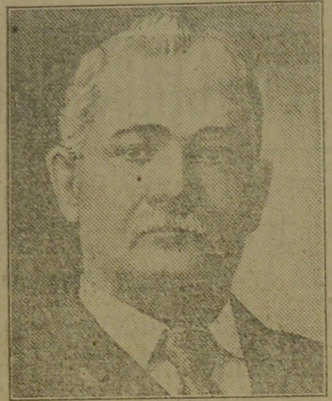

DOUBLE LAUNCHING AT NEWPORT NEWS

Newport News, Ea., Jan. 27—The revenue cutters Miami and Unalga, the first government vessels turned out by a private ship yard under the eight-hour law, were successfully launched today at the yards of the Newport News Shipbuilding Company. The Unalga was christened by Miss Elizabeth Hilles, daughter of President Taft's secretary, while the Miami was named by Miss Barnes Richardson, daughter of Representative Richardson of Alabama. The two vessels, with a displacement of 1100 tons each, will cost \$250,000 a piece. The Unalga is specially fitted to do police duty in the north Pacific, while the Miami is designed for service on the Florida coast.

GREAT SKI TOURNAMENT ON

Cary, Ill., Jan. 27—An army of skiers several hundred strong invaded this place today for the annual championship of the National Ski Association. The contests, which will continue two days, promise to be the most notable ever held since the first introduction of the famous Norwegian winter sport into America. A liberal prize offering has attracted all the great runners, both amateur and professional, of the northern states and Canada. In addition, Norway has sent two of her most famous stars, Svein Selhaugen and Ragnar Omdoet, who will compete in the amateur events against the best talent produced in America.

The new artificial course specially constructed for the meet is the longest in the country. Situated on the crest of a natural hill, it affords a slide of from 500 to 600 feet in length, with an incline of about 45 degrees. The hill has a 370-foot natural elevation and in addition a steel structure ninety feet in height. The program provides for a championship jump for professionals, championship jump for amateurs and jump for boys. Weather permitting, a long distance or cross country jump will be added.

BIG EXCESS OF MEN OVER WOMEN

In a brief study of the census figures it is borne in upon us from both town and country, as the esteemed Patriot would say, that there is a fearful and wonderful preponderance of the masculine element. It figures up to some 428,413 more men than women, big, medium and small. By provinces the excess of men is as follows:

P. E. Island,	408
New Brunswick,	7,842
Nova Scotia,	6,699
Quebec,	19,707
Ontario,	75,468
Manitoba,	44,523
Saskatchewan,	90,335
Alberta,	73,400
British Columbia,	106,883

Observe that this excess of the rougher sex exists in every one of the nine provinces and increases in proportion to the total population as we go westward. Take note also that this excess in numbers of men over women is almost entirely in the adult population. Although not shown in the above table, it is a fact that among the children and up to about eighteen years of age the numbers of both sexes is almost exactly equal. It may, therefore, be said that in Canada today there are 400,000 men of marriageable age for whom no wives can be found within the broad bounds of the Dominion.

West of the Great Lakes alone there are over 300,000 lone bachelors and widowers for whom the land of wheat and cattle affords no chance of obtaining wives for their liking except under circumstances of deplorable competition. There are three men to every woman in Saskatchewan and alike disproportion in Alberta, while in British Columbia there are nine men to every five women. These are not normal conditions. If it were not good for the first man to be alone, it is probably not good for many of those Western Canadians to be left without womanly companionship.—Ex.

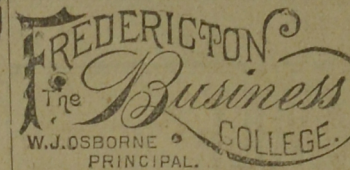

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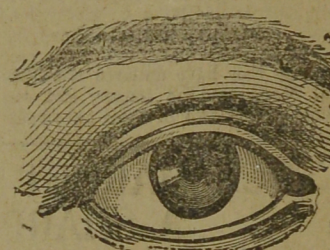
