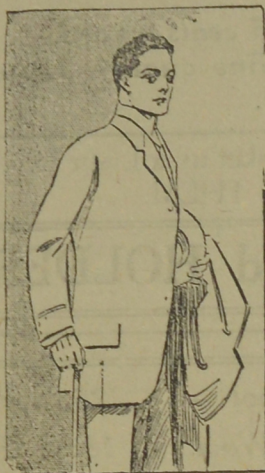
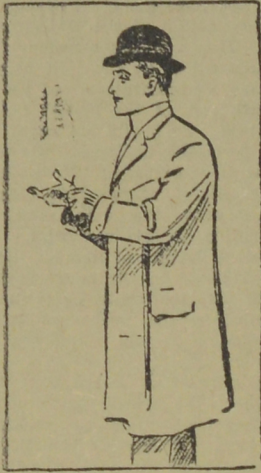

Fredericton and St John Won Games Yesterday

BADEN WON
KING GEORGE STAKE
AT FORT ERIE
Lost First Heat to Favorite, Baden,
But won in Five Heats---Protest
Entered

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 13--The opening of the three days' Grand Circuit meeting at Fort Erie track, across the river from this city, this afternoon was featured by the hardest fought race of all the big trotting stakes which have been contested this season, this being the \$5000 King George V. stake for 2.12 trotters, which was won after a five-heat battle by the brown stallion Baden, a product of the Allen Farm, Pittsfield, Mass., but now owned at Newark, N. J.

It was a race replete with surprises the stallion being beaten in the first heat by the favorite, Esther W., which won the Tavern "Steak" at Cleveland. Baden then winning the next two rounds and looking to have the race won in the fourth, but throwing it away near the finish, winning it back, however, in the final. The result was protested by a claim of foul and the decision of the judges held up until the day's program was completed.

It was one of the longest racing cards of the year, all four of the events being of the three-in-five variety and requiring 15 heats to decide the winners.

In the auctions on the trotting stake, Esther W., driven by Walter Cox, was first choice, at \$100; Baden bringing \$90; Oakdale, \$40; Ruth McGregor, \$10; Bergen, \$20; and The Wanderer and May Mack in the field at \$10.

ARCHDALE A FAVORITE

Dudie Archdale was a two-to-one favorite over the field for the 2.06 trot and she won it in three straight heats, the California mare Helen Stiles being the only serious contender. It was the fastest three-heat race of the year, averaging just 2.06.

Geers also started out to win the 2.16 trot, landing the first heat with Funny Crank, but in the later heats the gelding lived up to his name and the race was won by the Ohio gelding, Doctor Mack, in slow time.

Jones Gentry, a winner at Cleveland and Pittsburgh, had an easy time in beating the big field in the 2.09 pace.

James S. Murray, Jr., the 10-year-old son of "Bud" Murray, drove Gentry, which sold favorite in the pools. The best time was 2.06½. Edward B. won second money.

REMARKABLE SHOOTING BEING DONE AT P. R. A. MEET

Sussex, Aug. 14--The shooting being done at the forty-sixth annual meet of the Provincial Rifle Association this year is worthy of Biscly marksmen, being decided superior to that of the other years. High scores have been feature of every match shot thus far, the feature in every case being greater than those of the other years and in the contest for the Association Cup today the shooting was marked by a record tally made by Sergeant I. F. Archibald, of St. John, who rolled up 100 in a possible 105 points, the first time such a score has been made in this range.

Other scores were high and the average was eight points better than in the contest for the Association Cup last year. Others who were well up in the totals were Lieut. MacFarlane, of Fredericton, and J. J. Finkerton, of St. John, who made 99 and 98 respectively.

The shooting in this match was done against quite a strong and tricky wind, but the light all day was encouraging. The wind was stronger

in the afternoon, when the McLean match was in progress and from thirteen to nineteen minutes had to be allowed in order to calculate on locating the bull. The sun beamed brightly all through the day and it was very warm. The marksmen were well pleased with the result of the shoot up to the present and are particularly thankful to the weather man for his consideration.

BEATING ALL RECORDS
Never has such splendid shooting been done on the Sussex range by the P.R.A. members. Last year a score of 96 won the Association Cup and marks of 82 shared in the distribution of prizes, but at today's as high as 90 was counted out and when it is considered that there were forty-five who made this figure or more today, the high standard of efficiency will readily be recognized.

In this match the winner becomes the recipient of the challenge cup and \$10 in cash while there were fifty-two prizes aggregating \$153. The firing was at 200, 500 and 600 yards.

MADE NEW RECORD
AT AUGUSTA TRACK

Put State of Maine Mark for Half-Mile Track at 2.09 1-4--Third Place for Bingcas

Augusta, Me., Aug. 13--Before a crowd of 6000 Billy Patten, a bay gelding sired by Bingen and owned and driven by "Billy" O'Neil of Lexington, Mass., took the third heat of the 2.14 pace at the Hanks race meet this afternoon, making the mile in 2.09½ a new State record for the half mile track.

The record mile came after Edna B. had taken two heats the first in 2.10½ and the second in 2.11½. In the third O'Neil made his drive in the home stretch after seemingly devoting all his attention to Northern Spy. He came down the stretch in a whirlwind rush outside Edna B., and passed her within 10 feet of the wire.

The horses went to the quarter in 33½ to the half in 1.03, the three-quarters in 1.36½ and the mile in 2.09½. Edna B took the fourth and deciding heat in rather slow time.

Two other races were completed and two heats were run in the 2.08 stake pace Frank Bogash Jr, made it three straight heats in the 2.16 pace but every heat was a race with May Day.

A bad spill marred the 2.20 pace, which went to Susie M. In the second heat Mattie March fell on entering the last turn and Kavaek went over her. Both drivers, "Doc" King and Martin, were thrown but neither was seriously injured.

Mercer C, a local horse took second money to the great delight of the crowd, who cheered John Metcalf her driver. The summary:
