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FOSTER SHOULD GET BUSY

The St. John Globe, although it gives the Federal Government an independent support has no love for Hon. George E. Foster, the Minister of Trade and Commerce. In a recent issue the Globe calls attention to the fact that Sir George Reid, a distinguished Australian statesman is at Ottawa ready to discuss trade matters, while Mr. Foster is enjoying a holiday in New Brunswick. The Globe thinks that George Eulas should be in Ottawa at the present time, but regrets to learn from morning despatches that he does not intend to return for ten days yet. Here is the way the Globe deals with the matter:

"The newspapers represent Hon. George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, quietly taking a holiday at a health resort in Northern New Brunswick. In the meantime an Australian High Commissioner on trade matters, Sir George Reid, is awaiting Mr. Foster's return to the Canadian capital. When the House of Commons prorogued, and the necessary departmental business was settled, Mr. Foster started for England, where according to the reports there was to be a meeting of trade commissioners representing the Empire and the great Dominions. After the preliminary meetings there was to be a tour of the world to study conditions of trade and possibilities for increasing it. So far nothing has been done, but Mr. Foster came back to Canada and has been here for some time. Morning despatches intimate that ten days will elapse before Mr. Foster will return to Canada. Meanwhile George Reid ought to have a good time at Ottawa if he can stand the water. It is not unreasonable to interfere that at the next session of Parliament there will be no legislation based upon the action of the commission."

COLONEL SAM HUGHES

The London, Ont., Advertiser calls Hon. Col. Sam Hughes, the minister of militia, "a national miscegenator." Referring to his present outburst on the German peril at Vancouver, it says:

"The Hon. Col. Sam Hughes is gasping again. A while ago he rattled his sabre at the Americans. Before a Vancouver audience he indulges in a heap of wild talk about the peril of a German invasion of Canada."

"It is about time Col. Hughes were called to account by his keepers, if he has any, for such irresponsible ravings. Posing as a Cabinet Minister, he has not yet risen to the dignity of the office. His tongue is as unruly as ever. No member of the British Cabinet would venture to talk in this fashion. This habit of reckless insult to other countries ought to be dropped by the parvenu minister. It is scarcely less reprehensible that he goes on insulting the Liberal half of the Canadian people as unpatriotic, and now puts a similar stigma upon those of the Conservative remainder who may be unwilling or unpersuaded to submit to military conscription. It is insulting to the intelligence of the people of Canada that such a man should address us as a Cabinet Minister. All he has of advantage over the schoolboy orator is his bulk and big assemblance of a man, more leathery lungs, more swollen assurance, and some gray hairs."

Montreal Herald:—Mr. Borden had his chance to make Canada's naval policy a non-partizan one. He rejected it. Now he is on his way home with, we must assume, a fairly clear idea of what he thinks Canada should do. And the suggestion is made on his behalf that the Liberal leaders should go into round table conference with him to ensure the country's acceptance of his proposals! He divided Canadian opinion to obtain office. Now he would unite Canadian opinion to retain office. He will discover, we are afraid, how much easier it is to pull down than to build up, how much easier to create discord than to restore harmony.

TIRED OF BOURASSA

The Tories were mighty glad to associate with Mr. Henri Bourassa during the last federal campaign, when he was making votes for them by his un-British campaign in Quebec, but of late they seem to have dropped him. Commenting on this The Montreal Witness says:

"No more appreciative headlines in the Conservative press when Mr. Bourassa is mentioned! No more misty phrases about a 'common basis for the imperial ideal!' No more certificates of his loyalty in every paper and on every platform from Ontario to the Pacific Coast, contrasted with base and baseless institutions against that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The time has come in accordance with the not very creditable school boy phrase to cry 'Knock him out; he has no friends.' Those elected to parliament on the cries started by him and selected as ministers as representing the government's Quebec allies have forsaken him and gone over to the navy. Now Mr. Bourassa is told he must stop playing in the Conservative backyard, lest the neighbors should think he was in the habit of doing so. Never was a political alliance between 'two parties' more complete. Never was a marriage more openly solemnized. Yet now the principle of the Ne Temere is invoked and we are told that there never was anything but civility among them. What is certain is that there is, in some quarters, no civility now."

On the Mangishlak Peninsula, in the Caspian Sea, there are five small lakes. One of them is covered with salt crystals strong enough to allow a man to cross the lake on foot; another is perfectly round and of a lovely rose color. Its banks of salt crystals form a setting, white as the driven snow, to the water, which not only shows all the colors from violet to rosy red, but sends forth a perfume as of violets. Both the perfume and the color are the results of the presence of seaweeds.

The instalment furniture dealers of the United States met in New York the other day to form a national association, one of the objects of which, it was stated, would be to keep track of undesirable customers. Raphael Levy, of Philadelphia, asserted that the 5,000 merchants who do the bulk of the instalment furniture business in this country lose from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000 a year as a result of the "skipping habit" of customers.

The recent wet weather has greatly interfered with dredging operations now being carried on at this port. The river is almost up to the spring freshet mark and the result has been that four of the five dredges have been obliged to suspend operations. Tory politicians and heelers who have invested their money in dredges will have to go without dividends this year unless there is a change in the weather.

Even the human fly is being swatted. At New York, Thursday, Rodman Law "a human fly" started to climb the 10 story Blair Building at the corner of Broad and New Streets when his ascent was stopped at the third floor by a policeman who arrested him on a charge of disorderly conduct. The superintendent of the building said that Law tried to obtain permission to climb the building but was refused.

Representative Government in the British Colonies was established in Nova Scotia one hundred and fifty years ago and the event was fittingly celebrated at Halifax yesterday when a memorial was unveiled by His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught. It was a most unique celebration and was attended by prominent men from all over the Empire.

OFFICIAL APPOINTED TO EXAMINE TRAINMEN

Chicago, Aug. 24—Out of the wreck of a Chicago-Burlington and Quincy train at La Grange, Ill., in which thirteen persons were killed has come the appointment of a train rule examiner by that system. Charles T. Salisbury is the appointee. His duties will be to examine trainmen on their familiarity with the Rules. One of the causes of La Grange wreck was a failure on part of employees to understand the rules.

CANADIAN PACIFIC MAKES ANOTHER HIGH RECORD

C. P. R. WILL INCREASE CAPITAL STOCK

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 14—A formal application has been made to the secretary of state by the directors of the C. P. R. for an increase in its capital stock. For some time there have been rumors in the stock market that the C. P. R. was contemplating an increase in its stock and the application proves that the speculation was justified. It could not be learned how much increase is asked for but the rumor goes that the proposal is for an increase of capitalization from two hundred to three hundred million. The reasons assigned are the requirements for improvements and extensions of the road particularly in the west. For the increase in stock legislation is not necessary as it can be provided for by ordinary letters patent issued by the department of state with the sanction of the government.

The announcement is made that Col. Sam Hughes will sail next week for Europe. For the good of Canada it is hoped that Premier Borden will see to it that he is securely muzzled before he is turned loose on the other side.
