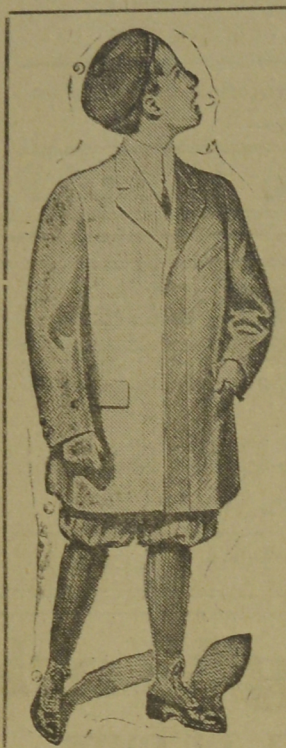

## Woodstock Colts Took Double Header From the Pets Yesterday

Scores 1 to 0 and 2 to 1--Hanley Pitched Both for Woodstock--Fredericton had off day, but Reckless Base Running Spoiled Chances--League Race Closer as Result

TRIS SPEAKER

BREAKS INTO 400 CLASS THIS WEEK

Red Sox Player did Terrific Work With the Stick--Zimmerman still Leads National

The Boston Red Sox enjoy the distinction of having one of the only two .400 hitters at present in captivity, Tris Speaker having moved up to .401 through his terrific stick work last week. Curiously Speaker's best week of the year immediately followed his poorest one, for in the week ending Aug. 17 Tris made only three hits going without any at all in the last three days of the week.

Last week however he more than made up for that shortage by piling out 14 singles and pushing his percentage up 11 points from .398. Speaker's batting average for the week was .667.

Ty Cobb of Detroit increased his average a single point to .416. Joe Jackson about held his own and is rated at .378.

Elsewhere through the .300 list there has been little change except that Jones of Detroit has dropped into the 290s. The .300 or better batsmen omitting those who have not played in at least 10 games are as follows:

Zimmerman gained on Bill Sweeney in the fight for hitting honors last week, "Heine" now having .387, while Boston's hard hitter is 21 points lower with .366.

There has been a general falling off in the work of even the best batters, the .300 class men being bunched closer than ever before this season, and many men wavering just above the distinguishing mark.

Two Boston men, Titus and Gowdy, dropped below .300 during the week, as did also Mensor of Pittsburgh. McCormick of New York, and Grant of Cincinnati, also fell just below .300 but are very close to the line.

Young Cotter, the Fordham College boy catching for the Cubs, has come into the honor list and so have two Brooklyn players, Phelps and Cuthshaw.

Duggan's Pets dropped two games yesterday and they were two of a double-header with the Woodstock Colts. The score of the first was 1 to 0 and of the second 2 to 1. It was almost a shut-out on both barrowing occasions, the run that prevented it in the second game coming in the ninth inning. Poor coaching and reckless base-running can be set down as the cause of both defeats and instead of Fredericton having a safe lead in the race for the league championship the home team will have to dig in to maintain its lead.

To Lynch, the new pitcher who was sent in as a pinch hitter, belongs the honor of saving the Pets from a double whitewash as his two-base hit in the ninth inning of the second struggle drove across the pan the only run Fredericton scored during the day. And Lynch spoiled his work by trying to stretch the two-base hit into a three-bagger and getting caught at third base.

Brown pitched the first game for Fredericton and Sharkey the second, and both pitched well enough to win.

Errors on neither side were costly but it seemed to be the day that Fredericton was doomed to defeat.

For Woodstock Hanley pitched both games and was in good form. His feat of winning both games of a double-header is some class. Fredericton found him however, and particularly in the second game batted him hard enough to win.

All through the season reckless base-running has cost Fredericton both runs and games. Yesterday it was very noticeable. In the first game two and in the second game a like number of men were caught at the plate and Lynch died at third when the put-out meant the end of all chances of winning.

### FIRST GAME.

In the first game the Colts hit safely in first, second and fourth innings but got no man past second. In the fifth they scored their solitary and winning run. Doherty, their new short-stop, struck out but Hanley singled. Black hit safely and there were two on. Williams hit to Bob Conley, who got Black at second, leaving men on first and third. Duff came over with a hit and Hanley scored but Williams was caught at the plate, Larry Conley relaying the ball to Brother Bob. There was no more scoring. "Hank" Callahan, the erstwhile Fredericton second-baseman who covered the second sack for Woodstock, reached second on a hit and an error in the seventh, but was thrown out at third.

Fredericton had several chances to score but lost them. Up to the sixth inning Hanley was found for three safe ones but nobody got as far as second. In the sixth Bob Conley made everybody's hopes soar by driving out a three-bagger. Duggan followed with what ordinarily would have been a sacrifice fly but Bob neglected to go through the formality of holding third till the fly was caught and though he crossed the plate was declared out. In the next inning chances also looked good. Bob Conley drove out a two-base hit, Larry Conley hit to "Hank" Callahan but was safe on his error and Bob trying to get home on the same was thrown out at the plate. Hoyt hit safely and stole second. Fitzgerald fled out, however, and Harrington sent in as a pinch hitter in "Red" Wildes' place, struck out and ended the seven innings.

### SECOND GAME.

Sharkey, who went in to pitch for Fredericton the second game, allowed but three hits up to the sixth. One of those was a two-bagger by Duff in the fourth and Duff went to third on a single, but died there. In the sixth Duff came along with another two-base hit and stole third. Perley sacrificed and a run came in. Woodstock did nothing more till Stone came to bat in the ninth and drove

out one good for three bases, Johnny Murray had a passed ball and he scored.

Fredericton could not get going. Duggan hit safely in the first inning and Murray got a two-base hit in the second but neither got any farther. In the fourth Bob Conley threatened to score. He drew a base on balls, advanced to second on an error and took third when Wildes hit to left field but was thrown out at the plate when he tried to score on the hit. A double play by Doherty and Duff in the eighth cooked all chances there and in the last spasm the Pets saved a shut-out as mentioned before which Lynch made a two-base hit.

## JACK BRITTON MEETS MURPHY FOR TITLE TONIGHT

Chicago Light-Weights Touted as Logical Claimant to Title Since Getting Popular Verdict Over McFarland

If Jack Britton the Chicago lightweight is the nonpareil of the boxing game as the sports of the West term him, then local fans will see a great bout when he clashes with Eddie Murphy of South Boston in the 12-round bout at the Pilgrim A. A. Tuesday night.

Not since the late Jack Dempsey and Joe Gans has there been such a classy boxer as Britton in the way the latter is spoken about by the sports where he has boxed. Since he gained the popular verdict over Packey McFarland in Memphis last year Britton has found it hard work getting bouts.

The lightweights prefer to meet Wolgast of McFarland rather than risk a bout with Britton. Before the local fans will give him the reputation accorded him by those of other cities they want to see him dispose of Murphy.

Just at present Murphy is going at his best, and while he is not the flashy boxer that others are, still he is classed among the leaders in that class and is a fast and clever boxer and it is that kind of a boxer that the local fans like to see.
