## A REPENTANT SINNER

The Halifax Herald, the chief organ of the Tory flag-bearers in Nova Scotia, is sore on the Borden government because it has decided to carry out the Liberal policy with respect to extensive harbor improvements at the port of St. John. The Herald sees nothing big in sight in the way of government expenditure for Halifax and it is very angry in consequence. In a recent issue it said editorially:

"Confederation took place in 1867. The people of Nova Scotia were not consulted about it. They were simply dragged into it by the hair of their political heads. That is an indisputable historical fact. From 1867 to 1874 a Conservative Government under Sir John Macdonald was in power in Canada.

What did it do for Nova Scotia? It built the Intercolonial Railway. It was bound to do that by the terms of Confederation.

The Nova Scotia end of that railway paid from the first. It has borne the chief part in paying deficits in the rest of the road ever since."

And again:  
"In 1873 a Conservative government under Sir John A. Macdonald, returned to power. It introduced the National Policy, which has done so much for Western Quebec and Ontario, but which—outside of our coal and iron industries—merely added to the taxation of the Maritime Provinces."

The admission by the Tory organ that the National Policy has "merely added to the taxation of the Maritime Provinces" is somewhat tardy, but it is nevertheless true. During the recent Dominion election campaign the same statement was made by Liberal public men in advocating a policy that would have given a measure of relief, but those who made it were characterized as disloyal by the flag flapping element and The Herald was one of the chief sinners in this regard. There is no question about it, high tariffs and the policy of forcing trade through unnatural channels had been ruinous to the Maritime Provinces. It is good to know that there are signs of an awakening and that the repentant sinners includes an influential Tory newspaper.

The Flemming government has by an order in council brought into force an act passed by the former administration creating a bureau of labor. Col. the Hon. Harry F. McLeod has been named as commissioner which may be taken as an indication that there will be very little labor attached to the job. Col. McLeod has been a member of the Legislature for upwards of four years and the legislation which he has promoted in the interests of labor could easily be written on a postage stamp.

St. John Telegraph—Mr. Foster is urged by the Toronto Star to give reciprocity an honest and unprejudiced examination, remembering that two men out of three in Canada are food-producers, and only one man out of three in the United States is a food-producer. He may find, the Star suggests, that there is more benefit in reciprocity than in his plan of "reciprocity with Russia or in any scheme for subsidizing ships to haul butter, eggs, frozen mutton and rabbits from Australia."

The members of the most exemplary local government do not appear overly anxious to hand out information to the Opposition members of the Legislature with respect to expenditures made on public works during the past year. What are they afraid of.

Mr. R. B. Bennett, Tary M. P. for Calgary, in a recent speech before the Montreal Canadian Club is reported by the Star of that city to have dwelt at length on the need of markets and equitable taxation for the west. Mr. Bennett is right, the farmers of the west need markets, and so do the farmers of the east. It is to be hoped that Mr. Bennett will let slip no opportunity to impress his views upon the powers that be at Ottawa.

Premier Flemming claims that the interests of the people of the province are amply safeguarded by the St. John Valley Railway bill which he brought down in the House yesterday. So long as the Premier carries out the policy advocated by Hon. Dr. Pugsley and other Liberals, as he seems to be doing in this case the province will have nothing to fear.

Premier Flemming in bringing down the St. John Valley Railway bill in the Legislature went out of his way to attack Hon. Dr. Pugsley and other Liberals who have been interested in the work of furthering this great enterprise. Instead of criticizing these gentlemen he should return thanks to them for the ideas which he pilfered and embodied in the bill.

The candidate of the Tory machine was soundly beaten in the Municipal bye election in the Parish of Queensbury yesterday. Straws sometimes show which way the wind is blowing.

## TORY M.P.'S SPEECH KICKS UP RUMPUS

## PLUCKY MESSENGER THWARTS ROBBERS

San Antonio, Tex., March 13—A young express messenger named Truesdale balked the robbery of a Southern Pacific train near Sanderson early today, when he trapped two highwaymen who had held up the train and killed them. The robbers boarded train No. 9, westbound, a few miles east of Sanderson. The mail and express cars and the locomotive were detached from the passenger coaches. Then the engineer, under cover of the robber's guns, was compelled to run the two or three coaches ahead of the remainder of the train. One of the robbers took the express messenger Truesdale back to the train and kept him under guard, while the other robber covered the crew in the cars ahead and started to rifle the safe and express boxes. Truesdale is said to have employed the old ruse of signaling to an imaginary person back of his captor. When the robber turned, Truesdale grasped a mallet and before the highwayman could shoot, dashed out his brains. Then, arming himself with the dead robber's gun, Truesdale waited for the return of the other bandit. After he had rifled the express boxes the second man returned to the coaches. Stepping from cover, Truesdale killed him. All of the stolen property was recovered and the train proceeded.
