WELL INFLATED TIRES WEAR LONGER

Many Motorists are puzzled as to why neighbors of theirs are able to get many hundreds and sometimes thousands of miles more out of their tires than they can and are often inclined to blame the make of the tire they use for the difference, instead of stopping to think that perhaps it is their own carelessness.

The one thing which ruins tires more quickly and which is accountable for perhaps 75 per cent of the tire trouble of the average Motorist is the fact that he will persist in running his Car on tires that have not been sufficiently inflated.

The Goodyear people say that all tires should be inflated up to their full capacity at all times. The proper riding capacity is 20 pounds per inch of tire diameter. Thus a 4-inch tire should be kept at 80 pounds pressure.

Some Motorists think that if they keep their tires properly inflated they are liable to burst. As a matter of fact, a tire that has been properly inflated will last twice as long as an under-inflated tire; as, if the tire is under-inflated, the side fabric is weakened by being bent and strained which causes blow-outs in the sides of the tire where 99 per cent of the blowouts occur.
