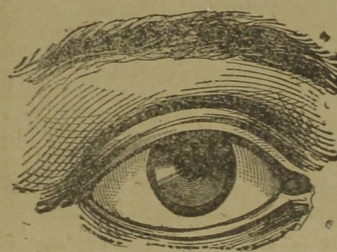

NEW WORLD'S RECORD FOR RUNNING HIGH JUMP

Horine of Stanford University, California, Beats Sweeney's Record by Quarter of an Inch--Old Record Stood for Seventeen Years--Record was made on Third Trial

Stanford University, Calif., March 29--George Horine of the class of 1911 of Stanford University, broke the world's running high jump record in a meet with the University of Southern California, here today, clearing the bar at 6 feet 6 1/4 inches. The previous record, 6 feet 5 1/2 inches, was made by M. F. Sweeney at New York Sept. 21st, 1895.

Horine broke the world's intercollegiate record here last Tuesday with a jump of 6 feet 4 inches. His world-beating leap today was made on the third trial and was officially measured by the judges at the meet. Trainer Christie of the University of California, Trainer Moulton of Stanford and Trainer Cromwell of the University of Southern California.

UNIQUE HORSE-RACING SUIT

Bath, Me., March 29--A unique suit has been filed here by F. W. Carleton of Woolwich, against Herbert G. Fletcher of South Paris, Alonzo C. Scribner of Lewiston, and J. Manley Nichols of Augusta, judges at the Maine State Fair in Lewiston last September. He asks for \$1,500 damages alleged through the suspension of Mr. Carleton's horse, Baron Sidnut, for sixty days.

This is the first suit of its kind before the Maine courts and horsemen all over the state are interested in the outcome.

FINE MUST STAND

New York, March 29--Pres. Barrow of the International League, fined the Montreal Club \$200 today for permitting the draft of the International schedule to get out of its hands before it was officially released. The schedule was printed in two Montreal papers several weeks before the time set by the league.

Pres. Barrow says that he found that Manager Lush gave out the schedule, but that Lush was ignorant of the fact that there was a penalty for doing so. However, Mr. Barrow could find no way to avoid fining the Montreal club, as he held it guilty of the offense.
