STATE WILL REVOKE SHAPARO'S LICENSE

Albany, N.Y., Nov. 27—Wm. Shaparo of New York, driver of the "murder car" used by the murderers of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, and one of the witnesses for the state at the recent trial of the gunmen, will not be permitted to operate an automobile in this state after January 31st next, when his chauffeur's license will expire. The secretary of state says he has issued such orders and that he would revoke Shaparo's license if he has the authority. Shaparo, when released recently, announced that he expected to return to his occupation as a chauffeur.

COL. D. McLEOD VINCE

DIED ON MONDAY

Woodstock, N.B., Nov. 26—Col. D. McLeod Vince, one of the best known barristers in New Brunswick, and a man held in the highest esteem by all denominations, passed away at his home here last evening at ten o'clock. He had been in failing health for the past year but was able to attend to business until about five weeks ago. Col. Vince was born in Berwick on Tweed, Nov. 20, 1848. His father, Robert Vince, was a veteran of the Crimean War and his mother was a McLeod. He was educated in Dublin and came to New Brunswick in 1866. He first engaged in teaching under the old school law and afterwards became active in mercantile business. In 1879 he entered the office of the late Hon. L. P. Fisher, as a law student and was a graduate of the Boston Law School, and in 1883 was admitted as an attorney and has since that time worked up a large practice. The real purpose and energy of his life, however, was given to the work of the Canadian militia, and he was known in Canada as one of its most efficient officers. Col. Vince was a member of the United Baptist Church, and since the amalgamation of the two churches was chairman of the New Brunswick Conference. When the Public Utilities Commission was appointed Col. Vince was made its chairman. In the early days, when the Conservative party was not as strong as at present, he unsuccessfully contested three elections as candidate of his party, in 1887 against the late F. H. Hale, and in 1891 against Dr. Colter. This election was protested and in the by-election in 1892 he was again defeated. He was a member of Woodstock Lodge, F. & A. M. The death will be mourned by many friends. He will long be remembered by all who knew him because of his charitable disposition and his splendid exemplification during life of a true Christian gentleman. He is survived by a widow, whose maiden name was Nevers, and two daughters, Mrs. Guy Fisher of Kalowna, B.C., and Lulu, at home, and two sons, Neville and E. Rabien, also at home.

ENGLAND NEVER ON HER KNEES

"A minister said during the summer that England was on her knees", said Sir George. "If she is, let us help her at once, and if it makes a few millions to get her on her feet let us place her there by all means. If she is on her knees, it is the first time in the history of Great Britain that she ever was. At one time there was a combined hostility on the part of every European power, from Blenheim down to Waterloo, and she never went on her knees to anybody, but planted her flag wherever the sun shone, on every parallel of latitude; exacted tribute from every parallel of latitude; exacted tribute from every nation of the globe, sailed the seven seas and never bowed her head in submission to any kingdom, principality or power. And she is not going to do it now."

Montreal, Nov. 27—Plans for what is claimed by its owners will be the largest store in Canada were given out this morning by Scroggie's Ltd. Their new establishment will cover eight acres of floor space, the site which cost \$1,500,000 being located on the corner of Bleury and St. Catherine Streets. There will be five miles of aisles in the building which will be six stories in height. Work on the building will be begun at once and will not stop night or day until the building is completed on Sept. 1, 1913.

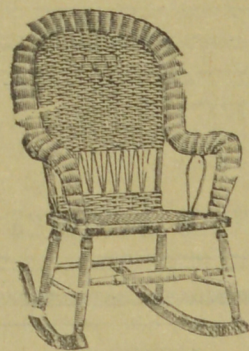
