SEMI-TERCENTARY OF NOVA SCOTIA PARLIAMENT

(Halifax Chronicle)

Necessarily Nova Scotia at the moment is attracting special attention among the Provinces in connection with the further commemoration of the semi-tercentenary of the convening of its first Parliament. In more than one feature of its vivid history and because of the part the Province has played in the great Imperial drama Nova Scotia may well be regarded a Province of Destiny.

Nova Scotia has a legitimate claim to be considered the section of the whole North American Continent first discovered by Europeans, and barring a single Spanish occupation in Florida Nova Scotia is certainly that part of North American Continent first settled by Europeans. Our Province of all Canada was the first to come under the authority of the British Crown. From the first days of colonization, Nova Scotia had been thrust into the foreground as the gem of special desire, with England and France as the two mighty contestants in the game. The supreme stake in the last resort connected itself with the Oversea dominion of the world. The stages of the great Imperial War for this immense stake lapsed into more than one century, while the theatre of the war ranged the continents. The battle-fields were the seaboard of the world. Through all the territorial entanglements, Nova Scotia was the contested Province.

Acadia, as our Province had been basically styled, had barely been settled by the French in 1605 ere the fighting was forced, by English adventurers from the colony in Virginia, which had been established in 1607. Nova Scotia was to be the pawn of more than one King throughout its lengthened record, and first in that respect fell to the lot of King James the First. In 1621, this monarch granted the whole Acadian territory to Sir William Alexander on the ground that it was part of the British Dominions by right of the Cabot discoveries, and fixed its 'new name' of Nova Scotia—New Scotland—for all time.

Resettlements were—aggressively undertaken by the French, followed by their dispossession in 1628. Restoration to France followed four years later under the Treaty of St. Germaine. Nova Scotia continued under the flag of King Louis for twenty years, until the strong days of Cromwell. French diplomacy again sought its restoration. The effort proved abortive. The passing of Nova Scotia to France under treaty the first time had not been agreeable to the Parliamentary party in England, then 'at the beginning of its sanguinary struggle with King Charles. Now that in the time of the Commonwealth, that party was in possession of all authority in London and was in close touch with New England sentiment, it was in close touch with New England sentiment, it was determined to retain Nova Scotia. Upon the Restoration of the Stuart line a few years later however, the diplomacy of France scored another triumph, the Province again becoming French. Sir Thomas Temple, the British Governor at the time reluctantly surrendered Nova Scotia at the King's command, and holdly wrote King Charles the Second, that "Nova Scotia was a country of infinite advantage to His Majesty and his subjects."

Nova Scotia remained French for another twenty-two years. They followed a new phase in the fateful story of the Province. Sir William Phipps, the British commander at Nova Scotia's retaking in 1690, shortly after that year became Governor of Massachusetts, being a New Englander himself. Through his influence with the British authorities he succeeded in uniting Nova Scotia to and incorporating it with the Province of Massachusetts Bay, for the purpose of holding it tighter for English interests in America. A few years later French diplomacy again secured Nova Scotia's restoration.

The battle royal was soon to follow which was to decide the Province's ultimate destiny. Britain's growing command of the sea, as the seventeenth century closed had become an unquestioned factor. New adjustments of territory following

the victories of Marlborough, this Province under the Treaty of Utrecht in 1713, finally passed to the British Crown. Thus two hundred years ago the curtain rang down.

For thirty years after Nova Scotia finally became "All-Red" on the map the alternations of colonial policy cut little if any figure in England. The stability of the throne of the House of Hanover overshadowed every other issue. Accordingly it was not until 1749, that what has come to be recognized as the master stroke in the long drawn out drama occurred in the founding of Halifax. The settlement of Nova Scotia once determined upon, a new purpose in colonial government, shortly afterwards began to assert itself.

Pitt's accession at this time to real power in England determined the policy of the British Empire, which was to have for its aim the planting of sovereign States of British freemen throughout the globe. Thus again did Nova Scotia assume place as the Province of destiny, for in 1758, our Province as is now recognized throughout the English-speaking world, became the home of the pioneer Parliament of the British Commonwealths of the twentieth century.

CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION
