HONOR MEMORY OF GENERAL KEARNEY

Washington, D.C., April 12—The remains of Gen. Philip Kearney, which were removed from the family vault in New York City a few days ago, were brought to this city under a distinguished escort today and reinterred in the Arlington National cemetery. The reburial of the famous federal cavalry leader was accompanied by impressive military services. President Taft attended the exercises, with the members of his cabinet, numerous senators and representatives, delegations from military and patriotic societies and a large throng of Grand Army veterans.

INVESTIGATOR MORINE REFUSES TO BE INVESTIGATED

(Toronto Globe.)

The Hon. A. B. Morine does not believe that what is sauce for the goose should be sauce for the gander. Appointed by the Borden government chairman of the public service commission, the chief head-hunting agency of the new administration, Mr. Morine proceeded to look into what Tory papers have been in the habit of calling "the welter of Liberal corruption."

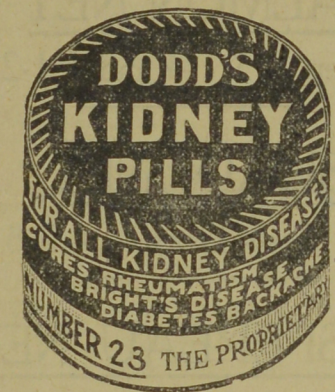
So far as the public knows, Mr. Morine up to the present time has unearthed but one scandal. It occurred not at Ottawa, but in Newfoundland, when Mr. Morine was minister of finance in the government of that colony, and at the same time legal adviser to the Reid Syndicate, which obtained important concessions from the colonial government. The core of the scandal is to be found in two letters, which The Globe takes the liberty of reprinting from the record of Mr. Carvell's speech in the House of Commons:

From Mr. Morine to Sir Herbert Murray:

"Your Excellency: In reply to your question of this date, I have the honor to say that I was before and at the same time of the making of the railway contract of 1889 and am now the professional adviser of R. G. Reid on legal questions and matters submitted to him by me, but not on such questions (if any) arising between him and the colony, and I have not advised, and would not, while I am a member of the executive council, advise him on any such matters in which there was a conflict of interest between him and the colony."

From Governor Sir Herbert Murray to Mr. Morine:

"Government House, St. John's,



November 5, 1898—Sir: I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor to inform you that he has received your letter of the fourth inst., respecting your position in the government in connection with the railway contract. His Excellency is unable to accept, either as regards the past or the future, the propriety of the position you have taken in that letter, or the assurance which you have proposed to send him as to your future conduct. His Excellency is therefore unable, as the representative of the crown in the colony, to agree to your continuing as one of its ministers. He must therefore, call upon you to resign today all the offices which you held under the crown except that of Queen's counsellor. The correspondence on the subject will have to be published and a copy of it sent to the colonial office. I have the honor to be, etc., J. W. Soythy, private secretary to the governor."

Two years after these extraordinary letters had passed between governor and minister, Mr. Morine left Newfoundland, having made an agreement with Mr. Reid to live elsewhere and draw what was in effect a pension for ten years, amounting in the aggregate to \$96,000. He came back to Canada and had just finished the absorption of this huge sum when he heard his country's call and rushed into the fray to save Canada from the corrupting influences that we were told must attend trade relations with the United States. Having by his exertions aided in saving the country, Mr. Morine like many other active patriots, obtained his reward. Mr. Borden seems to have had some sense of the fitness of things. He might have made Mr. Morine a judge. He chose him as chief executioner.

And now the executioner, having had the mask torn from his face by Mr. Carvell in parliament, gives up his office. The Mail and Empire says: "Mr. Morine's position is that the charges are groundless, and are the means taken by partisans alarmed at the prospect of exposures through the work of the commission to discredit its findings. He has taken the ground, however, that the work of the commission should not be hampered, or the results of its investigations be exposed to challenge, as a result of allegations against its personnel. Accordingly, he has placed personal considerations in the background and has offered to retire."

BELIEVES CANCER CAN BE CURED

Paris, April 11—In a paper read before the Physiotherapy Congress here last night, Dr. Doyen declared that he was now able to confirm his theory that it was possible to cure cancer, without a surgical operation by means of electrical treatment, which he described as thermic-electro coagulation.

In all the cases treated, said Dr. Doyen, the cancer was easily accessible. They included cancerous affections of the skin, lip, tongue, tonsils, larynx and other organs.

Dr. Doyen has been experimenting in this direction since 1905. In his treatment, which in the case of external cancerous affections, necessitates special electrical apparatus he depends upon the curative value of the penetrating heat produced by an electric current of high frequency and low tension.

Dr. Doyen promises to produce a number of patients who have been cured by his methods and to demonstrate that even tumors of the breast can be successfully treated in the same way.

Baltimore, Md., April 12—The annual Central Conference of American Rabbis, which was organized in 1889 at Detroit through the efforts of the reformed or liberal branch of the Jewish teachers, was opened in this city today with an address by the president, Dr. William S. Friedman of Denver. The conference sessions will continue five days and will be devoted to the discussion of numerous problems of vital interest to the Jewish race. One interesting feature will be a report showing the progress of the movement seeking to abolish derogatory characterization of the Jews on the stage and in the humorous press.
