SOME GOOD SPORT FIRST DAY AT DELOIRIER PARK

The railbirds who like to size up a horse on his looks, got the shock of their lives. In the preliminary scoring Nata looked no bigger than a pony, but once away she looked the class of the field.

In the first heat she won handily. In the second she won out after a brush in the home stretch with King Allen. The third heat King Allen's driver was given the straight tip from the stand that he did not appear to be doing his best to win. Accordingly to the third heat King Allen was put to it but at that the gallant little mare from Fall River kept him off and won handily just as the shades of the night were falling.

The other two events went in straight heats as recorded below in the summary.

Only one spill occurred during the day when Dora, a 2.30 pacer, overturned her sulky and dumped Mr. Paquet, her driver. Not a thing round the whole turn out was started, however, and Paquet was able to finish, the judges ruling that since the thing was a palpable accident Dora was still in the race though hopelessly distanced in the heat.

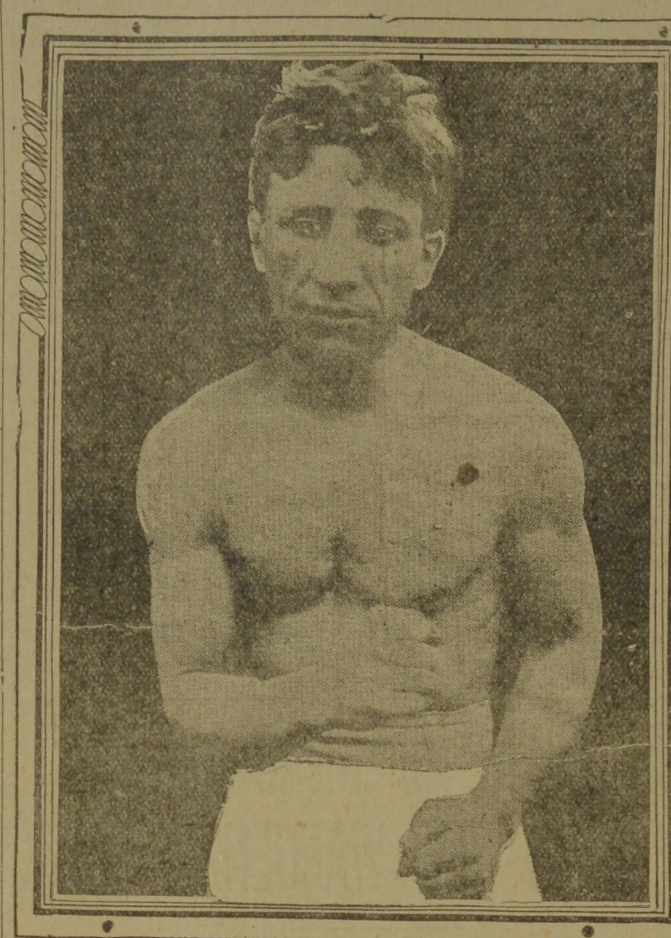

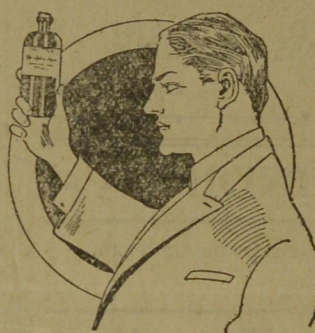

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn omestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$30.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
