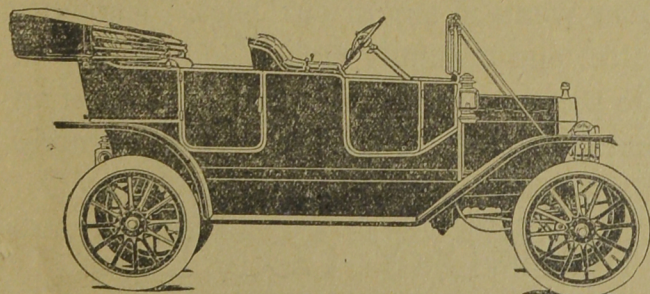

3. What was the cost (1) of the lumber, (2) of the stone?
4. Was the stone paid for by the cubic yard, and what was the price per yard?

5. What was paid for the pile driving, and who performed this service for the Government?

In answer to questions 2, 3, 4, and 5, the accounts containing this information are on file in the Board of Works office and are open for inspection by any honorable member who cares to see them.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey, in reply to Mr. LaBillois' enquiries, said:

1. What amount has been paid on account of the repairs to the Public wharf at Moss Glen in Kings County?
A. \$396.07.

2. Who was the structural superintendent of the work?
A. R. J. Wilkins.

3. Who were employed in the repair work and what was the time and labor of each workman?

In answer to question 3, the accounts containing this information are on file in the Board of Works office, and are open for inspection by any honorable member who cares to see them.

1. Has any amount been paid on account of the construction of a high water wharf at William's Landing, Long Reach, King's County, since October 31st?
A. No.

2. If so, how much and to whom was it paid?

7. Is the Government in possession of information as to from whom the rails were purchased and what price was paid for same and if so who were the vendors of the rails and what was the price?

Ans. The Government has not the information.

8. Has the Government knowledge as to whether all wages in the construction of the road have been paid?
Ans. The Government has not the information.

9. Did the Government take a mortgage of the road before guaranteeing the bonds and has the mortgage been recorded in York County records?
Ans. Yes.

1. Was the expenditure of \$99.23 on Lucy Bridge, York County, authorized by the Superintendent of Public Works?
A. There is no such official as Superintendent of Public Works in the employ of the government.

2. Was there any inspector employed on the work?
A. The work was inspected by R. A. Logan, structural superintendent for York County.

3. If so, who was he and what was his remuneration?
A. Mr. R. A. Logan receives \$3.50 per day for inspecting and repairing bridges in the County of York.

Hon. Mr. Flemming, in reply to Mr. LaBillois' enquiry, said:

1. What amount has been paid Chas. M. Coakley, Game Warden and Fire Warden residing at Douglas Harbor, Queens County, for his services in 1909, 1910, 1911?
Ans. In 1909, \$274; 1910, \$224; 1911, \$178.

2. How many days did he work in each year?
Ans. 1909, 137 days; 1910, 112 days; 1911, 89 days.

All this information is in the Auditor General's Report.

Hon. Mr. Flemming, in reply to Mr. Cyr's enquiry, said:

1. What action has been taken by the Government with a view of acquiring the lands on Baker Lake and Comey Ridge from the New Brunswick Railway Company as provided for by Act of the Legislature in the year 1903?

Ans. The Government has been in communication with the New Brunswick Railway Company for some time with a view of securing the title of the Lands at Baker Lake and Comey Ridge as mentioned in the Act of the Legislature in the year 1903.

2. If any action has been taken what has been the result and in what position does the matter stand at the present time?

Ans. The result of the action taken is that an agreement has been reached between the Government and the New Brunswick Railway Company for the transfer of 11,200 acres of land at Baker Lake and 3,184 acres at Comey Ridge and 2,816 acres in the Parish of St. Leonards. The Bill containing this arrangement will be introduced this session. It is expected that the deed will be executed within a few days.

Mr. Copp gave notice of enquiry regarding J. S. Mullin's license to solemnize marriage.

Hon. Mr. Flemming presented the petition of Sir William MacKenzie and others in favor of a bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Shales, Ltd.

The House went into committee with Mr. Dickson in the chair and continued the consideration of the bill to consolidate the acts respecting municipalities.

Mr. Baxter moved that the provision prohibiting liquor license inspector or commissioner to act at city and municipal councils be struck out.

The bill was agreed to with amendments.

The House went into committee with Mr. MacLachlan in the chair, and agreed to the bill relating to the Maine Central Railroad Company.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer explained that the bill was for the purpose of having the Maine Central Railroad Company become subject to the provisions of the New Brunswick Railway Act.

The bill to incorporate Providence St. Joseph was agreed to with amendments.

Also the bill to amend the act incorporating the Fredericton and Grand Lake Coal and Railway Company, with amendments.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that the bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Company be referred to the committee of the whole today.

The House went into committee with Mr. Sproule in the chair and considered the bill to amend the Agricultural Aid Act.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that the bill provided that the federal subsidy should not be added to the consolidated revenue account but should be kept separately.

Hon. Mr. Flemming, in reply to Mr. LaBillois, said that the federal subsidy would be used to further advance agriculture. A portion of the grant would be expended toward advancing the present policies of the Department of Agriculture while new policies would be forwarded. The action of the federal government brought \$25,000 more money for the advancement of agriculture. It was pleasing to hon. gentlemen as well

sponsibility with the senate for seeking it in their behalf." ("Hear, hear," said in Dr. Michael Clark, amid renewed Liberal cheering.)

When the House had been frankly informed by Mr. Ames that the composition of the tariff commission was to be entirely partisan, that its members were to be men in sympathy with the present government in its high protective tariff views, it was well that the public should be accorded every protection possible by way of information. With a commission of such a partisan character as had been promised by Mr. Ames it was a question in the mind of the Liberal leader whether its operations would be conducive of the good expected of it. The senate had, in his judgment, submitted amendments in the public welfare, and if rather than confer upon them, the government preferred to kill the bill itself, he would not say that it would not be an unmixed misfortune and in essence an unmixed blessing.

FOSTER WRATHY.

Hon. Mr. Foster, who followed, was very indignant. The present government had pledged itself to the appointment of a tariff commission, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier "had met his death upon that issue. But while he was in power the Liberal leader had "been busy storing" the upper House and he had placed there "his own heels in authority to do his bidding after he had died."

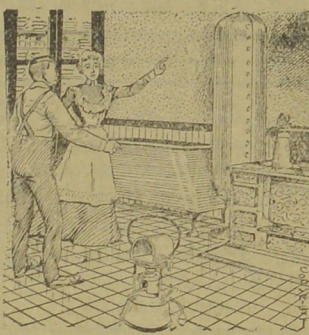
