The old Government had also left them in charge of the province, a legacy of the affairs of the province. The old Government had also a legacy in the shape of a policy of preservation and conservation of the Crown lands of the province which they left intact and as a revenue earning asset of the province, they also built up the dairy industry, left a good educational system, organized a game protective system which as the result of its wise administration had brought many thousands of dollars to the province, left the Provincial Hospital reorganized with a capable superintendent in charge in the person of Dr. Anglin and also left the increased Dominion subsidy which this Government and the province now enjoyed. There was also another legacy which the old Government left and that was the Blue Bell tract in Victoria County which had been purchased for about \$37,000 at a rate of 75c an acre while he was a member of the Government. He had learned on inquiry from the Crown land office that the receipts from the stumpage from the Blue Bell tract for four years amounted to over \$35,000 and there was also in addition the receipts from mileage and the payment from the settlers for the land which they were taking up. The Blue bell tract was a great asset for the province and was worth much more than \$36,000 the amount for which it was placed in the province in the report of the Auditor General.

He would not further apologize for the old Government because he felt that it had been pretty well buried at the election in March 1908 and also because he was going out of politics and the hon. gentlemen pretty soon would not have him to blame for his part in the old administration.

However he would like to submit to this House a table in a convenient form showing the amount of ordinary expenditure and the net

debt of the province for a number of years past illustrating how the ordinary expenditure and the net debt had increased under the present Government as compared with the old administration.

Senator Thompson said the bridges would cost far more than \$1,000,000. The railway was being built to correct the mistakes made in adopting what was called the back route from St. John River to Moncton.

Sensor Costigan said he found that the line would never be built as far as Grand Falls, and that the province would therefore find that it would not be operated by the Intercolonial, would not receive forty per cent. of the gross earnings of the road and would be called upon to pay the interest on the bonds guaranteed. The bill was given a third reading.

Sensor Dandurand, on motion for the third reading of the bill to increase by \$100,000 a year, the subsidy of Prince Edward Island, said that the subsidies to the provinces were fixed by the British North America Act.

He moved an amendment adverse to the bill because it proposed to violate imperial legislation, and because no reason was given for making the increase.

Sir Richard Scott said that the Prince Edward Island subsidy had been twice increased by the Canadian parliament. In 1887 it was increased by \$20,000 a year, and in 1901 by \$30,000 a year. If the bill under consideration violated imperial legislation it had been violated twice before.

Sensor McMullen and Senator Cloran protested again the passage of the bill.

Sensor Dandurand's amendment was declared lost by the following vote:

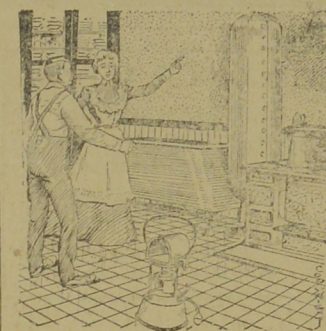
