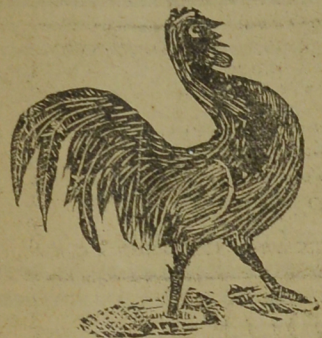

Board of Trade Memorials to be Presented at Ottawa

The following are drafts of the two memorials prepared by the Fredericton Board of Trade and taken to Ottawa by the civic delegation for presentation to the minister of railways and minister of public works respectively. The memorials concern the location in Fredericton of the car-shops of the St. John & Quebec Railway and also the dredging of the St. John River and the construction of a concrete wharf in this city.

CONCERNING CARSHOPS.

The memorial concerning the car-shops is as follows:
To the Honorable the Minister of Railways and Canals, Canada:
The Memorial of the Board of Trade of the City of Fredericton, New Brunswick, Respectfully Sheweth

1. This Board of Trade gives its fullest support to the application now being made by the city of Fredericton and the Municipality of York for the establishment of railway shops in this vicinity to accommodate the St. John and Quebec and Intercolonial Railways, which will unite at Fredericton and upon the completion of the former road be operated by the Intercolonial Railway. The members of this Board of Trade are convinced that Fredericton, as the place for the location of the said shops and works, commands the situation in every view of the case. The completion of the St. John and Quebec Railway and the Fredericton, Minto Railway and the contemplated construction of the transcontinental branch from Napudogan to Fredericton, will constitute Fredericton a railway centre for the whole province. Then, Fredericton is more central for such works than any other point on the line of the St. John and Quebec road between St. John and Grand Falls. Fuel will be cheaper at Fredericton than at any other place on the said road and there are established here foundries, factories and other works which would be easy of access for the assistance of said road and the necessary supplies would be furnished at less cost than at any other point above Fredericton. The schools and social privileges of Fredericton are superior to and present greater advantages than at any other point on the said road and would prove an additional inducement to the staff of employees for the management and operation of the works necessary for the said railway.

2. For the above and many reasons which might be advanced your memorialists are convinced that Fredericton possesses advantages for the location of the said shops and works of the said railway very much superior to any other place upon the said road. Your memorialists therefore, respectfully solicit that the establishment of the said shops and works at Fredericton receive favorable consideration, and as in duty bound, will ever pray, etc.

PUBLIC WORKS

The following is a draft of the memorial to the Minister of Public Works regarding the necessity of dredging the river-channel and of the construction of a wharf at the rear of Phoenix Square.

TO THE HONORABLE, THE MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS CANADA

THE MEMORIAL OF THE BOARD OF TRADE OF THE CITY OF FREDERICTON, NEW BRUNSWICK,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH:

1. That this Board has read and considered the resolutions adopted by the City Council of the City of Fredericton on the second day of January A. D. 1912 in respect to the erection of a Public Wharf on the River St. John at the City of Fredericton and also calling attention to the urgent necessity for improving the river channel in the vicinity of Fredericton and at other places below said City.

2. This Board of Trade desires to emphasize the pressing necessity for the said work and its importance to the public generally.

3. The need of such wharf as mentioned in the said resolutions has been conceded by the Public Works Department years ago and its erection and completion promised. Surveys of the site have been made and at the request of the Department the City stands ready to transfer to the Crown the lands required for the said wharf, with the increase of traffic now taking place at this centre and the further rapid growth which must follow the construction of the three lines of railways all centering in this City, the completion of such wharf should not, in the public interest, longer be delayed.

Fredericton is at the head of navigation on the River St. John, and much of the supplies for public as well as general business come here by water during the summer season. There is not sufficient wharf accommodation for the present traffic so that the construction of the wharf asked for by the City Council has become a public necessity.

