OFFICIAL REPORT

The House met at three o'clock on Tuesday.

Mr. Sweeney rose to a question of privilege of making an explanation which he felt was due Mr. Speaker and the members of the House. When he had moved the adjournment of the debate on Saturday, it had been with the idea that he would have been in his place yesterday to have resumed. He could not get to Fredericton from Moncton on Monday through the trains being delayed by a heavy snow storm. The fact that he was not in his seat was on account of these circumstances over which he had no control. He was very sorry he was unable to be present yesterday, but trusted that the opportunity would be afforded him later on to say what he would have said to the House had he been in attendance yesterday. He desired to thank the Speaker, the Hon. Premier and the members of the House for the courtesy shown him.

Hon. Mr. Murray reported for the Special Committee appointed to present the address of the House to His Honor the Lieutenant Governor that they had performed their duty and received a reply from His Honor to the Legislative Assembly which read as follows:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I thank you for your address. I need not reassure you that I entertain the fullest confidence in your earnest desire to promote the happiness, prosperity and best interests of the people of this province.

(Signed) JOSIAH WOOD.

Hon. Mr. Murray submitted the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Mr. Dickson submitted the report of the Agriculture Committee.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey in reply to Mr. Copp's enquiry said that work on wharves and bridges in Queens Co. since the close of the fiscal year amounted to \$5,044.66 on bridges and \$2,872.12 on wharves. He said that it would take perhaps three weeks of the time of the House to read all the detailed account as requested in the enquiry. He said he was ready and willing to have this done if the hon. leader of the Opposition who made the enquiry wished it. He asked the permission of the speaker to have the Secretary of the Board of Works come into the House and take charge of the accounts as it was not desirable that they should pass out of his possession.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey then commenced to read the accounts.

Mr. Labilliois said that he had been in the House as a member for twenty-nine years and in all that time he had never seen such a procedure. He could not see why the enquiry could not be answered in the regular way and he said it looked as if there was a "nigger in the wood pile" some where.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said that it was the wish of the Government to give all reasonable information freely and fully in reply to inquiries which might be made by hon. gentlemen. The public accounts would be submitted to the Public Accounts Committee by whom they would not doubt be submitted to a careful scrutiny. The carrying out of the enquiry made by the hon. leader of the Opposition in the usual way would mean having type written a complete duplicate of the accounts in

detail when there was a committee of this House to which the accounts were to be submitted.

Mr. LaBillois said that the accounts since the close of the year would not go before the public accounts committee at this session. It was known that large expenditures had been made before the close of the last fiscal year and the payments held over until after the 31st October.

Mr. Speaker said that any debate on the method used in answering inquiries in the House was entirely out of order and that hon. gentlemen would have to accept the answers as given without debating.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey then resumed the reading of the accounts.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey in answer to Mr. LaBillois's enquiry regarding amount paid for public works in Kent Co. said he was prepared to answer the hon. gent fully but that he would occupy considerable of the valuable time of the House.

Mr. LaBillois said he would like the information. If the Chief Commissioner would allow any member of the Opposition to go in to the Dept. and look over the accounts at any time he would be perfectly satisfied.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey said that in would give every assistance to any Opposition member and in fact court ed an enquiry.

Mr. LaBillois—That is satisfactory. Answers to enquiries.....

NO BOUNTIES FOR STEEL, STOCK IS VERY WEAK

New York, N.Y., March 13—The opening of the stock market was strong and active on more favorable news from London re coal labor difficulties there, while belief that the strike in the anthracite fields of Pennsylvania could be averted by granting an increase in wages to miners was also a bullish factor. U.S. Steel opened at 65 and 65½, the latter representing a gain of ½ over night. It was contended that new short interest had been formed in stock within the last few days. Lehigh Valley and Reading were strong.

In Union Pacific initial gain was ½ in that stock, a traders' short interest of some extent having recently been formed. Alameda Copper gained ½ over night. American Sugar was strong, selling up 2½ points. Stocks were supplied on the opening advance but selling was pretty well taken, although the Street was not inclined to place implicit confidence in the report that British coal strike had been settled.

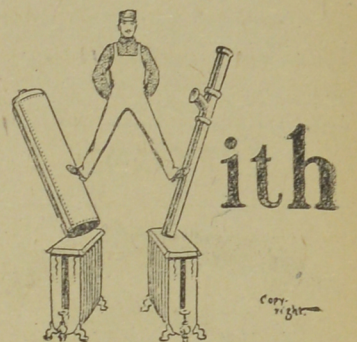
