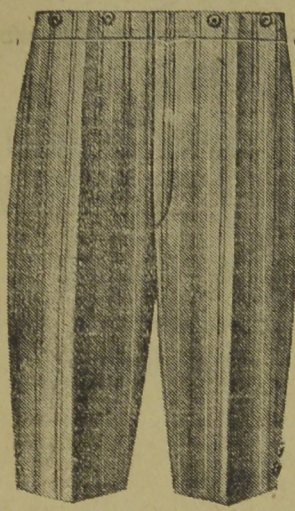

LATE HON. D. C. FRASER  
REPRESENTATIVE GOVT.

(Halifax Chronicle)

"On this glad and memorable anniversary I have thought it well to call attention to the duty incumbent on every citizen of this free country to intelligently study our own laws and to modestly, moderately and manfully seek to make them better. Let no one assume our fathers did not do their part well. When they came to this vast solitude they carried the elements of the highest civilization with them. And they evolved a better, safer and more humane civilization than any others in America. Leaving their native land in poverty, their first care was the intellectual and moral character of their children. It was in this country always the pride of its unsurpassed first settlers that men felt keenly that they should take a deep interest in how we were governed. For us the stream of steady development like a mighty river must be studied. Along its banks watch the changes. Let none of us think our work is solely in the association halls or in the marts of commerce. Christianity is not that ethereal essence that some would make it. It is tremendously practical. Down here where men move and governments govern, is the place of conflict. On us depend the decision whether or not the laws affecting questions that may arise shall or shall not be improved. With such a country as ours, rich in land, mine and sea—with a people healthy, generous and intellectual, no bounds can be placed to our possibilities. Living under laws as just as any country under the sun, our possibilities are greater and our responsibilities weightier. Shall we fold our hands and grumble? Shall we insist on what ought to be and fail to help? Or rather shall we make ourselves in intelligently acquainted with what ought to be, and steadfastly seek to attain it?" Ottawa, Aug. 14—The remnant of the public service commission which is left consisting of Mr. Ducharme and several minor officials and experts have returned from a tour of investigation in the maritime provinces, and it is stated, "Have disbanded for a vacation." It is, however, rumored on good authority that the results of the investigation so far have been most disappointing and that the anticipated scandals which were expected to be brought to the limit of the day have not materialized.

In consequence it is considered very doubtful whether the commission will ever again convene. R. S. Lake, the other member of the commission has been at home in the west for some time.

MEMORIAL TOWER  
UNVEILED AT HALIFAX

Halifax, Aug. 14—This city has been enfeited all day for His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught and his party, and the guests of the city have been kept busy over what was to happen next.

After the official landing and the presentation of the provincial and civic addresses the great thing was the dedication of the Halifax Memorial Tower. This ceremony was participated in by the Lord Mayor of Bristol, representatives of the city of Bath and of the British Colonial Institute, and finally his royal highness formally dedicated the tower, saying in conclusion: "Nova Scotia, the cradle of representative government beyond the seas may look with pride on this memorial, the Canadian statute of liberty which I now dedicate to the commemoration of the first representative parliament accorded by the mother country to any portion of the dominions beyond the seas."

Following this was a civic luncheon for the dual party and the overseas visitors and the regatta on the Arm. During this H.R.H. visited the Studley Quoit Club and in the evening there was a grand illumination on the North West Arm which far surpassed all previous efforts of this kind. Premier Gouin, of Quebec who witnessed it in company with Premier Murray, of Nova Scotia, said he had never seen the equal of it as a splendid marine illumination. He was glad, he remarked, that he had come to Halifax.

GENERAL BOOTH SAYS  
WORK MUST GO ON

Toronto, Aug. 14—I am resolved to go on with my work, blind or not blind. It's a great loss, but I'm not going to be mean about it. The work must go on and I must work too. The poor must not be deprived of any help my brain and heart can give them even though it may be declining strength and declining years. If I have to do a little less you will have to do a little more. The work must not suffer."

These were the last words spoken by General Booth now lying at the point of death to Commissioner Rees who arrived in Toronto from England on Sunday last.

"Alas, what is contained in the despatches this morning, is we are afraid, correct," declared the Commissioner this morning, adding that he was afraid the General's eyesight was doomed.

## TO ISSUE NEW STOCK.

The Montreal Herald says that it has been definitely learned from Ottawa that the C. P. R. has applied for authority to increase its common stock by \$300,000,000. The authorized issue at the present time is \$200,000,000 and \$198,000,000 has been issued. The stock sold today on the New York market at 283. Upwards of 300 shares are owned outright in Fredericton and there will be valuable rights coming to the holders in the near future.

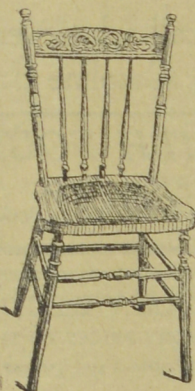
