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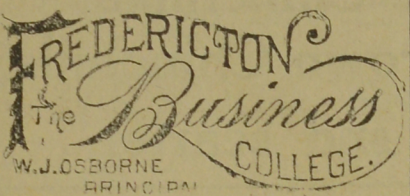

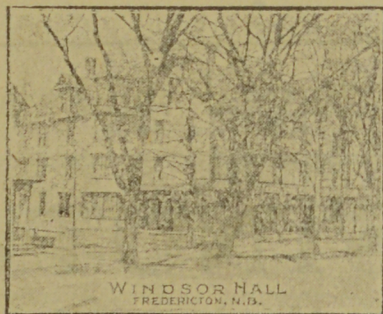

HALIFAX TO HAVE

FIRE TERMINALS

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 12—The prepara-
tion of working plans for the great
deep-water terminals which are to be
constructed at Halifax will shortly
be commenced. The intention is to
have the plans ready so that tenders
may be invited as soon as parlia-
ment has voted the money for the
work. While it is estimated that to
complete the program will require an
expense of at least thirty million
dollars, parliament will not be called
upon to vote so large a sum at the
coming session. Probably five mil-
lion dollars will suffice for the first
year's work. It is understood that
some of the larger Canadian contrac-
tors' firms are arranging to combine
for the purpose of capturing this
contract. During the last year or
two British contractors have been
walking off with the big things. Norton
Griffiths captured a ten-million
dollar contract at St. John and Sir
John Jackson got the contract for
the Victoria breakwater. The Cana-
dian Northern are to be given rights
over the Intercolonial to Halifax and
free access to the big docks when
they are completed.

TO TRY MAINE WO-
MAN FOR MURDER

Augusta, Me., Nov. 13—Witnesses
are being rounded up and other prepa-
rations concluded for the trial of
Mrs. Elsie Hobbs Raymond, which is
scheduled to begin in the Kennebec
County Court here next Monday.
Mrs. Raymond is to be tried on a
charge of murdering Mattie Hackett,
the mystery of whose death has re-
mained unsolved for more than seven
years. The murder was so myster-
ious and atrocious that it roused the
whole State of Maine.

Mattie Hackett was the young
daughter of Levi Hackett of the town
of Readfield. She was known to ev-
eryone in the rural community in
which she lived and was about to
become a bride. It was just after
supper time in the evening of August
17, 1905, that Mr. Hackett asked his
daughter to get some food for a
young tramp who had asked for sup-
per and a night's lodging. Mattie
Hackett was wiping the dishes.

The father and the tramp started
out to the barn to feed the cattle,
leaving the daughter to get the
tramp's meal. The other members of
the Hackett family were spending the
evening at a neighboring farmhouse
down the road.

The supposition is that soon after
the father and the tramp left for
the barn the young woman was called
from her home by some person and
accompanied that person to a
point about 100 yards from the door.
On the return from the barn Mr.
Hackett and the tramp heard an
outcry and hastening to the spot
found the young woman strangling.
They carried her to the house and
summoned aid.

It was several moments before a
cord was discovered drawn tightly
about Miss Hackett's neck and it
was found she was dead. Farmers
beat the bushes and cornfields about
the Hackett home for several days
in an effort to find the persons who
were supposed to have committed the
crime. The young tramp was never
accused of having any share in plan-
ning or carrying out the murder, al-
though he was held in the local jail
for several days as a witness.

Suspicion soon fell upon Mrs. Ray-
mond, an acquaintance of the murder-
ed girl, who was believed to have
been jealous of her. Mrs. Raymond
and her husband gave an account of
their movements on the evening of
the crime which established an alibi
that the State could not find evi-
dence enough to destroy. The grand
jury at that time failed to return an
indictment.

At various times the attorneys for
the State attempted to review the
evidence and gather new evidence suf-
ficient to warrant the indictment of
somebody, but nothing definite was
done until the grand jury met last
April and returned an indictment
against Mrs. Raymond, charging her
with the murder. The arrest of Mrs.
Raymond after seven years of veiled
insinuation and suspicion made a
sensation throughout this section of
Maine. Since her arrest the woman
has been confined in jail here.

Mrs. Raymond and her family ap-
pear to welcome the prospect of a
trial and express themselves as cer-
tain of acquittal. Bery Raymond,
husband of the accused woman, will
be a leading witness for the defense.
It is supposed that the State will
endeavor to prove that Raymond's
friendship for the murdered girl
aroused Mrs. Raymond's jealousy and
served as a motive for the alleged
murder.

Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Louisi-
ana and Florida, met in annual
convention in Jacksonville today for

wide reputation.

Day.

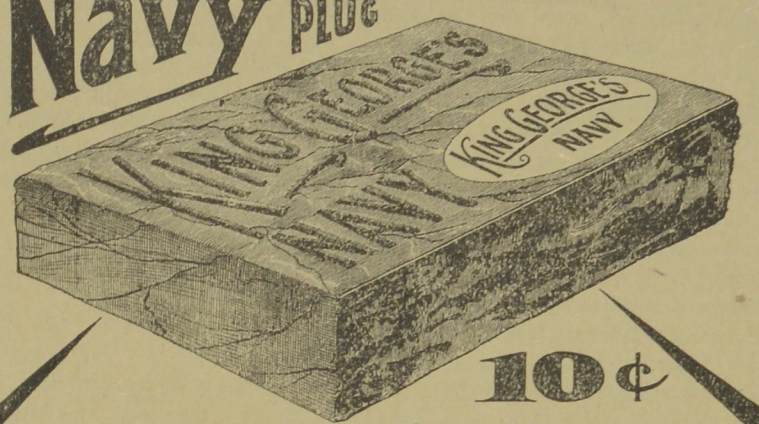

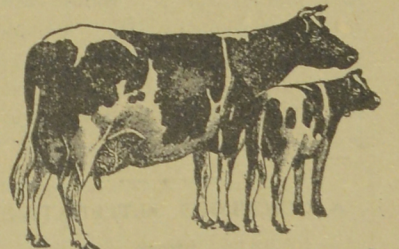

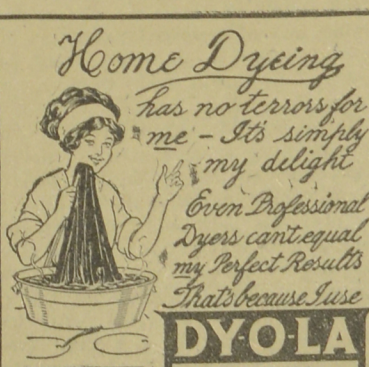
