HON. MR. MORRISSEY

The budget debate in the legislature was enlivened somewhat yesterday by a characteristic speech from Hon. John Morrissey who is familiarly known as "the big noise" of the government. The Hon. John is a master of chaste English; he glories in the possession of abnormal lung power, his disposition is angelic, his style graceful and he never fails to lend dignity and tone to a debate. He was in good form yesterday and nobly sustained the reputation he long ago established as a first class variety entertainer.

Mr. Morrissey finds it to his political advantage to pose as a Liberal and he usually takes special care to impress his auditors that he is an honest Liberal. He owes his election to Liberal votes and he knows that if he did not continue to masquerade as a Liberal he would soon be transferred into a political penitentiary, as the independent Conservatives in the assembly have little or no use for him, and never had. It is manifestly to his advantage therefore to play the game as a sort of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. He works on the principle that the people like to be humbugged and this being so he sees nothing wrong or inconsistent in posing as a Liberal one day and attending a banquet to a Tory Cabinet minister on the next. It is due to his ability to gull the public in this way that he is able to retain his portfolio in the Flemming misfit administration. In fact it is pretty generally known that he has been given to understand on more than one occasion that he must continue to extract Liberal chestnuts from the fire or rustle another job.

There are some people unkind enough to say that Mr. Morrissey's Liberalism since September 21st has not been of the same brand as it was previous to that date. There is undoubtedly some ground for that assertion but it is not altogether the Chief Commissioner's fault as conditions have changed. Liberalism which takes the form of subscribing to the cost of and attending a banquet to a Tory Cabinet Minister is a comparatively new invention in Canadian politics and it is scarcely fair to blame Mr. Morrissey for doing something since September 21st which it was not possible to do before that date. These are days of great opportunities political and otherwise and Mr. Morrissey by his action has had no difficulty in creating the impression that he is an opportunist.

Hon. John Morrissey is a political phenomenon. As a statesman he is in a class by himself and always will be. He does not possess the confidence of his colleagues in the government nor do they possess his confidence to any marked degree. They fear him but do not love him. So long as Northumberland sends Hon. John Morrissey to the Legislature so long will politics in that County remain a subject for jest.

Tories of Restigouche in convention on Thursday selected as their Standard-bearers for the local Legislature Messrs David A. Stewart and Arthur Culligan. A strong effort was put forth to induce Mr. Daniel Richards to enter the field but he positively refused to become a sacrifice. The name of Mr. Francis Blackhall was before the convention but he only received seventeen votes. Mr. Fred M. Sproule, M.P.P., was present in his capacity of a Flemming government missionary and made a speech. The ticket is a lamentably weak one and will be trimmed to a platinum finish if it ever goes to the polls.

PROTECTION AND SLAVERY

Canadian Tory papers still continue to point a moral and adorn a tale against free trade because of the coal strike in Britain and the cause leading to the same. They point out the long hours, the inadequate pay, the employment of the everyday life of the pitman and so forth, blaming the country's fiscal system for the entire trouble. The pictures are in a measure true to life, but the inference that Tariff Reform would remove the difficulty is eminently illogical. Conditions every bit as bad obtain in other countries where Protective Tariffs are as high as "Haman's Gallows." One of the causes of the great anthracite strike in Pennsylvania at the present time is described in an American paper. Little boys from ten to fourteen years of age stand or rather bend over at the bottom of long chutes down which continuous streams of anthracite coal are flowing day and night. For nine hours daily the dwarfish forms bend over the streams breaking up the large lumps and picking out pieces of slate and other material. A taskmaster known as the "boss" stands over them club in hand and keeps them at work hard and fast all the time. Even when being photographed the lads dared not look around or lift their heads for fear of "the boss" or his stick. They do not like the work but they do not know anything else. Few of them have ever been to school and fewer can read or write. They are all but by direct statute slaves in a boasted land of liberty, and where the fiscal policy of High Protection reigns supreme, and one of the modest demands of the striking miners is that of giving shorter hours to these little slaves of the chute. The children under these circumstances, might indeed echo from their hearts the moan of the poet:

"O God that bread should be so dear
And flesh and blood so cheap."

The Tory newspapers are still howling because the Senate saw fit to reject certain pet measures of the Borden government. There are several vacancies in the upper chamber, but it is safe to say that the indignation of the Tories has not lessened the number of applicants for these vacancies.

The members of the Legislature who support Premier Flemming are not what may be termed a happy family.

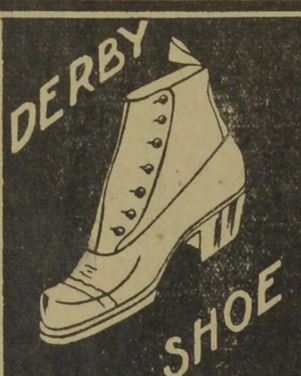
