Appeal Case Now Being Ar-  
gued Before Court

## CASES ARGUED.

Cases argued before the court yesterday afternoon and this morning were as follows:

Belle Isle vs Boucher. Mr. W. A. Trueman for the defendant, supported an appeal from the Restigouche County Court. Mr. A. T. LeBlanc contra. Mr. Trueman in reply. Court considers.

McMinnaman, plaintiff, appellant, vs Evans, defendant, respondent. Mr. J. D. Phinney, K.C., supported the appeal from the York County Court. Mr. J. J. F. Winslow, contra. Court considers.

The case of McMenniman vs Evans is a York County case which arose from the non-payment of a promissory note on the due-date and the alleged deposit in the Royal Bank of the money after that date by the respondent, Richard Evans. The complainant refused to take the money which had been placed to his credit by the bank and obtained judgment for \$140 and costs. Later Judge Wilson of the York County Court, issued an order setting aside that judgment and the present appeal is from that judgment.

## SAID NOT TO BE FAVORABLE

The attitude of a majority of the members of the City Council in the matter of an offer from the New Brunswick & British Colonization Company to sell to the city a portion of the Scully Grove property is said to be unfavorable. The price asked, upwards of \$11,000 is considered excessive. The offer probably will be considered at the regular December meeting.

## POLICE MATTERS

One drunk appeared before the police magistrate this morning and paid the usual fine. Chief of Police McCollom left for St. John last night to make arrangements to bring his family here. It is understood that he has issued instructions to the policemen concerning the proper manner in which to conduct themselves upon the streets.

REAL ESTATE  
ACTIVITY FOLLOWS  
STREET EXTENSION

Westmoreland and Northumberland  
Streets Extended---Victoria Street  
Partially Opened up---Property  
Being Sold and Leased

Considerable activity in real estate is reported to have attended recent street extension in St. Ann's and Wellington Wards. Road Commissioner H. C. Jewett has had a crew of men engaged for some days past extending and turnpiking Northumberland and Westmoreland streets and also opening Victoria and Argyle streets. Land in the vicinity of these extensions, owned by Mr. Samuel Cook and by the Campbell and Pennyfather Estates, has been made more desirable and it is understood that sales and leases of lots have occurred as a result.

## WHAT HAS BEEN DONE.

The work of the Road Commissioner and his crew is probably over for the winter as far as street extension is concerned, today's snow-storm having made road work difficult. Northumberland street has been extended and turnpiked as far as Argyle street and Westmoreland street has been extended and turnpiked as far as the point where it will be intersected by the street beyond Victoria street, which it is proposed to name Connaught. Victoria and Argyle streets are both opened between York and Westmoreland streets but probably will not be turnpiked until next spring.

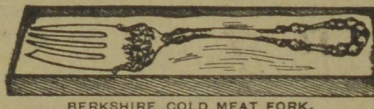

BERKSHIRE GOLD MEAT FORK.

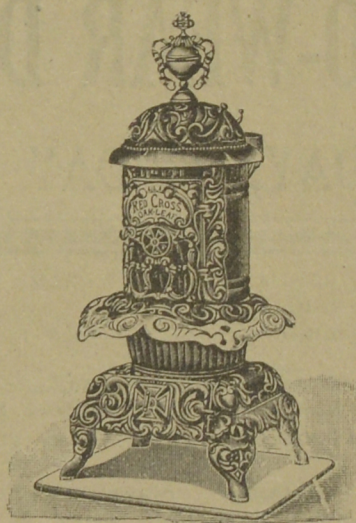
