DEAD AT 103

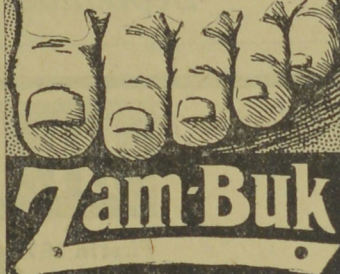

FRONTIER CELEBRATION BEGINS

Cheyenne, Wyo., Aug. 14—Throngs of visitors from Denver and the East arrived in Cheyenne today for the opening of the sixteenth annual frontier celebration. Fully 5,000 people are guests of the city already and every train is crowded to its utmost capacity. Many cowboys are in the city from all parts of Wyoming, and they, with the Indians in their red and yellow blankets, are attracting much attention from the visitors. The festivities will continue until the end of the week. Among the events on the programme are roping and bucking contests for the world's championship, shooting competitions, cowboy races, exhibitions of fancy riding, Indian races, branding contests and military manoeuvres by a detail of United States troops from Fort D. A. Russell.

A PROTEST SENT TO
PRESIDENT LYNCH

Chicago, Aug. 14—One hundred supporters of the Cubs have sent a protest to President T. J. Lynch of the National League against his action in suspending Johnny Evers of the Cubs for five days. They ask for the immediate re-instatement of Evers in order that he may play in the series of New York beginning tomorrow. The advance sale of seats has been very heavy for the series of three games, the first of which will be played tomorrow between New York and Chicago leaders in the National League.

THE FINAL ACT IN
ROYAL-TRADERS MERGER

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 14—Application was made today for the amalgamation of the Royal and Traders Banks to the Treasury Board as given notice of in the Canada Gazette several weeks ago. After the treasury board has considered the matter it will come up before the cabinet council for final approval. It is considered likely that the treasury board will recommend that the merger go through.

PRINCE HENRY 50 YEARS OLD

Berlin, Aug. 14—Prince Henry of Prussia, only brother of the German Emperor, received a flood of congratulations from his relatives and friends in many parts of the world today on the occasion of his fiftieth birthday anniversary. Prince Henry has been connected with the navy since boyhood and is regarded as a high authority on naval matters. In 1902 he visited New York to attend the launching of Emperor William's yacht Meteor. Four years later the Emperor appointed him commander-in-chief of the Imperial navy.

WISCONSIN WOMAN'S GOLF TOURNEY

Kenosha, Wis., Aug. 14—A bevy of fair golfers thronged the links of the Kenosha, Country Club today at the opening of the annual championship tournament of the Wisconsin Woman's Golf Association. Three, score of prominent players representing fifteen clubs are entered in the tournament, which is to continue until the end of the week.

The lack of pitching 89 innings without letting in a run has won for "Buster" Brown, the Sheboygan pitcher, a chance to display his goods with the Milwaukee team.

CONVENTION MEETS IN ST.
LOUIS.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 10—In the interval between the Progressive convention and the Wilson ratification of last week and the notification of the two leading vice-presidential candidates fixed for a week hence, the national campaign promises to experience a mid-summer lull during the ensuing seven days.

The most important of the fixed events on the political calendar of the week will be the Populist National Convention, which has been called to meet in St. Louis next Monday to name a presidential ticket and adopt a platform.

Col. Cecil A. Lyon, chairman of the Republican State Committee of Texas, and an active Roosevelt supporter, has issued a call for a state convention of the party to meet in Dallas Monday to put a full ticket in the field.

A monument in honor of the memory of Sir Isaac Brock, who commanded the British forces in Canada in the early part of the War of 1812 and who was killed at the Battle of Queenstown Heights, is to be unveiled Thursday at Brockville, Ont. Col. Samuel Hughes, the Dominion minister of militia and defence, is to officiate at the unveiling ceremony.

Another interesting event of the week in Canada will be the visit of the Duke of Connaught and his party in Halifax. The chief feature of the visit will be the dedication by His Royal Highness of the memorial tower erected at Halifax to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the first meeting of the provincial legislative assembly of Nova Scotia.

Among the conventions of the week will be the annual meetings of the International Typographical Union in Cleveland, the National Society of the Army of the Philippines in Lincoln, Neb., and the Canadian Medical Association in Edmonton, Alta.
