POLITICS IN VICTORIA

"I propose to look after our roads and bridges with greater force than ever if I be elected. I propose to remedy the compass roads where hills were surmounted, when a slight change would abolish hard climbs. I have looked after and improved more roads in the last two years as a private citizen than have been seen to in the previous ten years under the old government."

Thus spoke Mr. J. L. White, merchant of Grand Falls in a speech delivered at Andover last week, when along with Mr. T. J. Carter, K.C., he consented to sacrifice himself for the Tory party at the next local election in Victoria. Mr. White would like to have the public believe that he is a philanthropist which in plain English means a lover of mankind. He has done a lot he says to improve the roads of Victoria and he did it according to his own story in his capacity of a private citizen. The Auditor General's report, however, tells a different story. It shows that Mr. White supplied a lot of lumber to the ordinary bridges of the County and was paid for it in good coin of the realm. Here is the record and he who runs may read:

The above statement shows that Mr. White supplied lumber to the government to the amount of \$476.18 so that he was not altogether disinterested when he devoted so much of his valuable time to the roads and bridges of the County. He has promised to go in with greater force than ever next year and incidentally abolish hard climbs.

We understand that the oft defeated T. J. Carter, K.C., has been chosen as the running mate of Mr. White for Victoria County. He also made a speech in the course of which he declared that the government had economized for the people and at the same time carried out its pledges.

Let us take a glance at the Auditor General's report and see what reason Mr. Carter has for the faith that is in him. Under the heading of "criminal prosecutions" we find that he was paid \$66 for prosecuting in the case of King vs Roach and \$25 for prosecuting in the case of the King vs Hathaway, a total of \$91. He also took a hand in prosecuting alleged violators of the game law.

In the King vs McKenney he was paid \$10, in the King vs Thompkins he was paid \$10 and in the King vs de Merchant he was paid a like amount making a total of \$30 and a grand total of \$121. True he did not fare quite as well from the political trough as his colleague but he did very well considering the limited opportunity.

Messrs White and Carter start their barnstorming campaign and will probably make some extra statements in praise of the government and in condemnation of the opposition. Anything they might say will be discounted to the extent of the \$121 in the case of Mr. White and the \$91 in Mr. Carter's case.

Mr. N. W. Rowell, K.C., leader of the opposition in the Ontario Legislature, has given notice of the following resolution:

(1) The immediate abolition of the bar;
(2) Such other restrictions upon the residue of the liquor traffic as experience may show to be necessary to limit its operations and effective to remedy its evils;
(3) The strict enforcement of the law by officials in sympathy with law enforcement, and the elimination of political influence from the administration of the law;
(4) Regulation and inspection of all houses of public entertainment so as to insure reasonable accommodation for the travelling public.

The City Council acted with commendable promptness on the application of the Board of Trade for a grant to assist in defraying the expenses of a publicity agent. The sum of \$2000 was voted, which with \$1000 raised by private subscription, should provide sufficient funds to carry on the work for a time. We want a publicity agent and we want a man who will throw all the energy he possesses into the work. This city should be advertised in England, Canada and the United States and special effort should be made to place our attractions before American manufacturing concerns who are contemplating the establishment of branches on this side of the line.

The establishment of toll bridges in connection with the St. John Valley Railway, simply means that there will be an extra charge upon every passenger and every pound of freight carried by the road. As there will be three bridges it will amount to quite an item. It would be interesting to know how many members of the Legislature are now expected to become members of this enterprising bridge company.

Hon. Mr. Loudheed certainly let the cat out of the bag when he told the senate on Saturday that toll bridges were to be established on the Valley Railway.

Mr. John A. Young, M.P.P., in a speech in the Legislature Friday evening, expressed the opinion that the defeat of reciprocity was a good thing for the country. Some of Mr. Young's neighbors who are now engaged in shipping hay to the American market, and are paying a fine of four dollars on every ton, will scarcely agree with his view of the matter.

Those who labor under the belief that Mr. John A. Young, M.P.P., intends to permit himself to be shelved at the next election do not know the man. Mr. Young has found the game of politics a pleasant and profitable side line to his insurance business and is determined to remain on the job.

According to the Government leader in the Senate there are to be collected on the bridges to be built in this province for the use of the St. John Valley Railway. An explanation of this matter would seem to be in order from Premier Fleming.

A perusal of the contingencies account in the auditor general's report shows that officials of the provincial government keep tab on the latest labor-saving inventions. Indeed, that is characteristic of all government officials.

The farmers of York who are shipping hay and potatoes to the United States these days and paying duty on the same, are also helping to support some of the men who went about the country last autumn urging them to vote against reciprocity.

The able speech of Hon. C. W. Robinson on the finances of this province appears elsewhere in this issue and is worthy of a careful perusal.

The flag-flapping Tories came in for some attention at the hands of Mr. Bentley in the Legislature Friday evening.

The Dominion parliament prorogued this afternoon after a session of nearly five months.

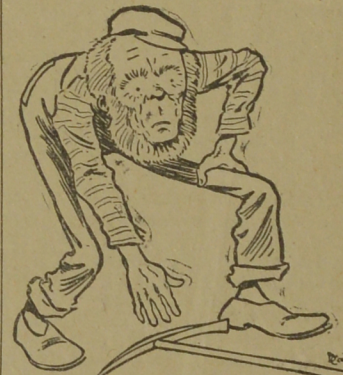

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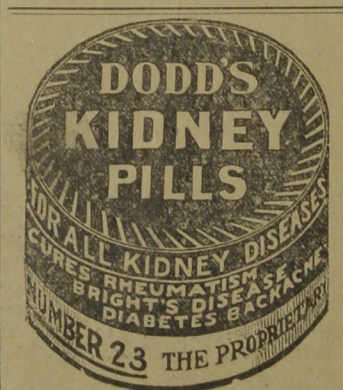
