In its work of diminishing the prevalence of disease and mortality the New York State Department of Health has asked the co-operation of labor unions throughout the State. CUT IN DUTY BENEFIT TO CONSUMER

Ottawa, Aug. 23—There has been an enormous increase in cement importations since the government granted the rebate of one-half of the duty on cement. Statistics at hand show that during July the importations increased by nearly nine hundred per cent over July, 1911. The imports were 95,802 hundred-weight, valued at \$36,436. For July of this year the figures jumped to 135,920 hundredweight, valued at \$338,165. The June increase was 202 per cent, so that the shipments from the United States are increasing.

INAUGURATION OF GREAT CELEBRATION

Columbus, O., Aug. 26—Rounding out a career of one hundred years as the permanent capital of Ohio, there began in Columbus today a celebration in honor of the great forward strides that the century has witnessed. During the entire week there will be a succession of reunions, patriotic meetings, brilliant fetes and historical pageants, all in honor of the centennial anniversary.

The formal inauguration of the celebration of the great natal day, marking the passage of a century since the seat of the State Government was removed from Chillicothe to Columbus, began with salute of a hundred guns, the ringing of bells and the screeching of countless factory whistles. The man was devoted chiefly to the reception of the many prominent persons invited to take part in the celebration.

Features of the week will include a reunion of descendants of Ohio governors, a military and civic parade of Grand Army veterans, and historical exercises under the auspices of the Daughters of the American Revolution and other societies.

Two evenings of the week will be devoted to an elaborate pageant entitled "The Story of the State," showing, in artistic magnificence and historical accuracy scenes of the old Northwest Territory and Ohio from the time of the Mound Builders, the seat of whose densest population was Ohio, down to the present day.

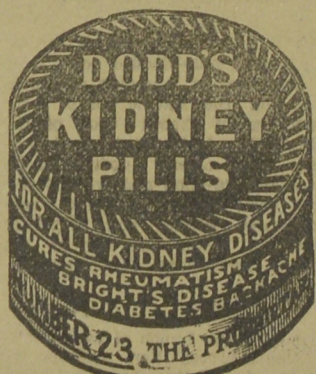

AROOSTOOK POTATO BELOW LAST YEAR

(Bangor Commercial.)
Judging from estimates made by one hundred potato growers of Aroostook county, the potato crop in Maine's greatest potato producing section will be at least twenty-five per cent. below last season's mark. This information is from F. E. Embree of Riverhead, N. Y., who, with his father, C. E. Embree, the general manager of the Farmer's Union of Maine, has been making a trip to Aroostook county.

"I have just returned from Aroostook county," Mr. Embree told a Commercial man, and I found that there has been a slight acreage in that section. In talking over the situation with one hundred potato growers, I found that those one hundred men showed an increase in acreage over last year of 139 acres. They also estimated that through the excessive wet weather they had lost completely an acre a piece of potatoes, which left a small percentage of increase.

"The decrease in yield for this season due to weather conditions they placed at twenty-five per cent, and it was the opinion of all of them that there would be about a seventy-five per cent. crop there this year."

"Such potatoes as they will get promise to be exceptionally good. Shipments from Aroostook county will not come freely until about the middle of September, but there is some talk of a car being sent out of Presque Isle the last of this week or the first of next. It certainly will be immature stock. The market conditions at the consuming end has a tendency just now to cause buyers to get things moving as soon as they can, both Boston and New York markets being particularly good just at present."

"Along the Maine Central points I figure that there will be thirty or forty per cent. increase in acreage over last year. The fields in Central Maine are looking exceedingly well and the indication is that the yield will be a good one."

"Notwithstanding the increased acreage along the Maine Central the crop there will not be up to 1910, when 5,300,000 bushels of potatoes were shipped from Maine Central points. In 1911 these were only 2,700,000 bushels. The increased acreage will not make up the difference between the two years."

TRANS-MISSISSIPPI CONGRESS

Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 26—Everything is in readiness for the opening of the twenty-third annual meeting of the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress, which will begin a four days' session in this city tomorrow. Scores of delegates are in the city to take part in the meeting. Among them are representatives of chambers of commerce, boards of trade, commercial clubs, manufacturing, mercantile and traffic, mining, live stock, immigration, maritime, drainage and waterway improvement association throughout the country. Governors of State, mayors of cities, representatives in Congress and many other public officials will be included in the attendance.

The subject "See America First," is one which will be given much attention by the congress this year. Government statistics show that every year from \$350,000,000 to \$400,000,000 of American money is spent in Europe by tourists. The congress will undertake the task of turning the tide of American travel to Europe to the magnificent scenic spots of the United States and Canada.

BOZEMAN'S SWEET PEA CARNIVAL

Bozeman, Mont., Aug. 26—The famous rose carnivals of Portland and Pasadena have a rival in Bozeman's sweet pea carnival, which was ushered in today under the most auspicious conditions. The entire week will be devoted to festivity and entertainment. The features will include magnificent floral pageants, a sangerfest of the German singing societies of Montana and a variety of outdoor sports. The number of early arrivals indicates an immense attendance of visiting later in the week.
