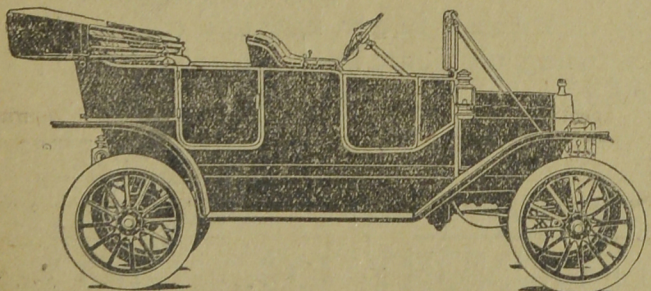

WOUNDS FROM SCISSORS CAUSED EDITOR'S DEATH

New York, April 8.—An inquest into the death of Walter J. Snyder, editor of the sports of the Times, who died yesterday from stab wounds inflicted by scissors in the hands of his wife, was planned by the coroner's jury today. Mrs. Snyder, who is held on a homicide charge, declares that her husband inflicted the wounds himself by seizing her hands while she was manicuring her nails, and drawing her violently to him. They were quarrelling at the time she declared. According to Mrs. Snyder's story, to the police her husband left for the bathroom where he had prepared a bath, and dashed water over her. She remonstrated she said, and he repeated the annoyance. She warned him not to do so again, she declared, and he grabbed her hands and a scuffle ensued. The scissors opened, she said, and when he drew her to him, the blades entered his breast. There were four wounds.

WOUNDED PARAMOUR, KILLED HIMSELF

New York, April 8.—Samuel H. Beckerman, 29 years old, shot himself through the heart last night, after having shot twice at Pearl Armstrong, a girl five years younger than he. Beckerman died instantly but the girl was only slightly wounded in the arm.

She told the police that the shooting, which occurred in Beckerman's apartments in the Bronx, came without warning, when she told Beckerman that she intended to leave him. To Coroner Shongut, the woman said she met Beckerman in Toronto six years ago, and when she quit Canada with the man, she said, her parents believed she was Beckerman's wife. It is understood that the Armstrong woman had a plentiful supply of money from her relatives in Canada. The Armstrong woman is a blonde and is unusually attractive.

BRANTFORD, ONT. HAS A BIG FRESHET

Brantford, Ont., April 8.—"The worst is over" Such was the welcome news which Brantfordites received early this morning from the watchers, who kept all night vigil of the gyke which protects the life and property of 2,000 West Brantford residents from the annual spring rampages of the Grand River, from 2 o'clock the water commenced subsiding and by 6 o'clock had gone down several inches.

The river at Brantford by Sunday night had risen to 28 feet 3 inches above normal and the water was just oozing over the top of the embankment for which Brantford spent \$20,000 a few years ago. There is not a house that has gas, a huge main having been carried away early Sunday morning near Cockshut Bridge and until the river subsides repairs will be impossible. The river came within three inches of flooding the boilers at the civic pumping station and causing a water famine.

FADS AND FASHIONS.

It is among the evening frocks and the dressy afternoon frocks that one finds the most daring experimenting with new ideas and, at the same time, the most wonderful of the new materials. All the skirts have added fullness, but there are varying grades of it and fullness does not by any means necessarily imply drapery. Tailored shirts are, with few exceptions almost as straight of line as they were last season, though they are not so narrow, thanks to skillfully introduced plaits and tunic arrangements. A majority of the simpler, short one-piece frocks also retain a straight and narrow skirt outline. The skirt, if the material allows, is filled into the waistband but it is so weighted and drawn down that it hangs comparatively straight and even when it is flounce trimmed, does not have a bouffant effect.

ALD. JEWETT SLATED FOR ROAD COMMISSIONER

Change in Road Department to be Made unless Something Unforeseen Happens

Unless something unforeseen occurs Ald. H. C. Jewett will be the active head of the Roads and Streets Department as Road Commissioner after the next meeting of the City Council. Ald Jewett under the arrangement is to resign his seat at the City Council to become Road Commissioner succeeding Mr. William McKay the present official who is not to be reappointed. Ald Jewett's resignation would make necessary a by-election in Queens Ward and the appointment of a new chairman of the Roads and Streets Committee. In connection with the change it is rumored that political influence outside civic matters may be brought to bear in an attempt to prevent it.

Other changes among the city officials have been discussed by aldermen but nothing has been definitely decided upon.

TO CLOSE DISORDERLY HOUSES.

Acting on behalf of the New Brunswick Law Enforcement League, Rev. W. R. Information as to the undesirable character of four road houses near St. John has been secured and steps will be taken to close them up immediately. The proprietress of one road house on the Westmorland Road near St. John, was warned to close up her premises some days ago and she acted with considerable promptitude. It is understood that the New Brunswick Law Enforcement League will proceed against such houses all over the province. Rev. Mr. Robinson was formerly pastor of the Gibson Baptist Church.

NEW CROSS DEDICATED.

At Saturday afternoon service at Christ Church Cathedral the beautiful new altar cross was dedicated for use in the Cathedral. Bishop Richardson conducted the dedicatory service assisted by Dean Schofield and the cross was placed on the altar and was used at the Easter service for the first time. The cross was presented to the Cathedral by Mrs. Edward Medley of England, widow of the late Canon Edward Medley, who was well known here, as a memorial. It arrived last week and is a massive memorial cross, a facsimile of that designed for the Norwich Cathedral, England, by the late Canon Medley. It stands three feet high and at each point of the cross is a garnet stone, while the base is set with four crystals.

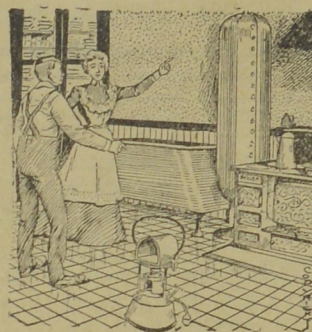
