HUMBUGGING THE PEOPLE

Evidence is fast accumulating to show that the Flemming government are playing into the hands of the C.P.R. on the Valley Railway question and have really no intention of carrying into effect the legislation which provides for connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific at Grand Falls. During the legislative session of 1910 the supporters of the present government voted down a motion to have the road extended from St. John to Grand Falls, and during the present session a resolution by Mr. Tweeddale, the object of which was to provide that work should begin simultaneously on all sections of the road, was also defeated. It is a well known fact that the St. John and Quebec Railway Company have no particular interest in establishing a connection at Grand Falls. They want a line to the Quebec bridge and it is their intention to build across the State of Maine. This was practically admitted in Parliament by Hon. J. D. Hazen when the bill to provide aid for bridges on the proposed Valley Railway was under discussion a few days ago. It will provide a short route from Quebec to St. John and from the standpoint of the Company which is not into this altogether for its health is undoubtedly a good proposition. Nobody can blame Mr. Gould for looking after the interests of himself and his associates but the people of the St. John Valley have a right to expect Premier Flemming to take every precaution with a view of safeguarding their interests in the matter. They want the road extended to Grand Falls so that they will have the benefit of competition in passenger and freight rates, and they can see no reason why Premier Flemming should beat about the bush in an important matter of this kind. He pretends to be in favor of having the extension made but unfortunately his record is against him and if the people question his sincerity they have good and sufficient reasons for so doing. That he was opposed to June 1910 to having the road constructed to Grand Falls is amply proven by the following extract from a letter which he addressed to Hon. Dr. Pugsley at that time and which was published in the Tory press.

"Were the railway constructed from St. John to Grand Falls, I do not think the Grand Trunk Pacific would switch their traffic from their own line at Grand Falls, but would prefer continuing the traffic upon their own steel to the seaboard. I would greatly fear that the line, if so constructed would never be the conveyor of any large amount of ocean bound traffic."

That was the opinion of Hon. J. K. Flemming a few months after he made the memorable ride in a private car from Fredericton to Montreal with Sir William Van Horne. There is every reason to believe that he has not since changed that opinion but the people would have far more respect for him if he only had the manliness to say so. There should be no sailing under false colors in an important matter of this kind. There is no question about it the people want the road extended to Grand Falls and they wanted it leased by the Federal government and operated as part of the I.C.R. system. This policy may not be altogether in the interests of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, but it is manifestly in the interests of the people of New Brunswick who have or should have the first claim on the services of Premier Flemming and his colleagues.

It is rather noticeable that Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, Attorney General, has not been heard from in debate during the present session of the legislature. The Attorney General knew a few things when he entered the government four years ago; he has attained. This probably accounts for the quired wisdom since, but he frankly admits that he doesn't know it all yet. This is probably the reason why he sits back and allows his colleagues to do the talking. Some people have the habit of rushing in when angels naturally enough are inclined to besitate. This probably accounts for the Attorney General's silence up to date.

It is not necessary to bring in experts to teach the farmers of New Brunswick how to grow potatoes. In the year 1861 before some of these so-called experts were born, and when there were practically no railway facilities, the farmers of New Brunswick raised and marketed over six million bushels. Allowing for the difference in population, that record has not been beaten since the medical commissioner of agriculture took office. Reciprocity gave the farmers a market in 1861 and they had no trouble in producing the goods.

Advices from Ottawa are to the effect that Mr. A. B. Morine has decided to resign his position as chairman of the Inquiries' Commission as a result of the crushing exposure of his record made in Parliament by Mr. F. B. Carvell. He says the charges are groundless, but he thinks that the work of the Commission should not be hampered and in this view a wise and considerate government has concurred. And thus another name has been added to the long list of martyrs.

In the election to fill the vacancy on the Board of Control in Montreal a few days ago, Mr. C. H. Godfrey, the English-speaking candidate, was elected by a majority of 13,000. Notwithstanding the fact that the French-speaking electors are in a great majority in the city, a Frenchman who contested the election and endeavored to raise the race cry, forfeited his deposit.

It is to be hoped that the West India delegates now at Ottawa will enter into an arrangement for closer trade relations with Canada. If a substantial reduction in duties is made on articles now imported from the West Indies the consumer of Canada will benefit and a stimulus will be given to our trade with that country.

The announcement that three mail bags, filled with mail matter had been stolen from the Fredericton post office came as a shock to the public. Why valuable mail matter should be deposited in the porch and allowed to remain there until snatched up by thieves is something which it is a little difficult for the ordinary mortal to understand.
