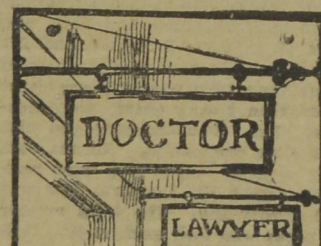

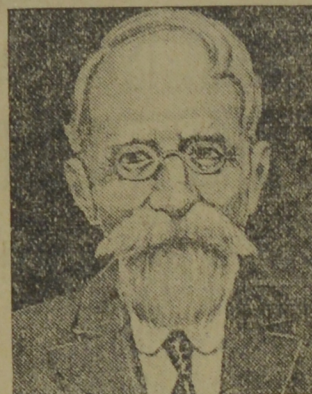

LAST MONTH BROKE JULY RAIN RECORD

(St. John Telegraph)
 July 1912 established a new record
 for rain fall in St. John and with
 a total of four inches, exceeding the
 corresponding month in all of the
 last thirty-nine years, and by more
 than one inch. St. Swithin's Day this
 year passed without a drop of rain
 although the fog was very thick, but
 during the period from July 22 to 29
 there was rain every day, while the
 20th was the only real day of July
 weather.

Taking the month as a whole the
 temperature has been slightly lower
 than for the same month last year
 and the highest thermometer regis-
 tered was 77.5 degrees while the
 lowest temperature reached during
 the month was 45 degrees. The aver-
 age for the month was 60.3 degrees.

In some of the country homes of
 suburbanites it has been found not
 uncomfortable to light a fire in the
 evening.

Hon. L. P. Farris of White's Cove
 arrived in the city yesterday after-
 noon and is registered at the Royal
 Inn. In conversation with a Telegraph re-
 porter he said that the heavy rains
 had been playing havoc with the
 crops in and around White's Cove,
 and that they would be a great fail-
 ure if the rains continued. Mr. Far-
 ris will remain in the city until Sat-
 urday.

WAGE DISPUTE IN BOTTLE INDUSTRY

Olean, N. Y., Aug. 3.—The annual
 convention of the Bottle Blowers'
 Association of America, which will
 begin its sessions here Monday pro-
 mises to be the most important
 gathering ever held by that organi-
 zation. Upon the result of the con-
 vention's deliberations depends the
 question of peace or war in the bot-
 tle industry. The manufacturers have
 notified the workmen of a proposed
 reduction of 40 per cent in wages. It
 is regarded as certain that the blow-
 ers' convention will repudiate the
 manufacturers' proposition. In anti-
 cipation of a general strike, the
 manufacturers are said to have placed
 rush orders for all the automatic
 bottle-making machines that can be
 turned out during the summer
 months. Those machines, each of
 which does the work of five men, are
 the bone of contention in the ytrade.
 Eventually they may force the bottle
 blower out of work entirely.

SOMETHING ABOUT THE TIMUR RUBY

Everybody knows that the famous
 Kph-i-Goor (Mountain of Light) dia-
 mond is a part of the British Royal
 regalia, but not so many are aware
 that the gem known as Khiraj-i-Alam
 (Tribute of the World) is included
 among the crown jewels of England.
 This sponel ruby weighs over 352
 carats, is uncut, but polished, and,
 it appears certain, was found in one
 of the old ruby mines of Badakshan.

Among the many precious stones
 seized when Tamerlane plundered
 Delhi, in 1398, was this one, which
 was later taken to Samarkand by the
 great Tartar conqueror. Afterwards
 it came into the possession of his
 grandson, Uliaa Ulugh Beg, who, the
 Tartar empire being on the wane,
 allowed it to pass into the hands of
 the King of Iran, and in 1612 Shah
 Abbas I, the greatest of the Salavi
 Kings of Persia, presented the ruby
 to his friend and ally, the Mogul
 Emperor Jehangir.

It appears that at one time the
 ruby bore the names of Timur's son
 and Shah Abbas himself, but the in-
 scription has vanished from it and
 no one knows whether it was oblit-
 erated by Jehangir himself or has
 been worn off through passing time.
 The story is told that Jehangir's
 wife remonstrated with him for spoil-
 ing the jewel by the inscription, to
 which he replied:

"This jewel will more certainly
 hand down my name to posterity
 than any written history. The house
 of Timur may fall but as long as
 there is a king this jewel will be
 his," which meant, no doubt, that
 so valuable a jewel would never pass
 out of the hands of the sultan of
 Hindustan. This prediction has been
 fulfilled, for, notwithstanding all the
 vicissitudes of Indian history, the
 ruby is still in the hands of the
 Kaiser-ehind.

Name after name seems to have
 been written on the stone, the latest
 being that inscribed in 1717 by Ab-
 dal, or Durani, who failed in an
 attempt to seize the throne, but suc-
 ceeded in securing a large amount of
 booty, which he took with him when
 he founded the Kingdom of Afghanis-
 tan. Timur Shah, his son, succeeded to
 the throne of Kabul and to the
 possession of the ruby, which even-
 tually passed to his youngest son,
 Shah Su'a. He was expelled by Dost
 Mahomed and, taking refuge in the
 Punjab, was forced by the Maharaja
 Rangit Singh to surrender both the
 Koh-i-Noor and the Timur ruby.

When the Punjab was annexed in
 1819 the Board of Administration
 took over all the state jewels. These
 included the Koh-i-Noor and the
 Timur ruby, which were sent by
 special officer to England and at
 once delivered to Queen Victoria.
 They were displayed at the great
 exhibition of 1851, at the close of
 which the Board of Directors of the
 East India Company presented the
 famous ruby to Queen Victoria.