4. The blocked condition of the river channel at Fredericton and at several places below has for years been the subject of much criticism which revives with the opening of navigation each Spring. At different times and places on the said river dredging has been commenced but invariably for one reason or another the work so begun has not been completed. This is particularly true of dredging undertaken at Fredericton and at the Oromocto Shoals, two of the most important points on the river. These and a few other obstructions of the river channel have been allowed to remain so long without completion that vessels of the class trading on the river are now declining to accept cargoes for Fredericton. Last year no less than three coal laden schooners were aground at one time on mud bars within the harbor at Fredericton—two above and one below the Intercolonial Railway Bridge and forced to lighter before reaching the wharves. Our merchants and others now find it impossible to charter vessels for delivery of through cargoes at Fredericton except at very much increased rates. The completion of the work now partly done supplemented as may become apparent would afford a sufficient channel to Fredericton during the whole open season. The importance of the St. John River cannot be over estimated as a public highway, and unless the necessary dredging which is neither difficult nor expensive, is completed without further delay many of the benefits to the public from this great river will be lost.

5. We also desire to call attention to other places on the said river at each of which more or less dredging work is required:

The Oromocto Shoals (left half gone).
Upper Manguerville Wharf, Sunbury County.
Upper Gagetown Wharf, Queens County.
Gunter's Wharf, Queens County.
The Middle Ground Grimross Island, Queens County.
Dingee's Shoals, Gagetown Creek, Queens County.
Dykeman's Shoals, Spoon Island, Queens County.
Gerow's Wharf, Queens County.
Palmer's Wharf, Queens County.

We are advised that very little work is required at the greater number of these places. The points needing special work are, Fredericton, Oromocto Shoals and Middle Ground.

6. In view of the existing conditions as intimated above we ask that the dredging necessary to provide a safe channel on the river St. John to Fredericton be provided for and the work undertaken and completed as soon as possible during the present year.

Your memorialists therefore most respectfully solicit that this important work receive your favorable consideration and that steps be taken without delay to provide a safe channel on the river St. John to Fredericton and as in duty bound will ever pray etc.

WOLTER NEAR ELECTRIC CHAIR

New York, Jan. 27—Albert W. Wolter, whose murder of 15-year-old Ruth Wheeler horrified this city two years ago, is to pay the penalty of his heinous crime in the death chair in Sing Sing prison early in the coming week. Though convicted on circumstantial evidence, the verdict was affirmed by the Court of Appeals and there appears no chance of the brutal murderer escaping the chair.

Ruth Wheeler, who had just finished a course in stenography in a business college, left her home on March 17, 1910, to answer an advertisement offering employment. She failed to return and the next day her family reported her disappearance to the police. A week later Albert Wolter was arrested, charged with abducting her. He was about to be released, because of the weakness of the evidence against him, when the Wheeler girl's body was found, burned and wrapped in rags, on the fire escape of a tenement house in East Seventy-ninth Street, where Wolter had lived with a girl named Katie Muller. The Muller girl was arrested on the following day and gave the police assistance in completing their case against Wolter. Within thirty days after the crime Wolter had been tried and found guilty of murder in the first degree. An appeal to the higher court has served to defer the execution of the murderer for nearly two years.

ANXIOUS TO ESCAPE THE DEATH DUTIES

London, Jan. 27—The Times says it understands that J. P. Morgan's decision to remove his art collection from the Victoria and Albert Museum, was due to the fact that if it was here at the time of his death, his executors would have to pay death duties which would amount to \$750,000 supposing the collection is worth \$5,000,000.

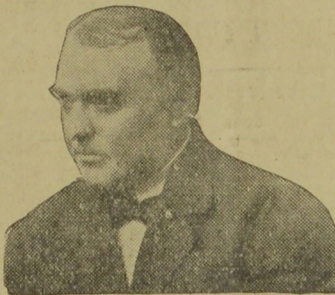
