WILL LEAD LIBERALS IN THE RED CHAMBER

Ottawa, Nov. 26.—Sir George Ross, ex-premier of Ontario, was recently chosen by a fully attended caucus of the Liberal senators to lead them in the upper House, in succession to the late Sir Richard Cartwright. Hon. Mr. Bostock of British Columbia, was also nominated for the position, but the choice of the majority fell upon the veteran ex-premier and the decision was made unanimously. Sir George himself did not attend the caucus and the proffer of the leadership was made to him by a committee of the caucus consisting of Senators Dandurand, Beique, Jaffray, Edwards and Power.

Sir George was most cordially received by his fellow-senators when he joined the caucus in response to the invitation.

In announcing his acceptance of the offer of leadership he expressed at the same time his deep regret at the loss to the senate and Canadian public life of the late leader, Sir Richard Cartwright. Sir George expressed the hope that as leader he would always be able to conduct the discussion of public questions in harmony with the views of his fellow-senators and maintain the dignity and independence of the Senate as one of the great estates of the realm. He voiced the confident hope that he would be given all needed assistance in the conduct of the business of the Senate and in realizing the aim of maintaining high standards of public and political morality.

Sir George's long experience of public life, extending over a period of forty years in both federal and provincial politics, his large knowledge of all the political issues of parliament and his well-recognized powers of oratory and debate, led to his choice as leader, although still one of the younger members of the Senate in point of service at Ottawa. He was appointed to the upper Chamber in 1907.

The caucus passed a resolution of condolence to the family of the late Sir Richard Cartwright, expressing the deep sense of loss in the death of one who had so long and ably upheld the best traditions of public life.

Sir George Ross was born in Williams Township, Middlesex county, on September 18, 1841, son of James Ross, a native of Ross-shire, Scotland. He received his education in the public school, the Normal School in this city, and Albert University, Belleville. He is an honorary LL.D. of St. Andrew's University, Scotland, the University of Toronto, Victoria University, McMaster University and Queen's University. After leaving Albert University he became a teacher and subsequently inspector of public schools and inspector of Model Schools. He also studied law, becoming a solicitor in 1883 and a barrister in 1887.

Sir George commenced his political career forty years ago, when he was elected in the Liberal interests as member for West Middlesex in the House of Commons in 1872. He was returned also in the elections of 1874, 1878 and 1882. In 1883 he entered the Mowat cabinet of Ontario as minister of education, which position he held until 1899. In that year, on the retirement of Hon. Mr. Hardy, he succeeded to the premiership, occupying the position in the provincial government until its defeat in 1905. Two years later he was called to the Senate. He was knighted in 1910.

As a writer Sir George began his career by editing The Strathroy Age, The Huron Examiner and The Ontario Teacher. His publications include: "The Life and Times of Hon. Alexander Mackenzie," jointly with William Buckingham; "History of Public and Separate Schools"; "Patriotic Recitations for Public and High Schools," and "Reports on the

LIBERTY OF SUBJECT MUST BE VINDICATED

Winnipeg, Nov. 22.—The public protest of the citizens of Winnipeg against the subversion of justice in the unwarranted arrests and illegal hailing of four men during the McDonald bye-election by the Manitoba authorities as well as against other equally unwarranted acts of the same parties was voiced tonight at a meeting held in Manitoba Hall. The big auditorium was packed to the doors and enthusiasm ran high during the course of several excellent speeches by leading public men of the Province. The four young men arrested, and held in jail, refused bail and finally discharged without even an opportunity to inquire why they had been deprived of their liberty occupied seats on the platform. All four, Capt. W. B. Sifton of Minicomas; D. H. Wilkinson of Winnipeg; J. J. Sullivan of Melville, and R. J. A. Prince of St. Boniface gave excellent speeches in the course of which they edited the big gathering with stirring and sometimes humorous recitals of their experience in the different jails in which they were held.

STRONG RESOLUTION ADOPTED.

The main speeches of the evening were by T. O. Morris, leader of the Liberal Opposition in the Manitoba Legislature and by R. L. Richardson the Independent candidate in MacDonald. The temper of the meeting was expressed in the following resolution introduced in an effective speech by Thos. Johnson, M.P.P., West Winnipeg, seconded by E. D. Martin:—"That the Canadian citizens here assembled regard with abhorrence and alarm the conduct of the Manitoba authorities charged with the administration of justice, in arresting by executive order, British citizens holding them in prison by refusal of bail and finally abandoning the case without the preferment of charges to which they might make answer according to the law.

"That this action for which the Prime Minister and Government are responsible was subversive of freedom was an exercise of absolutism repugnant to the letter and spirit of British law, and constituted such an offence against the lawful rights of the individual as to impose upon the people as their first duty the obligation of vindicating the law and re-establishing in this province the liberty of the subject."

JUMPED FROM WINDOW WHILE IN A DREAM

New York, Nov. 25.—Dreaming that there was a fire in her apartment, Mrs. Ida Radka, wife of a New York banker walked in her sleep to a window in an uptown hotel early today and plunged down to a skylight several stories below. She was seriously injured but not fatally hurt. She explained her dream when picked up then elapsed into unconsciousness.

The staunch old craft was slated for a season of halibut fishing but G. Sydney Smith removed the danger of this sordid chapter in an honored ship's varied career by purchasing her for his own use. The Casco will be thoroughly overhauled in Vancouver and there will be restored to it something of the elegance which distinguished it when R. L. S. wrote many of his South Sea stories in its cabin. "Treasure Island" is one of the Stevenson tales which was brought to light in the Casco, which has been north with a sealing fleet for seven years.

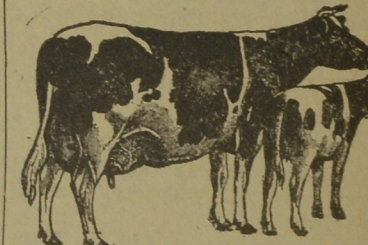

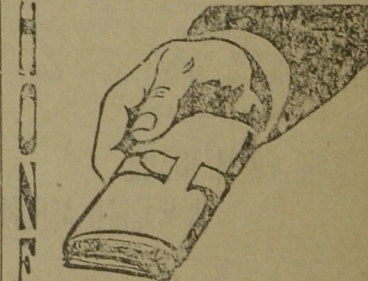

SECOND DARROW TRIAL

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 23.—Monday is the day set for beginning the second trial of Clarence S. Darrow, who was chief counsel for the defense in the McNamara dynamiting cases. Mr. Darrow is to be tried on an indictment charging him with the bribery of Robert E. Bain, a juror in the McNamara trial. Some months ago he was tried on an indictment charging a similar offense and acquitted.
